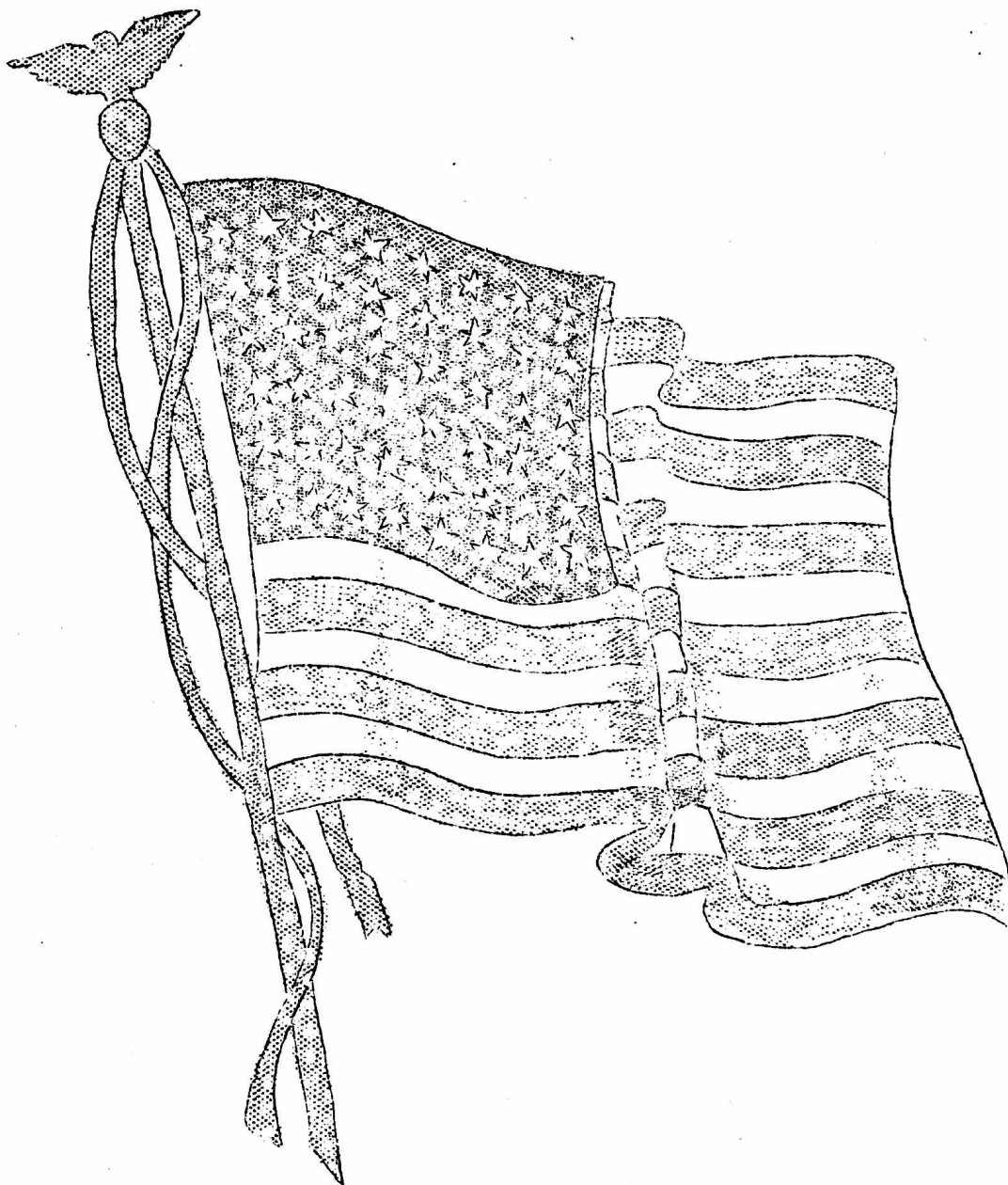


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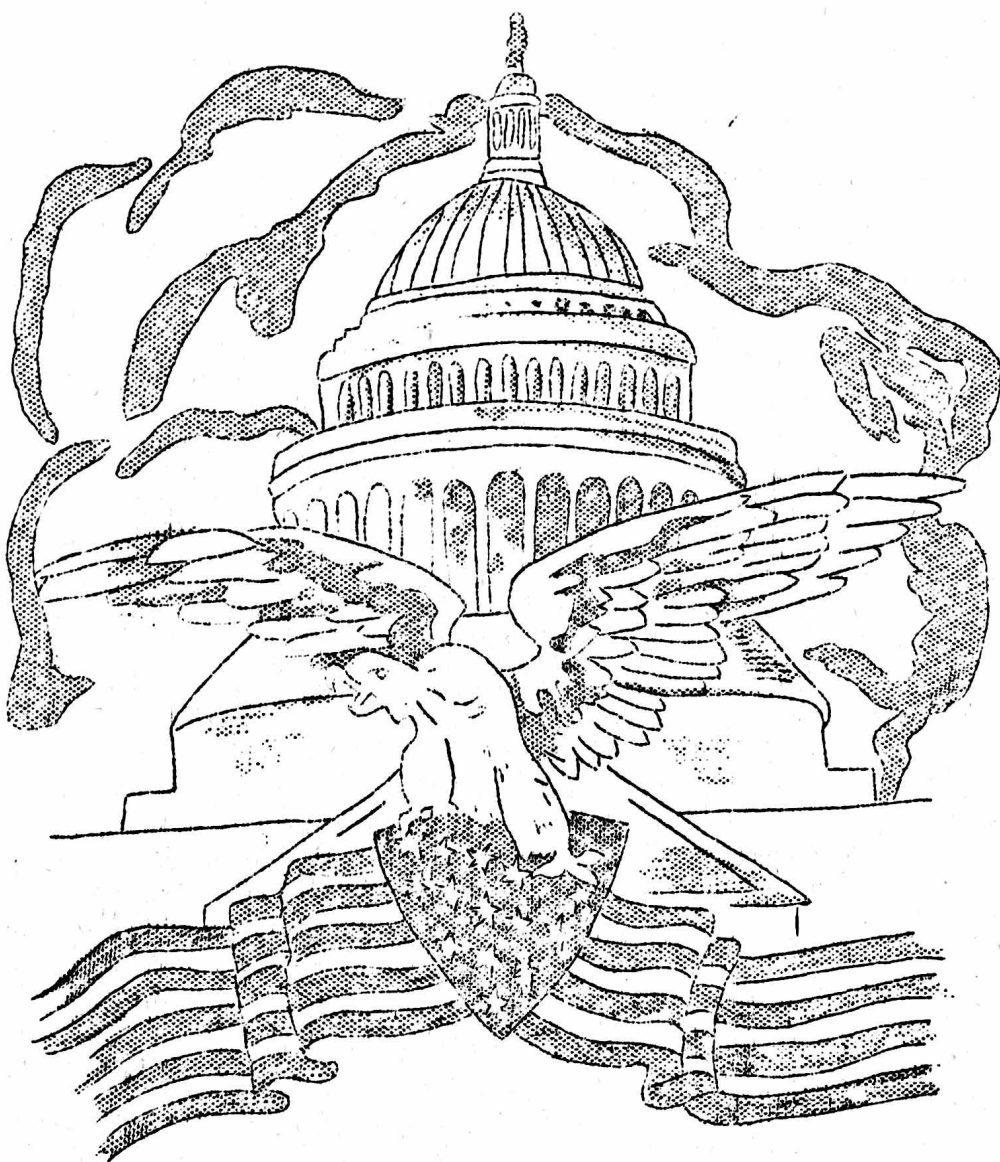

To those who have gone from this community to enter the service of their Country, that we might continue to enjoy its many freedoms, we, the class of 1945, dedicate this Annual.

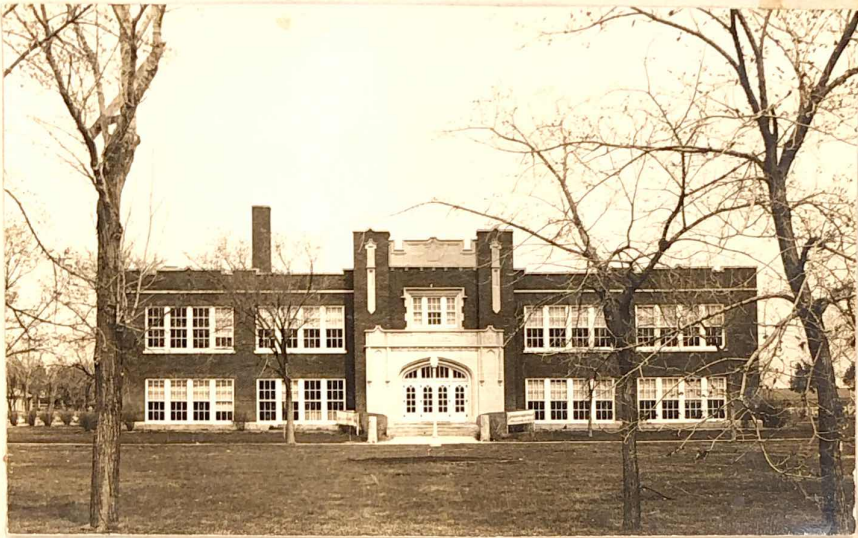

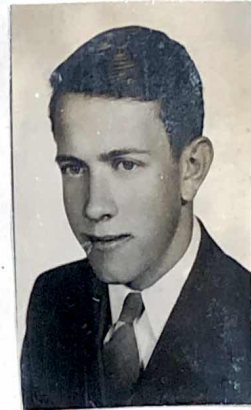

COURSES

College Preparatory: This course prepares students for entrance to the University of Nebraska and all other colleges. The principle subjects are English, Latin, social and physical science, and mathematics.

Normal Training: A student planning on or interested in teaching should take the normal training course. This is a vocational course; that is, one which trains students to do some practical thing after leaving school. Upon completing this course a student is prepared to obtain a third-grade teaching certificate. In this course the students reviews the subjects studied in the grades and studies the importance of character education. Professional training teaches one the correct teaching procedure. The course, taken by eight seniors, is a very valuable course.

Commercial: This course gives training to those pupils who are interested in entering the business world. It trains them to be stenographers, bookkeepers, typists, and office clerks. The skilled subjects offered are bookkeeping, first and second year typing, shorthand, office practice, and commercial law. This course, taken by twenty-two seniors, is a very helpful course.

Trade Training: Very few schools offer this training to the pupils. However, it is a valuable course because it trains students in auto mechanics, blacksmithing, electricity, clerking, office work and other desired vocations. Arapahoe is one of the few Nebraska schools which offer this course. The students gain experience in the local business houses. Credits earned in this way may be used to meet graduation requirements.

General Course: A general course is offered to one who does not know what he will do after graduation. The subjects which are offered to this person are those which are necessary for college entrance. Very few students take this course because they usually have a desired course.

FOOTBALL

Arapahoe Warriors started very strongly in '42 by downing Holbrook 62-0 for the first football game of the season. Although the Warriors were victorious, and piled up a large score in their first game, they did not get over-confident, and to prove this they knocked off Orleans the following week by a score of 27-0.

The Warriors were practicing hard and striving to better themselves, when Polio broke out in the school and practice was dismissed for two weeks. During this time, games with Alma and Elwood were postponed and later the Alma game was cancelled.

With only one week to recondition themselves, the Arapahoe lads met the boys from Elwood and snowed them under by scoring 44 points to their 7. Friday of the same week saw the Warriors (carrying many of their bruises and sore spots) off to meet the Whippits from Minden. Tired from the long journey and the skirmish with Elwood only three days before, resulted in the Warriors meeting their only defeat of the season. The final score was 12-6.

One week later Arapahoe journeyed to Cambridge and defeated them 26 to 6. In spite of the one-sided score, this was a hard fought game, and interesting to watch.

Playing on home soil again, the Warriors walked over Beaver City and plowed them under 31-0. Two self-made breaks came early in the game and resulted in the Warriors scoring on both.

All good things must end, and the Warriors played their last game when they met Oxford, Thanksgiving Day. Arapahoe won the Mid-Valley Conference title for the second consecutive year. The game ended 32 to 0 with Arapahoe victorious, thus ending one of the greatest seasons for the Arapahoe Warriors.

Eight Seniors walked to the showers knowing this was the last time they would play for Arapahoe High School. In spite of a very glorious season, the boys felt rather sad to think that this was the last time this great team would play together.

SENIOR LETTERMEN

Henry Helms, tackle. Although waiting until a senior to take part in this sport, Henry mixed speed and power and gave his opponents much trouble.

Bill Hill, tackle three years, halfback one year. Bill mixed speed and aggressiveness with 210 pounds and made all-State honorary tackle in his junior year. He gave many opponents bad headaches. He was one of two seniors who were four year lettermen.

Jack Learned, center, honorary Co-Captain. Although small, Jack lettered three years and was an exceptionally good tackler. He was equally as good at snapping the ball back.

Wayne Frost, guard. Wayne lettered two years and tried harder and was the best sport on the squad.

Leon McCoy, end. Leon lettered two years and was a good pass receiver and floating end.

Jack Slife, fullback, honorary Co-Captain. Jack is big and tough and along with Bill has lettered four years. He is one of the many reasons why Arapahoe were Champs.

Bud Suedmeyer, end. Bud has lettered three years. He is a good pass receiver and has the size which was another reason for our victories.

Holbrook fell prey to the Warriors for the Warriors second game of the tournament and third game with Holbrook in the season. Arapahoe won 42-21 and went into the finals the next night against Oxford, whom they beat 45-22 making Arapahoe the champion of that tournament.

Following the tournament, Cambridge fell into the hands of the Warriors and were beaten 27-23.

In addition to the seven boys who qualified for the State Track Meet, Hugh Harrington, although not qualifying, earned a letter.



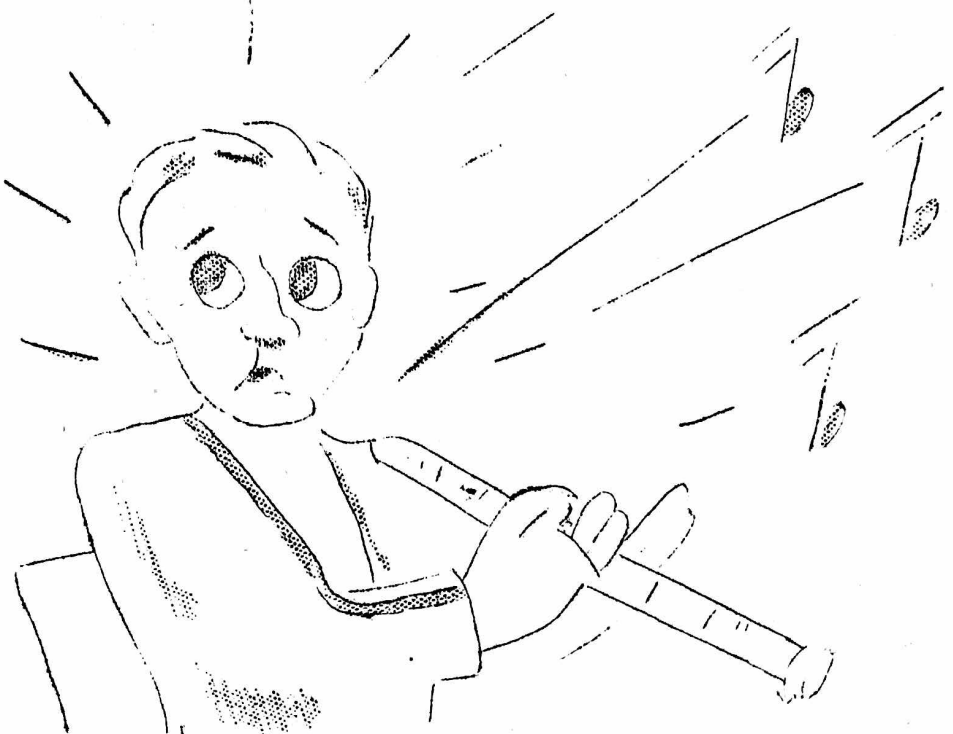
MUSIC

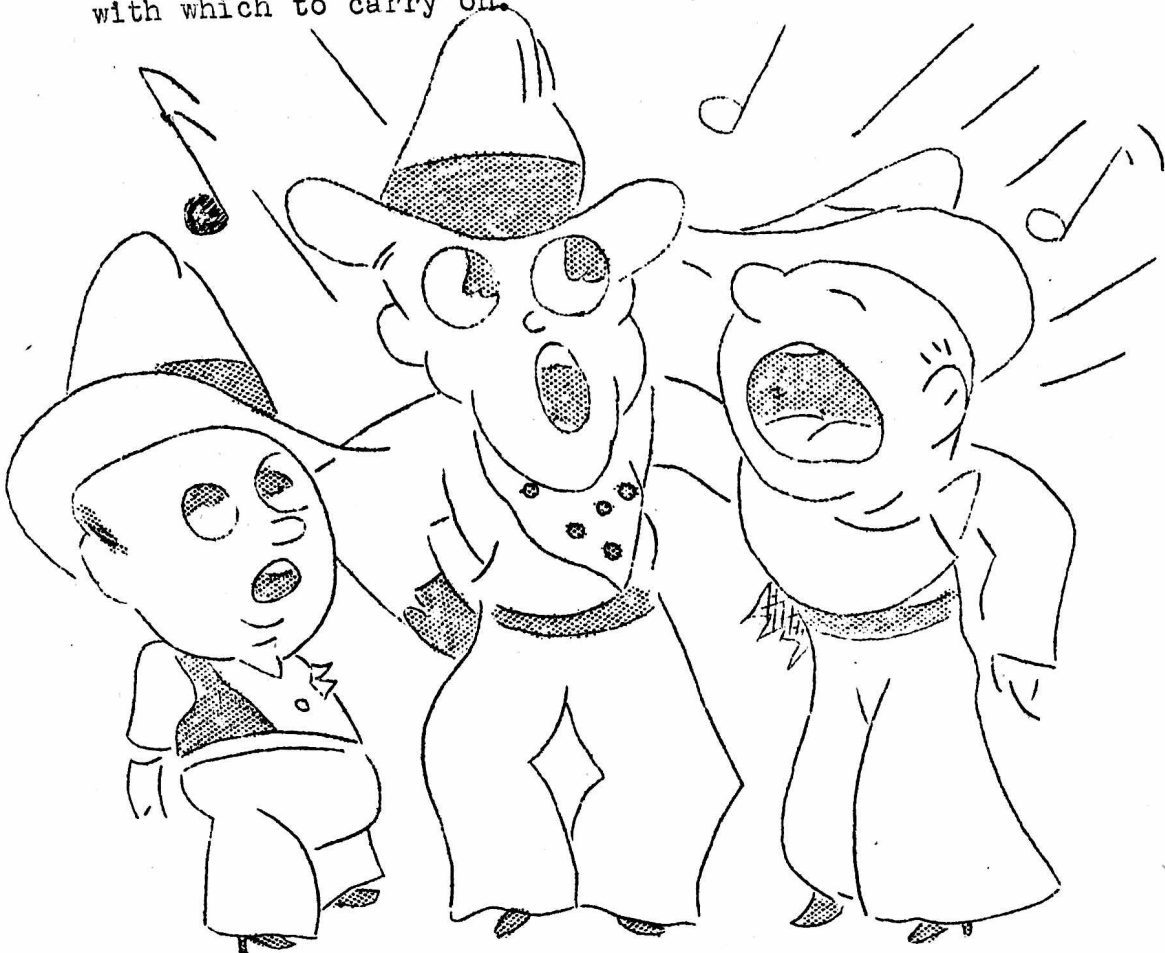
This year's music contest, due to the war conditions, was much smaller than it had been in preceding years, but nevertheless the competition was just as keen.

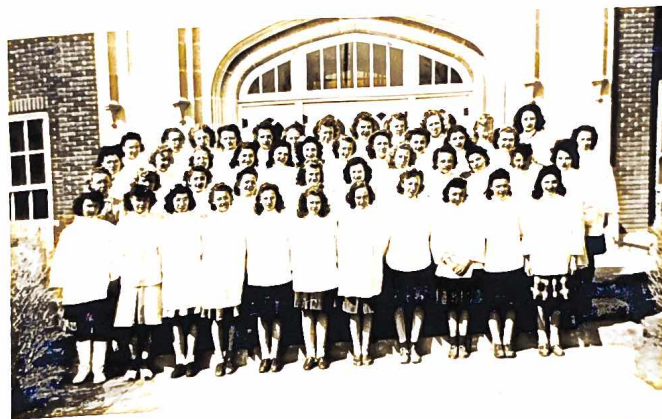

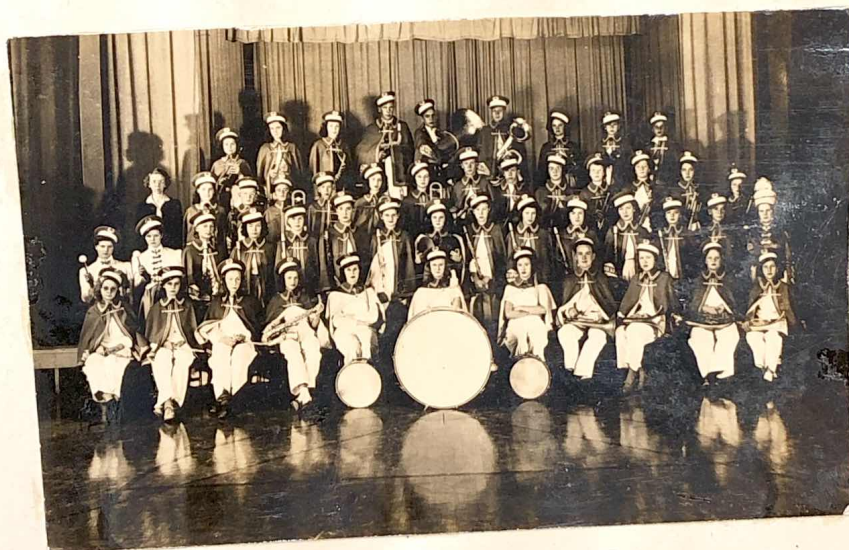

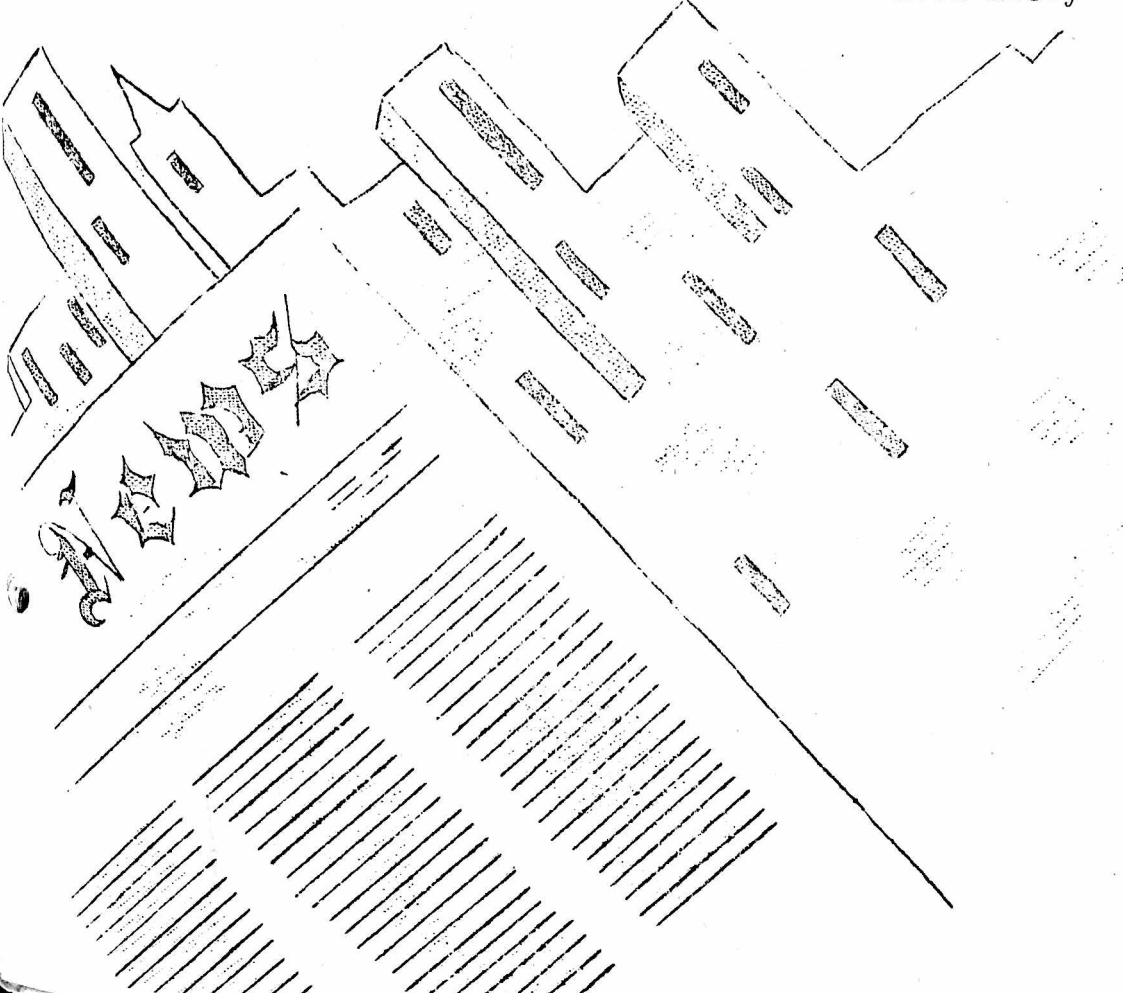
The Tomahawk is a weekly publication by the Senior English class, and is composed of three columns in our local newspaper, The Public Mirror.

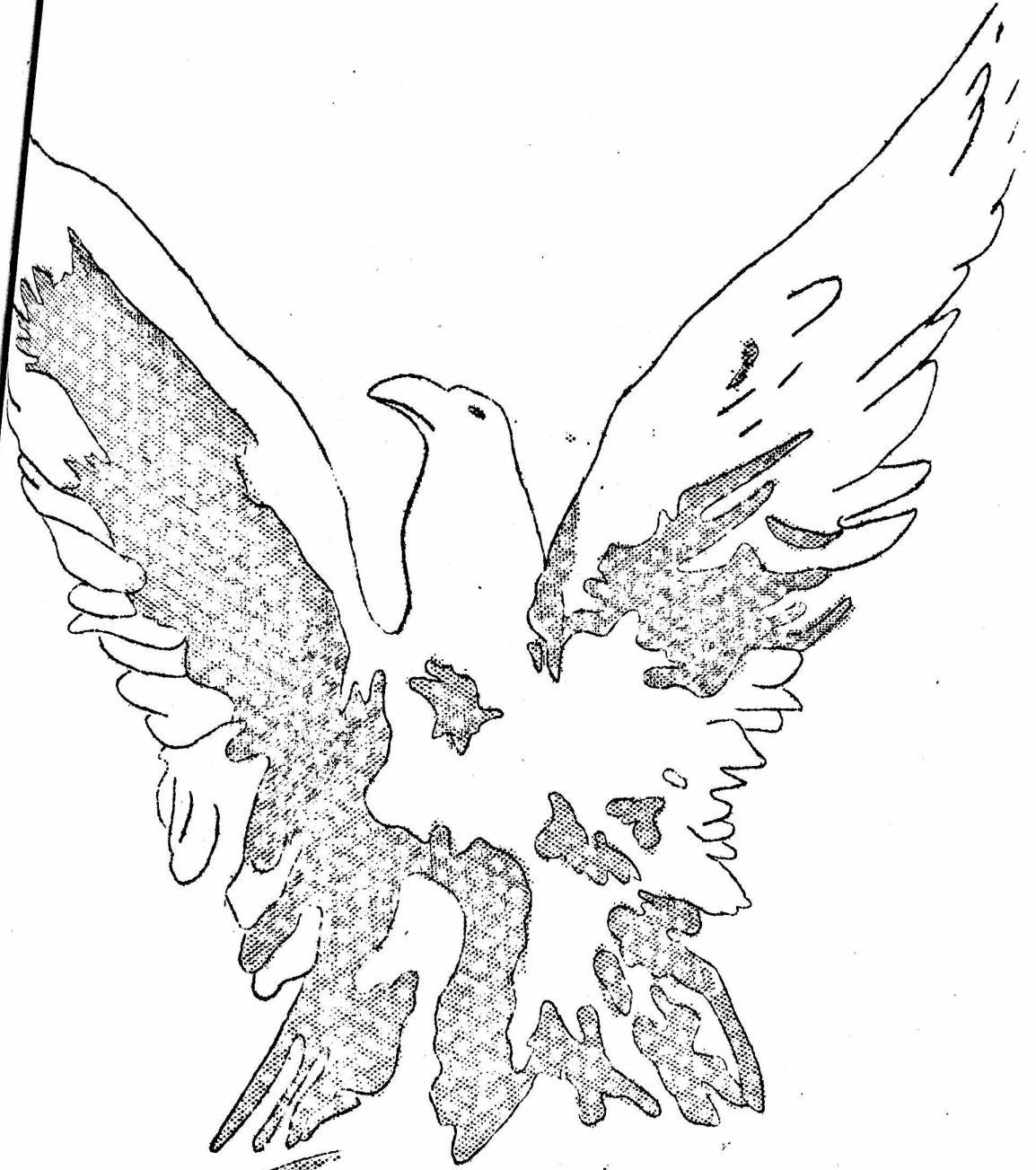
It has been the aim of the staff to bring all the school happenings to the eyes of the public. The Tomahawk is written in such a form that all of the people who read it enjoy it very much.

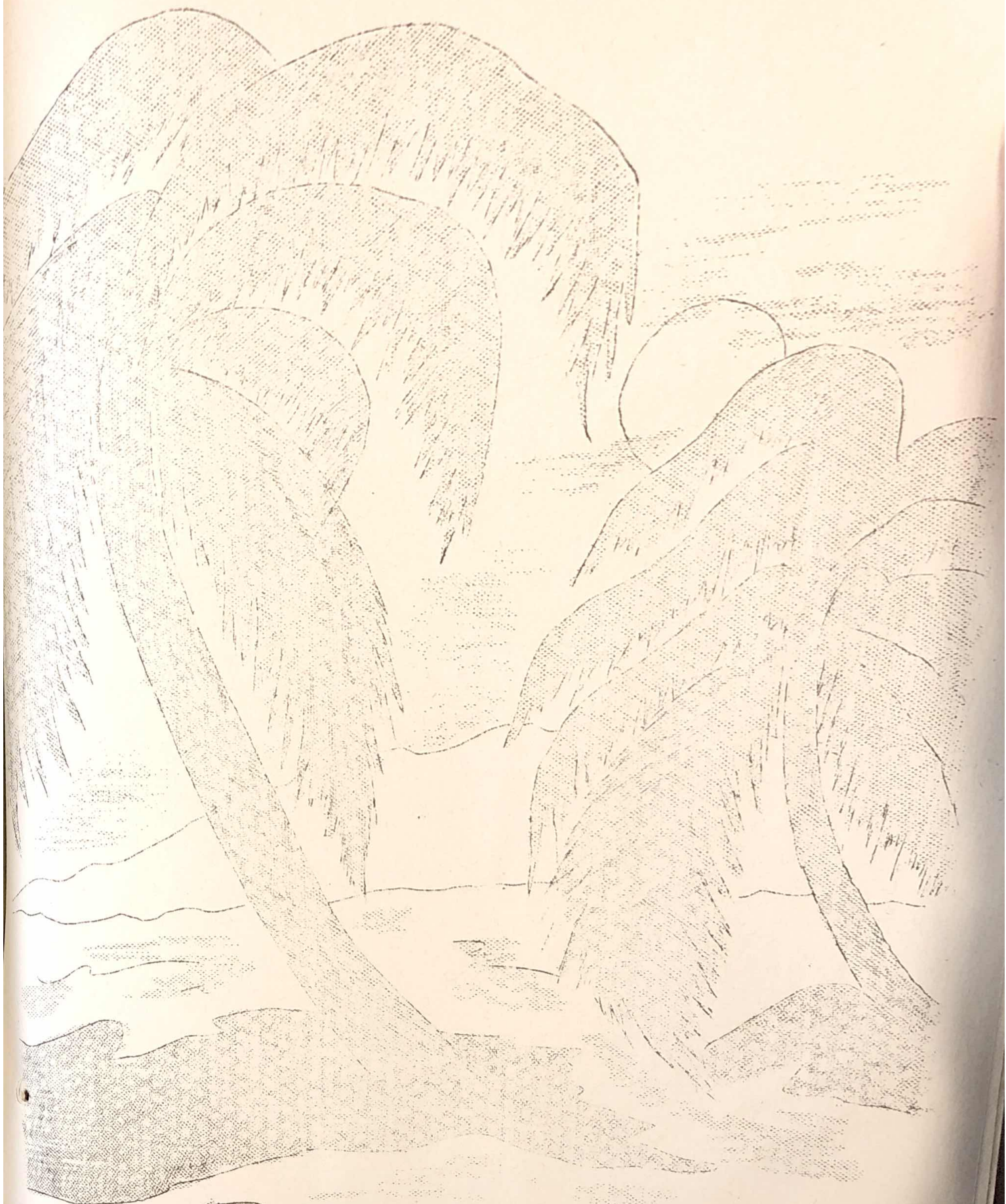

With Mr. Gembala were Ethel Rader, Ethel Hyke, Muriel Post, Marian Post and Georgia Johnson.

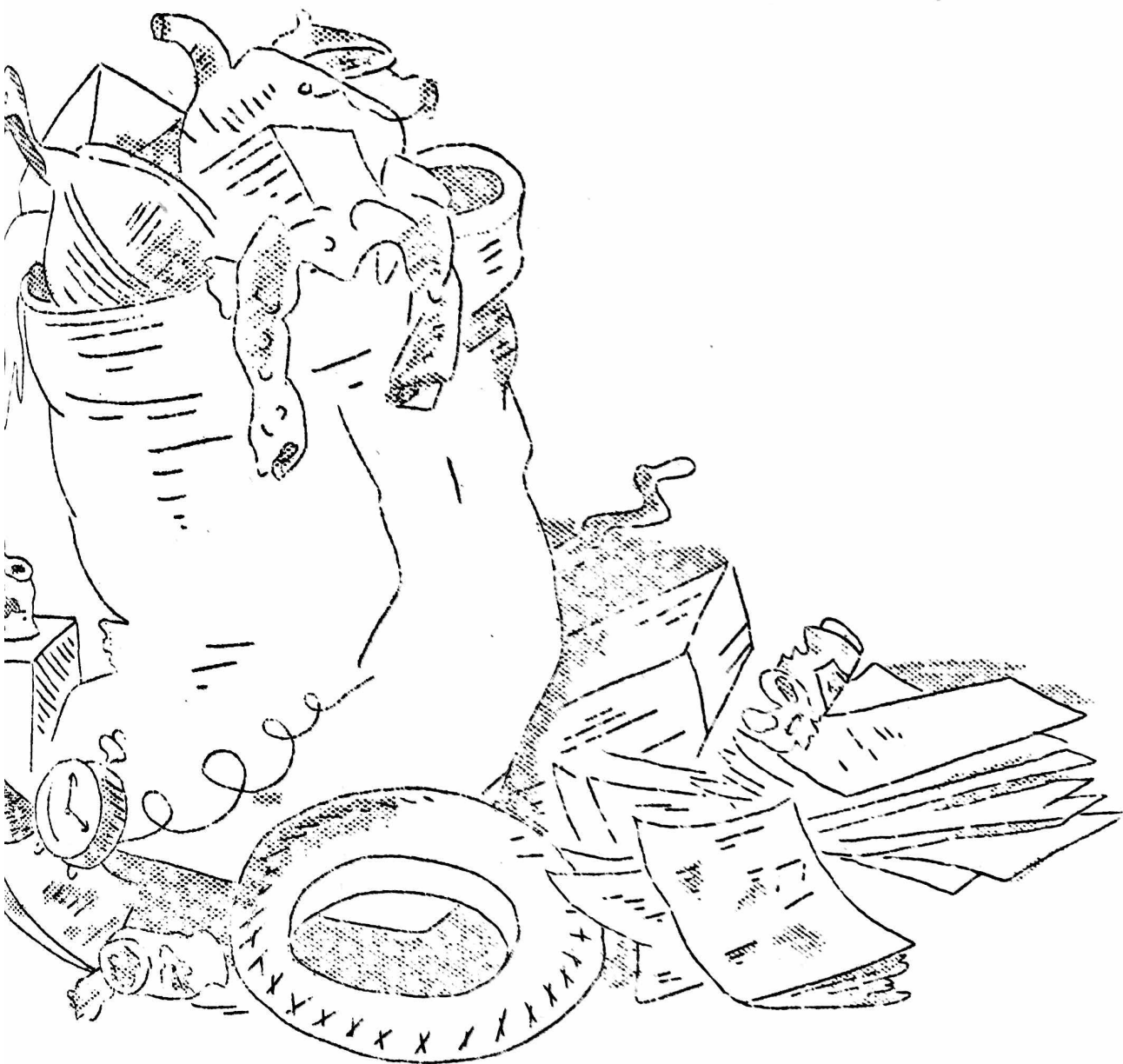

During the three-weeks' drive the school took in \$610.00.

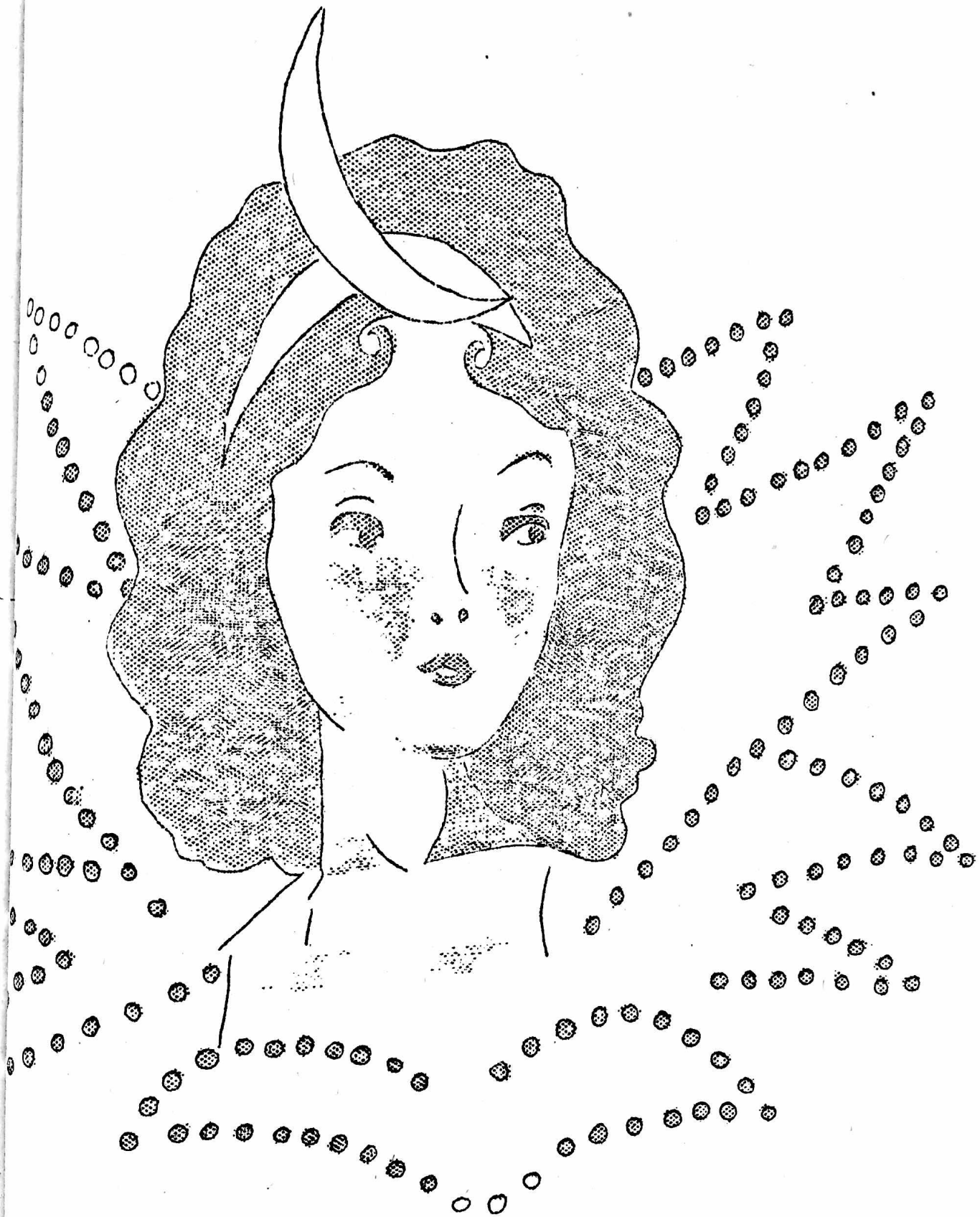
We were challenged by the Beaver City School.

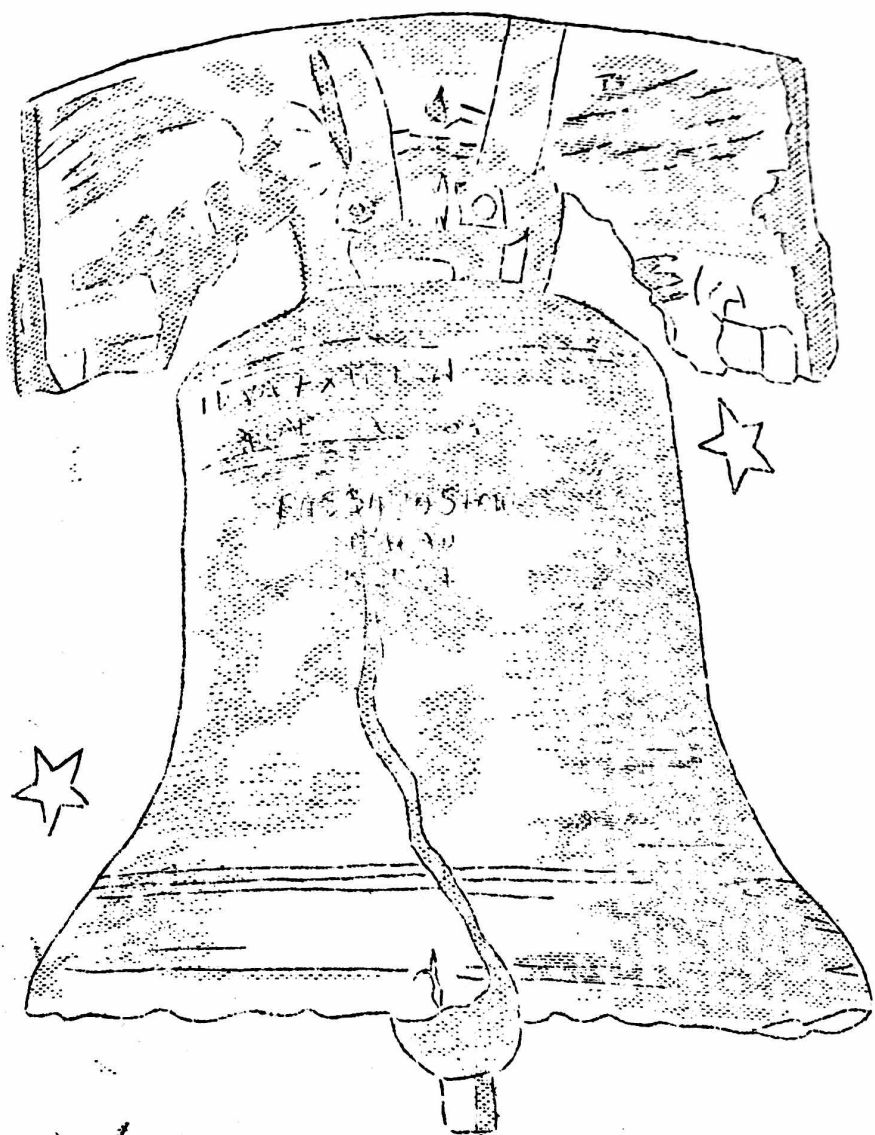

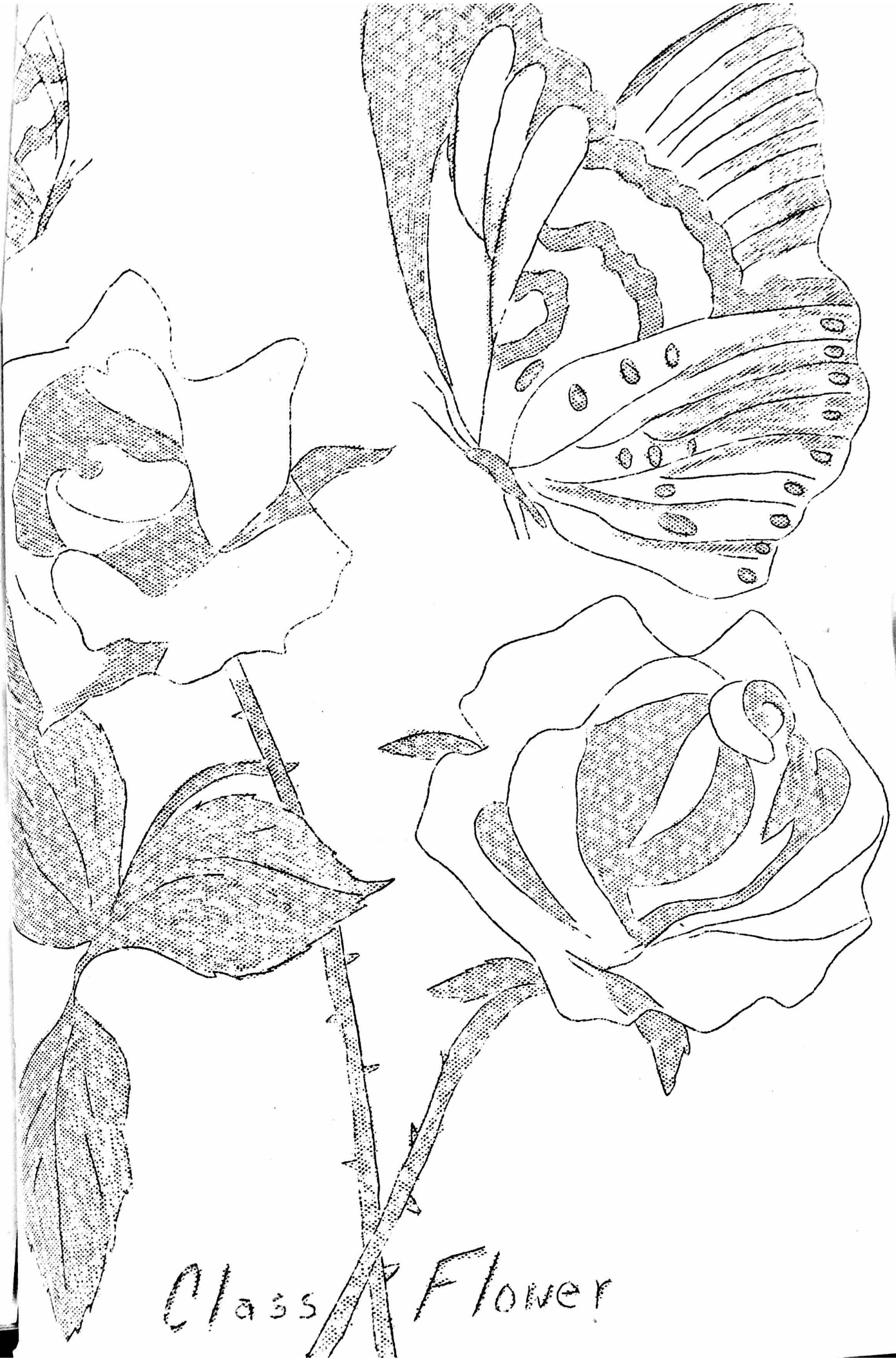
