




Dear Friend,



To conclude their year, the juniors helped with graduation activities.











Becky Maline and Gina Wolzen received excellents in both contests with their Duet Acting.






The AHS Drill Team perfected nine routines for the enjoyment of the audience at home activities.

Prior to camp, they held a few fund raisers to help defray the cost of camp and their new outfits. They hosted a slave auction and a bake sale.












Above: The Drill Team show their head moves to the audience.


The setting of the play is a run-down cabin deep in the Kentucky hills where Paw Belsnickle and his family re-





# SENIORS HAVE GREAT SUCCESS WITH "YOU'RE ONLY YOUNG ONCE"


The Senior Class had a great success with their play and dinner theater, "You're Only Young Once" which they presented under the direction of Pam Breinig.



The Arapahoe Warriorettes took a giant step from last year, with a 6-8 record for the season.


The basketball girls, with the coaching strategy of Dave Owen and his assistant Charles Collins advanced their teamwork and team wins.

Nine girls were named as letterwinners and Gina Wolzen received Second-Team All-Conference.







Junior David Watson was credited with 15 steals and 33 assists. Senior Joe Coakley accounted for 13 steals and 28 assists.



Warrior Matthew Bellamy received Second-Team RVL Conference honors for his


