

COLLEGE PREPARATORY

COMMERCIAL COURSE


The commercial course provides training for those pupils who wish to enter business. It trains them to be stenographers, bookkeepers, typists, and for general office work.

The 1941-1942 Warriors closed one of the most successful seasons in the school's history. They were champions of the Eastern Division of the Mid-Valley, Furnas County champions, Mid-Valley League champions, and State Class "C" District champions. In the regional tournament they were finally humped off the Sulbertson, who later won the State Class "C" Basketball championship. The Warriors won 17 games, lost 7, and spared 723 points to the opporents 588. In the final rankings in the state in Class "C" competition, they named tenth. They also won the only basketball prophics in the school's history. In tournament games they won 11 out of 12, losing only to Culbertson. For rent year's squad they will return three lettermen out of this year's starting lineup, which is a very good outlook for another championship season.

FOOTBALL

When September 1 rolled around, about twenty-five anxious boys reported to the first practice of the Warriors. Richard "Terrible" Terry, a graduate from the University of Nebraska succeeded Leonard Greathouse as the coach for the Warriors. With ten returning lettermen and other dependable players, the Warriors were determined to capture another championship, and started to work hard the first three weeks to get into shape for their first game.

Opening the season September 19 against a smaller Holbrook eleven, the Warriors out fought the Hornets 14-0, and this started the Warriors off on a very successful season.

Traveling to Orleans the following week, the Warriers had to be satisfied with a 6-6 deadlock. This game later cost the Warriors at least a tie for the Republican-Valley championship.

Avenging a 53-12 licking by an Alma team of the 1938 season, the Warriors romped over this hapless eleven this year 82-0 in one of the grandest scoring outbursts of the school's history.

The next week the Warriors added Elwood to their string of victims in a lop-sided contest 30-0. This was the second victory for the Warriors in the Mid-Valley League.

In a very important contest for leadership in the Mid-Valley, Indianola fell 20-7 before the crashing onslaught of the Warriors. This game was really the first big test of the Warriors, and it opened the first chance of a League Championship.

Minden was the next foe on the schedule, and in a see-saw affair the Warriors came out of camp with the Greyhounds scalp 7-0. Two other touchdowns were in sight, but two bad breaks cost the Warriors the chance of scoring them.

On a cold, windy, rainy day the Cambridge Troper outclassed by the Warriors 6-0 in a good foother came on November 7. The Trojans were outplayed through out most of this game but the Warriors were unable to chalk up no more than one touchdown.

As the Warriors had previously tied orcleans, the Championship of this valley went to Beaver City with Arapahoc second.

But on Thanksgiving Day the Warriors won over their foe, Oxford, which decided who was the winner of the Mid-Valley League. As both teams were now undefeated in league play, it was a very important contest. With the outcome being only 7-6 victory for the Warriors, it left many fans after the game by athless as it was a close thrilling, and a hard-fought football game.

BASKETBALL

Immediately after the Warriors' last football game, about twenty-five boys reported to the first practice of basketball, as their first game loomed just a little more than one week away.

On December 9 the Arapahoe Warriors and Indianola Indians met in the first game of the basketball season with the outcome being a win for Indianola by a score of 25-23, but a moral victory for the Warriors.

The following week on their home floor, the Warriors, without much exertion, overcame the Elwood quintet 39-15.

After Christmas vacation, undefeated Loomis succumbed to the Warriors 28-19, but the next two games were lost to the Holbrook Hornets and the Beaver City 18-16 and 42-27, respectively.

Getting back into the winning column, the Warriors trounced the Orleans Orioles by a large margin of 55-26.

Traveling way down the line to Franklin, the "Blue and White" came home on the short end of the score 38-21. It was their poorest exhibition of basketball the entire season.

In the first tournament of the year at Edison, the Eastern Division of the Mid-Valley, the Warriors overcars the jinx of losing their first game in a tournament by conquering Leomis 25-32. The "Blue and White" then went on to win wheir next two games, Bertrand 34-18 and Helbrock 18-13. By virtue of this championship the Warriors were able to put the first basketball trophy of the school's history in the show ease.

In the next two games, the Warriors were turned back by Oxford 21-15 and Bertrand 34-20, as sickness forced several of the regulars out of the line-up.

On February 5-7 the County Tournament was held at Edison. As another trophy was at stake, the Warriors, romping through three games, walloped Cambridge 43-20 and Wilsonville 34-15, but edging Beaver City only 36-34 in the finals. This was the first defeat of the season for the Bearcats of Beaver City.

Continuing their winning streak, the Warriors romped the Cambridge Trojans 43-27, with Coach Terry in bed with the flu.

Meeting Lebanon for the championship of the Mid-Valley League at Holbrook on February 13, the Warriors, in a very fast game, eluded the "Cedars" 31-21. This added the third trophy to the Warriors' collection.

Edison and Red Willow, next on the season's schedule, were added to the Warriors' long list of beaten teams, as the Warriors roared past Edison 47-35, but squeezed the Warriors roared past Edison 47-35, but squeezed win over Red Willow 30-29 in the only overtime game of the season.

The next tournament was the most important of them all, the State Class "C" lournament at Arapahoe. The Warriors easily conquered Elwood in the first game 34-21 but from then on it was tough sledding. A last half rally beat Cambridge 31-26, and excellent co-operative work whipped Wilcox 27-18. The Warriors thus gained the finals again and the right to play Beaver City. A fast first half beat the Bearcats, as the Warriors again emerged victorious with a thrilling 26-22 win. A fourth trophy went to the show case.

In the Regional Tournament at McCook, Culbertson, with a last quarter rally, whipped the "Blue and White" 29-18, and eliminated the Warriors' chances of going to the State Tournament at Lincoln. Although the Warriors were troubled with a large floor, they gave a good account of themselves.

As this game ended their 1941-42 season, the Warriors closed one of the most successful seasons in the school's history. They won 17 games, and lost7, scoring 723 points to the opponents' 588. In the final rankings in the state in Class "C" competition the "Blue and White" ranked tenth. They won 11 of 12 tournament games, losing only to Culbertson. Though there had never been a basketball trophy in the show case before, the Warriors went to work in earnest and won four different trophies. Coach Terry should be complimented highly on these outstanding accomplishments because when the season opened only two lettermen were back, but he took care of that situation in fine style. With three lettermen returning out of the starting lineup for next year, prospects are very good for another championship season.






