To you graduating Seniors - I urge you to take advantage of all the educational opportunities offered to you in the future.

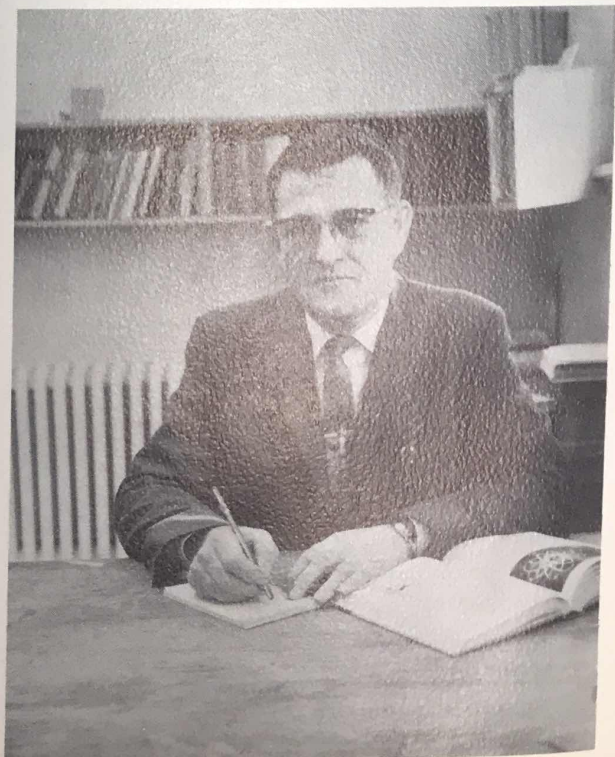

When we were juniors our class neither increased nor decreased.

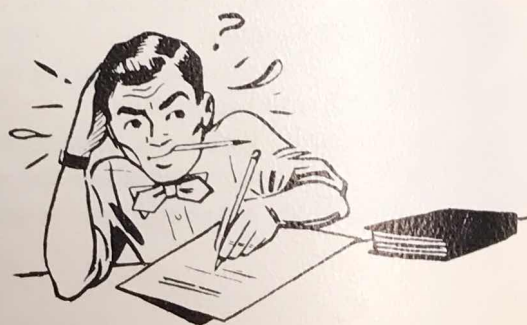
