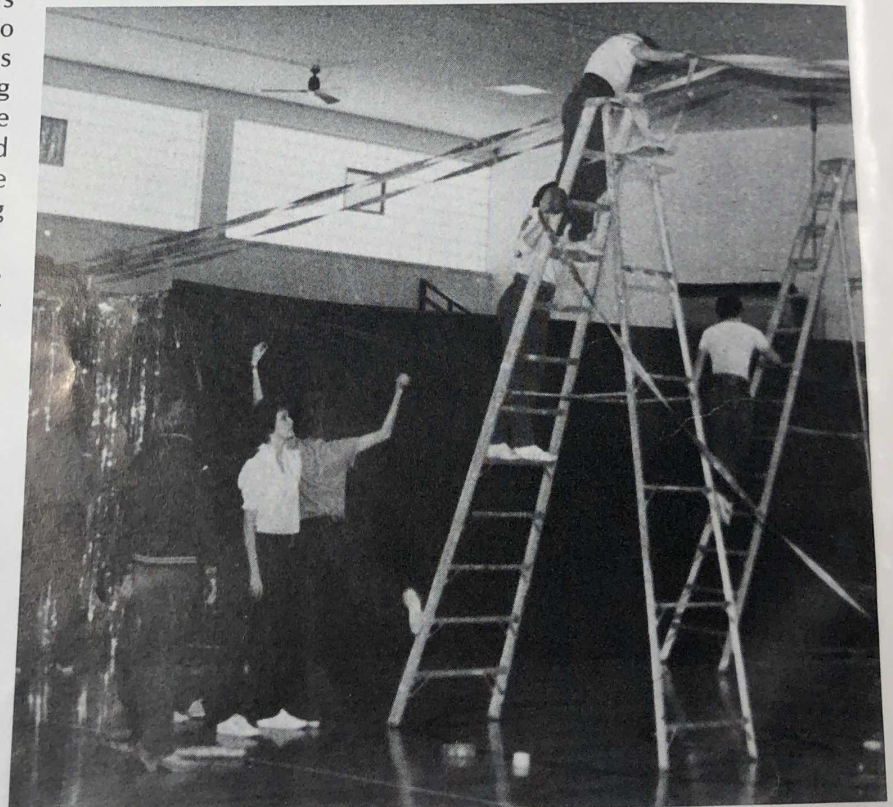

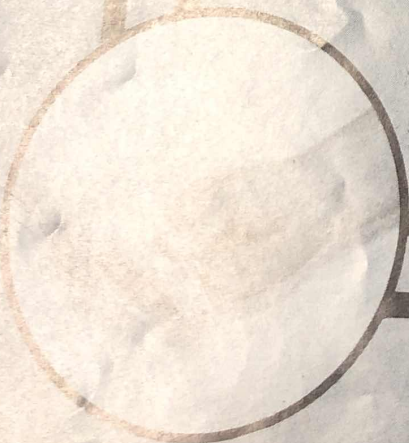


## The Believers

This was a year to be proud of. Many things were accomplished and many memories have been made. The junior year ended with each student looking forward to their senior year and the future ahead of them.

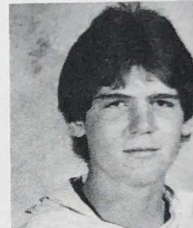
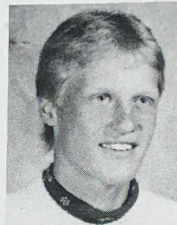

Being at the "bottom" again is a hard adjustment, but working up to a final goal makes it a lot easier. The Freshmen year is one the Class of 1987 will never forget.



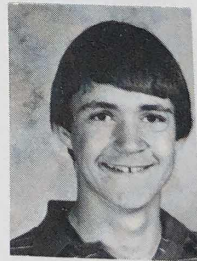

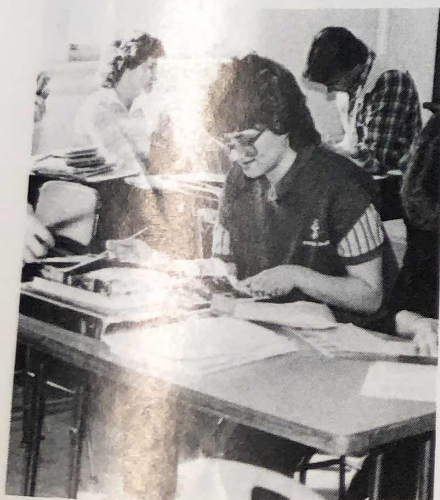

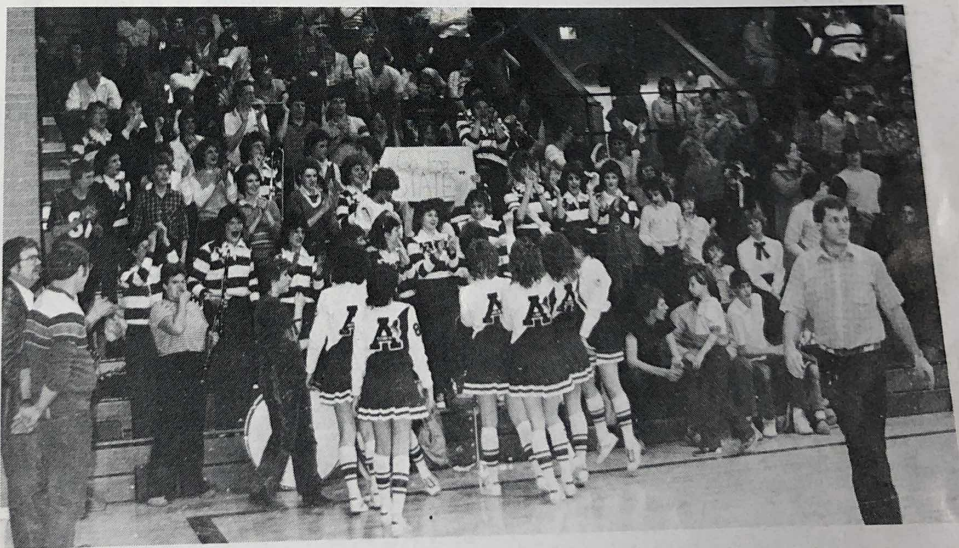

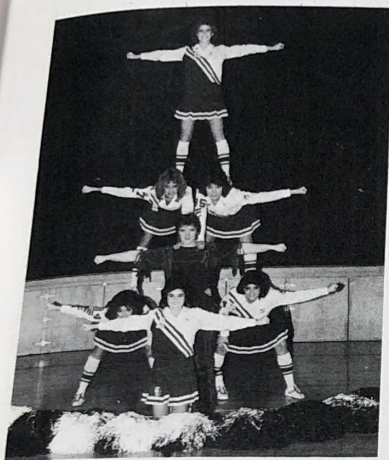

The group also put their funds into having a better display of music at Homecoming by getting the group "Black Jack" to play which was very much enjoyed by everyone.

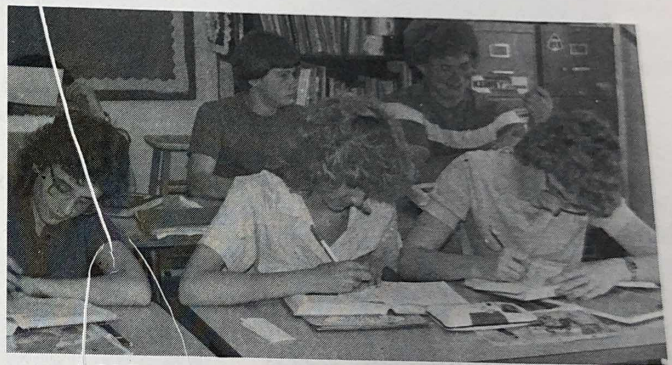

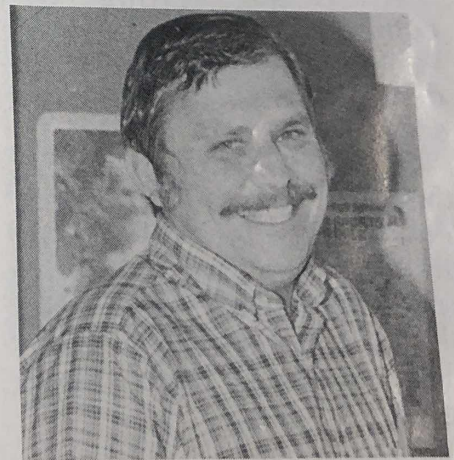

This year AHS had three Future Problem Solving teams in its system. Two senior groups which include sophomores through seniors and one intermediate group which includes Jr. High through Freshmen.

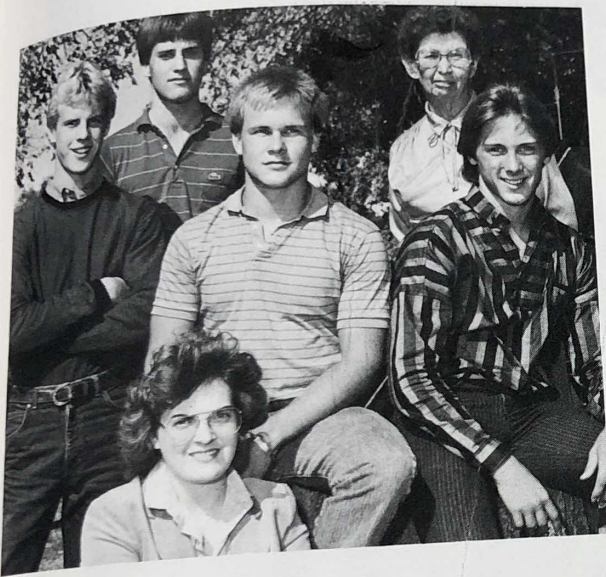
This year's problems dealt with prison camps in outer space and how they would be set up, and what problems will result from increased laser use.

The AHS speech department was pleased with the outcome of the year and hopes that next year will prove to be even better.



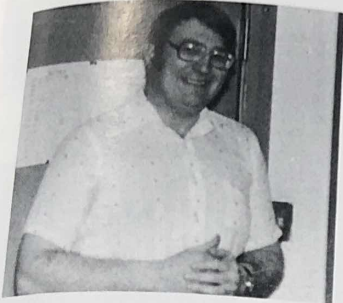

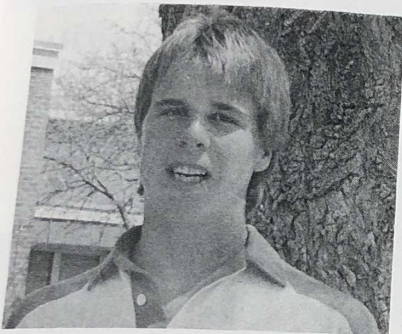

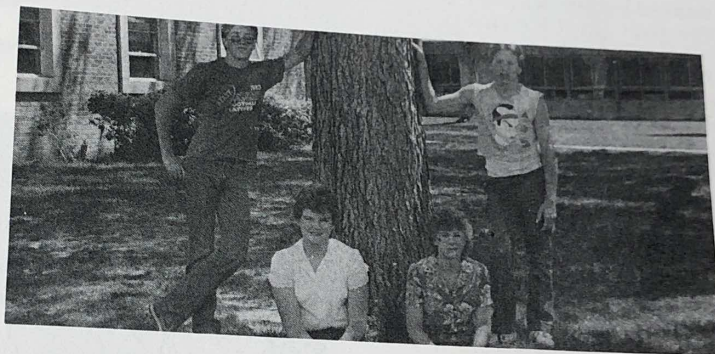
The FFA members had a productive year. This was the fourth year that Arapahoe students had been involved in the Holbrook FFA Chapter.

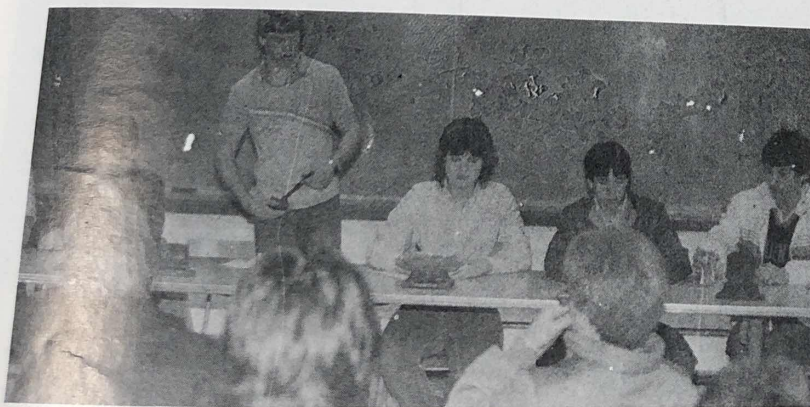

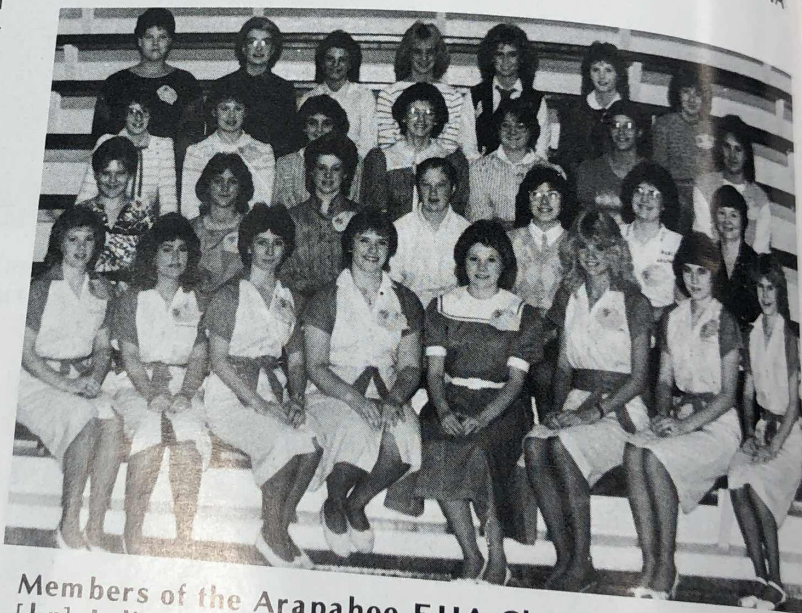
The FHA carnival proved to be a very successful event. Activities included a cake walk, jail, and a sponge toss, along with popcorn and clowns.

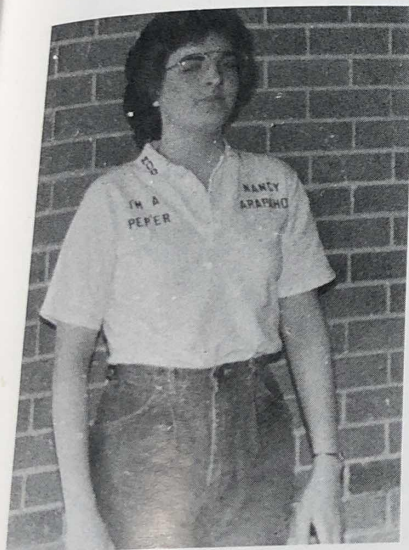

The Juniors presented "Twelve Angry Jurors" on November 14. The play was about a young man that was accused of stabbing his father with a knife.

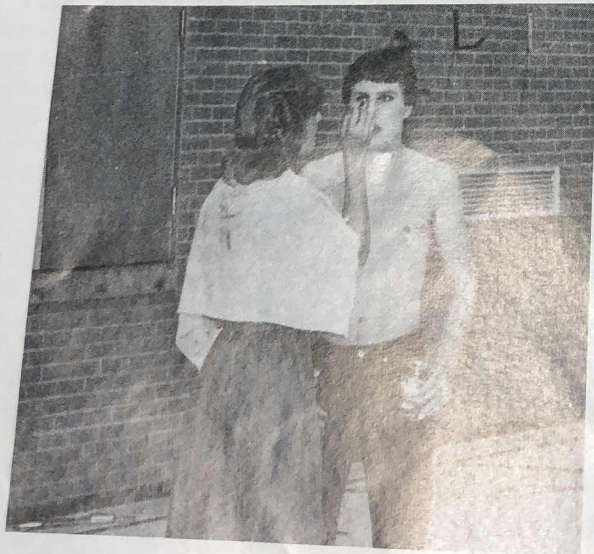

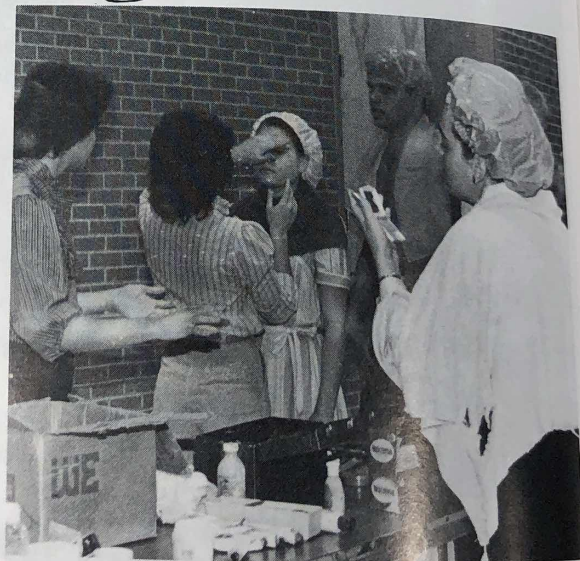

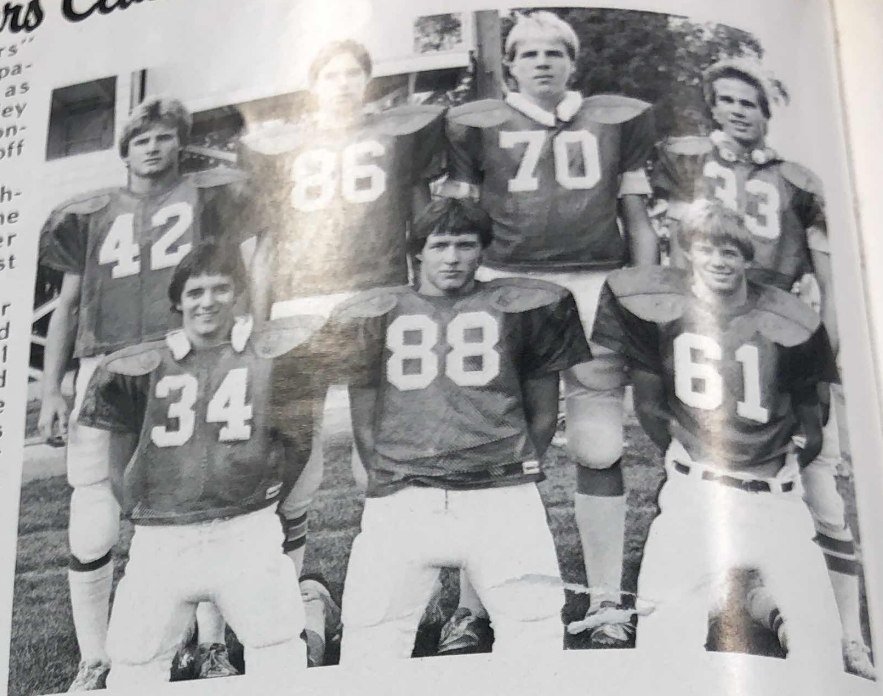


# Warriors Claim RVL Championship

The "Year of the Warriors" it did turn out to be as Arapahoe compiled a 7-3 record as well the Republican Valley League Football Championship and a State Playoff Berth.

Impressive statistics highlighted the season with the Warriors dominating over their opponents in almost every aspect of the game. 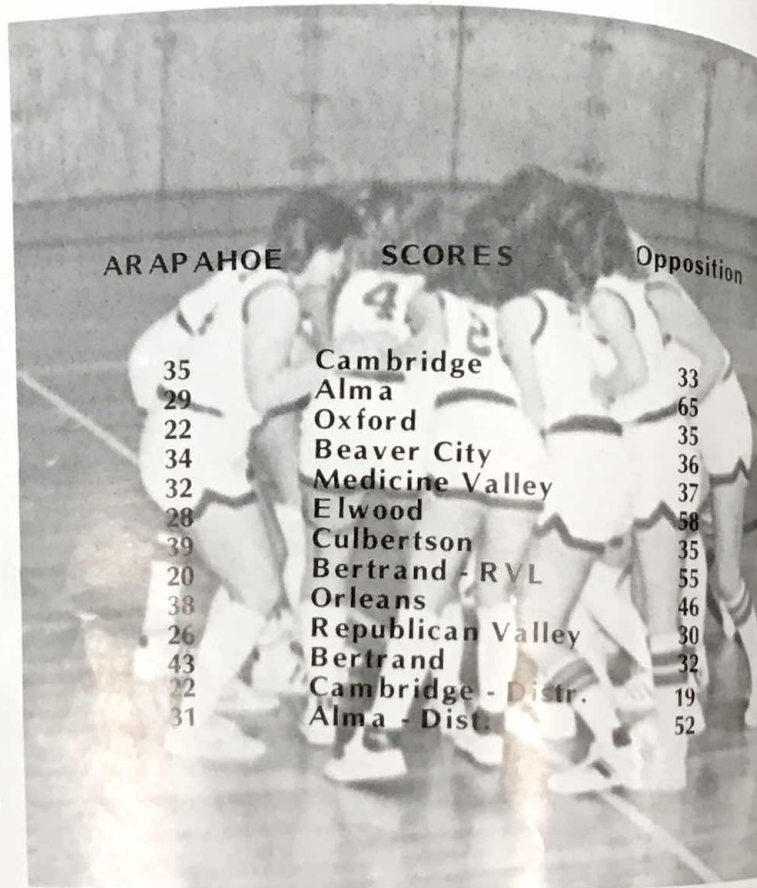
The Arapahoe Warriorettes under the coaching strategy of Dave Owens and his assistant Mike Borden finished a disappointing 4-9 for the season.

Arapahoe was defeated in several games this season that either came down to the last buzzer or they were just short in the point totals to win.

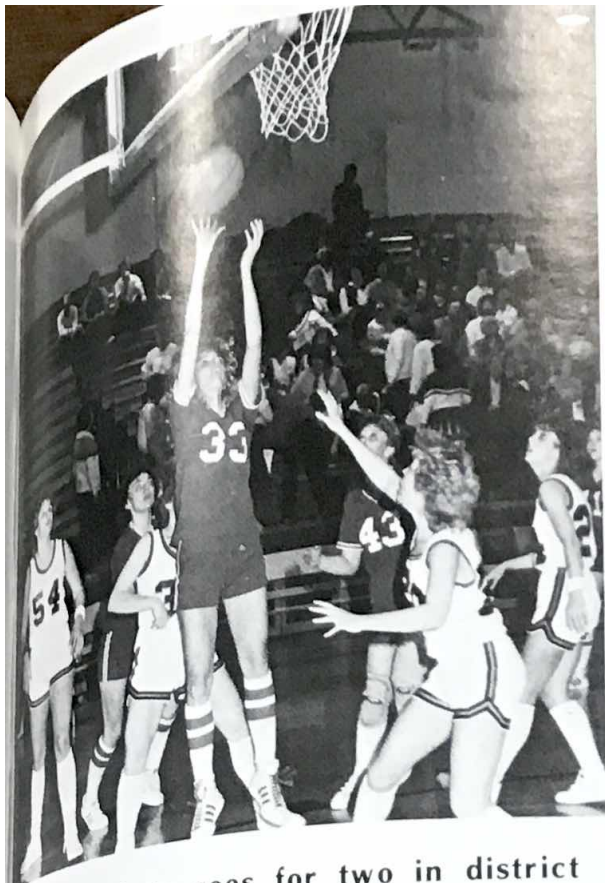

The Warriorette season was brought to a finish in second round play of district action against the Alma Cardinals.

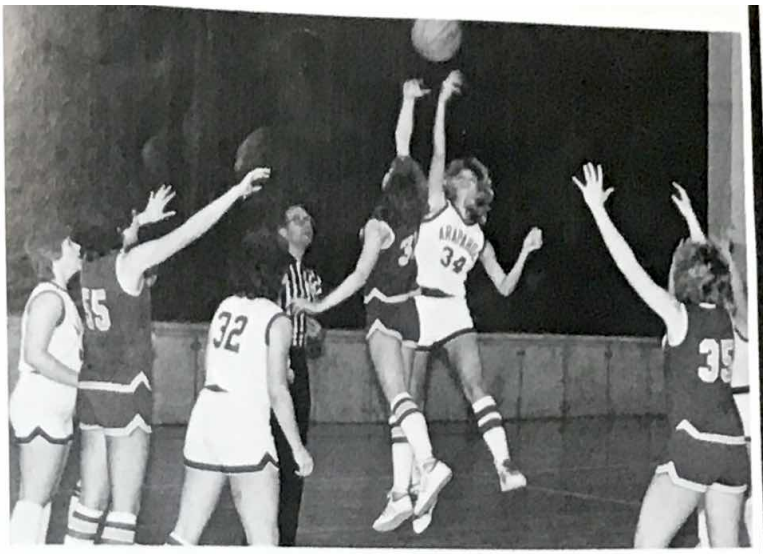

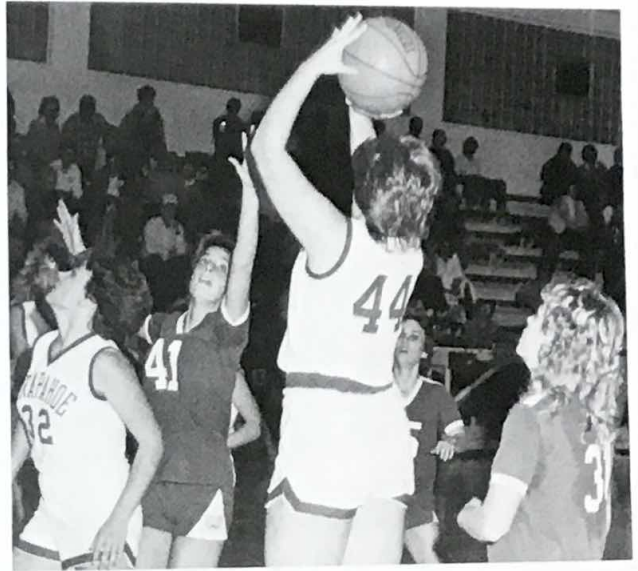

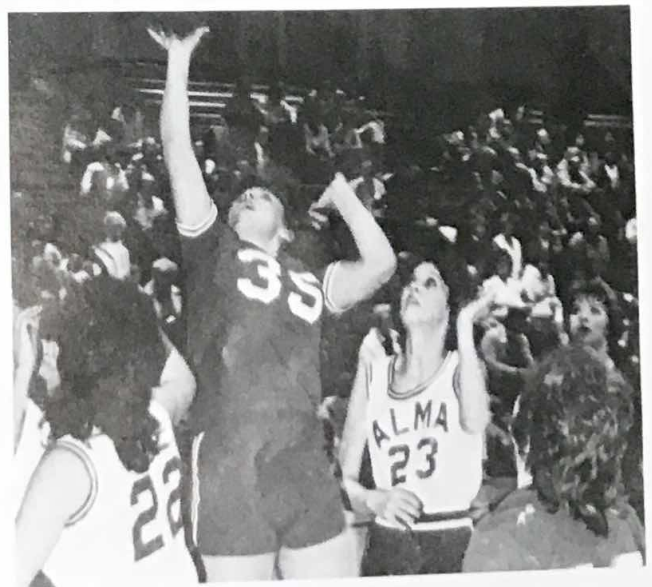

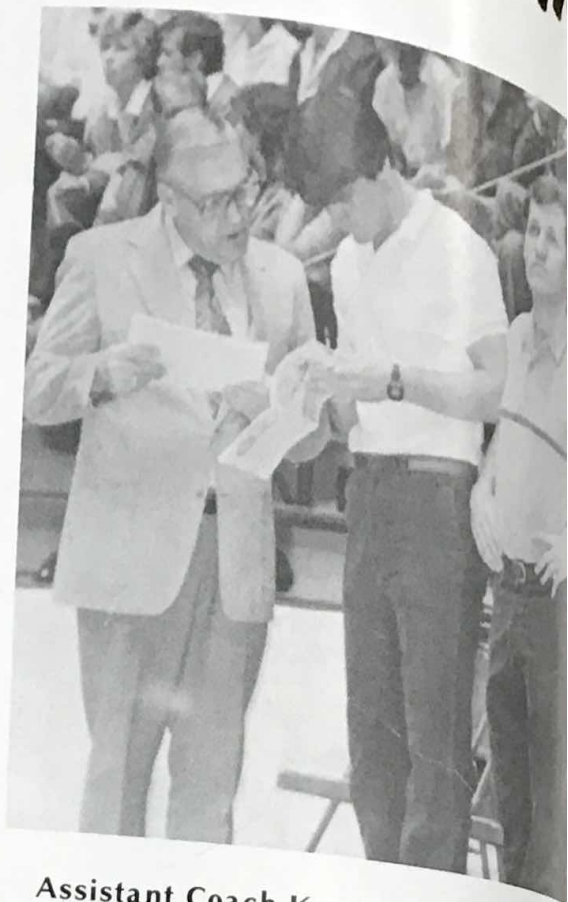

# Arapahoe Thinclads Reign as RVC Co-champs

Successful is the word used to describe the Warrior and Warriorette 1984 track seasons as both teams came home with Co-Champion trophies from the RVL Conference meet. Senior Rod Whipple and junior Tye Doll led the Warriors to finish in the top five

as a team in every meet. Whipple ran the 200 meter dash in 23.3 and the 100 meter dash in the school record breaking time of 11.4. He also anchored the 400 meter relay, consisting of members Scott Weber, Todd Schutz and Shane Morse, setting a school re-

cord with the time of 45.7. Doll threw the discus 162' to shatter the school record and heaved the shot put 46' 2" for his best effort. Morse, running the 400 meter dash, and underclassman Jeff Cross competing in the triple jump, also added to Warrior scoring. They also ran the 3200 and 1600 meter relays combining with Weber and Schutz to post season bests at 8:48.2 and 3:35.6, respectively.

The Warriorettes also placed well at meets, bringing home the RVL runner-up trophy after defeating the third place finishing team by one point. Distance runner Julie ten Bensel and hurdler Lisa Markus made the record board, setting records in the 3200 meter run - 12:08.1 and 300 meter low hurdles - 53.8, respectively. ten Bensel and Markus were also competitive in the 1600 meter run and 100 meter low hurdles, running their best times at 5:38 and 16.4. Becki Hinton also was an asset to the Warriorette cause, placing in the 200 and 400 meter dashes consistently. Hinton also ran on the 1600 meter relay with JoLene Monter, Alicia and Alanna Schutz, running their best time at 4:26.1. Monter, Schutz and Schutz combined with Camilla Nordwall to form the 3200 meter relay, placing well in every meet. Junior Tye Doll was Arapahoe's only medal placer. Doll's first and best throw of 152' 11" let him come home with a third place medal.

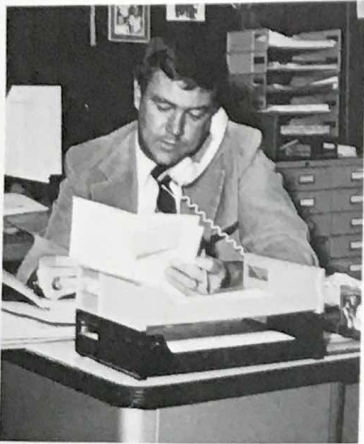








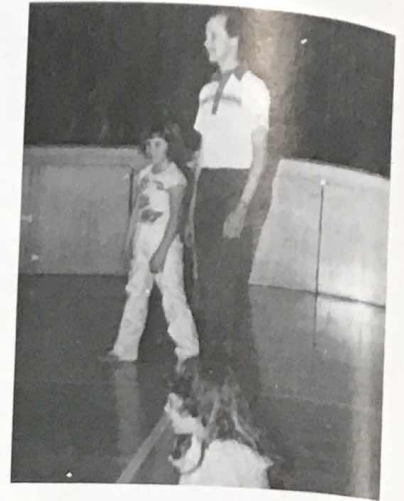
