...**Matt** and **Brad** 'looking at the shrubbery' during the "Sound of Music."

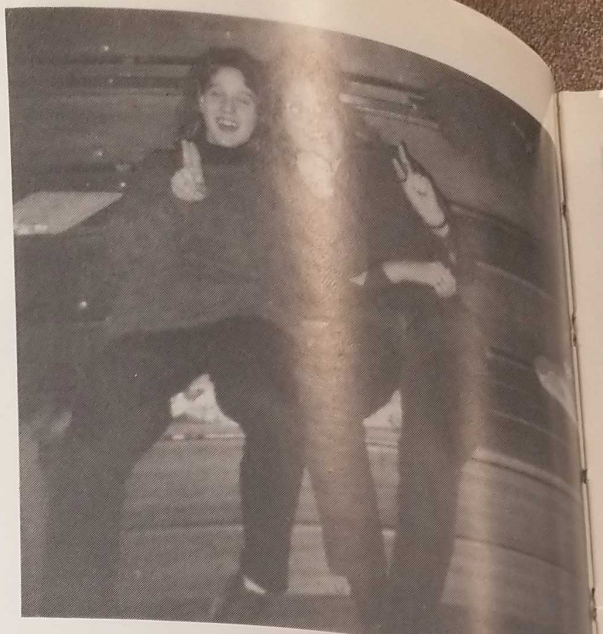

...**Grant** was in shop and started hopping around and hollering because his pants were on fire.

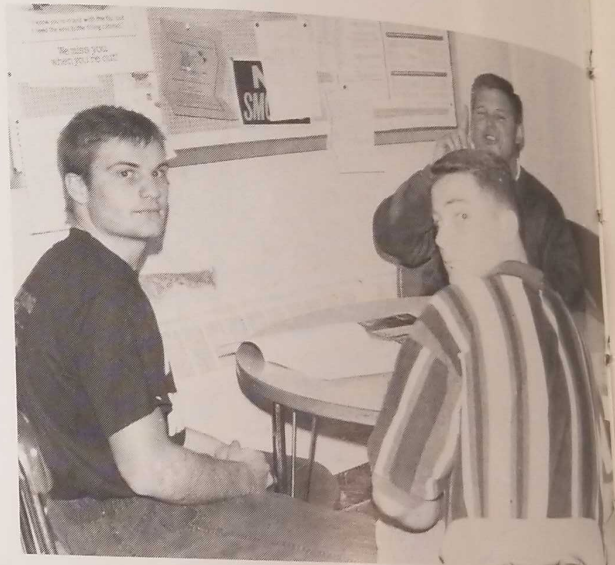
...**Lisa** hit a pole in the school parking lot on the morning of district wrestling and made all the wrestlers late for weigh-ins.

"My feelings just changed overnight."

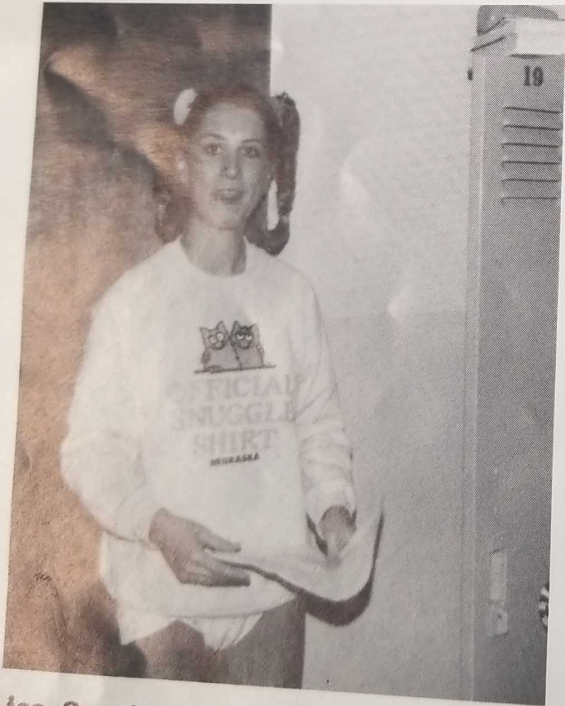

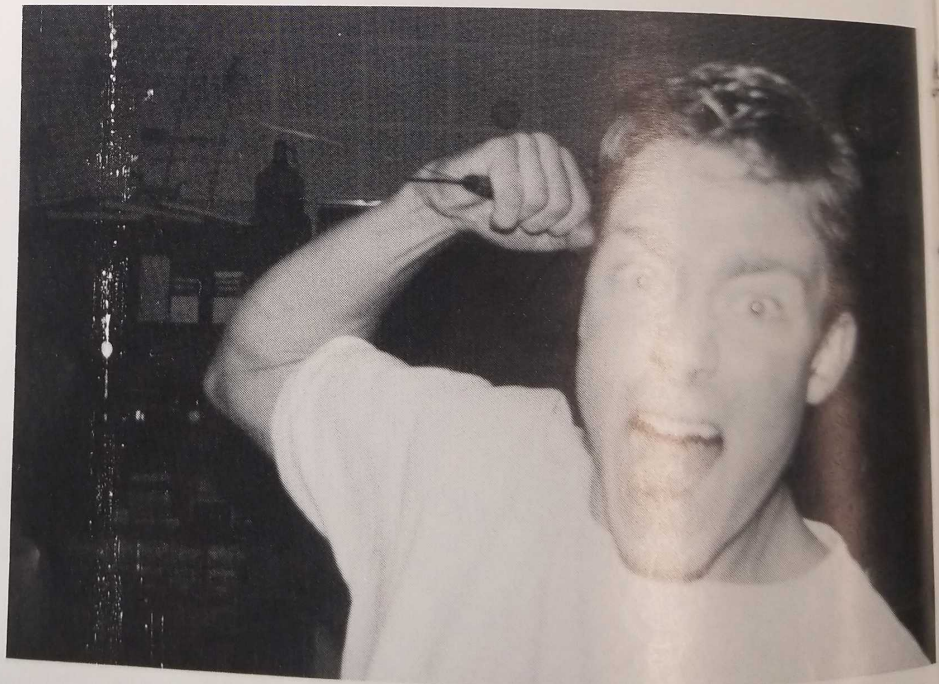

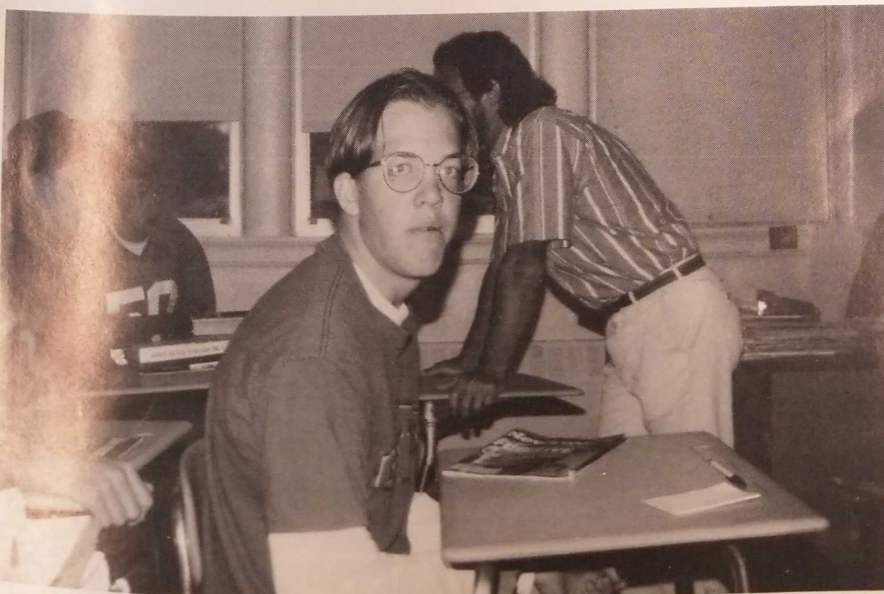

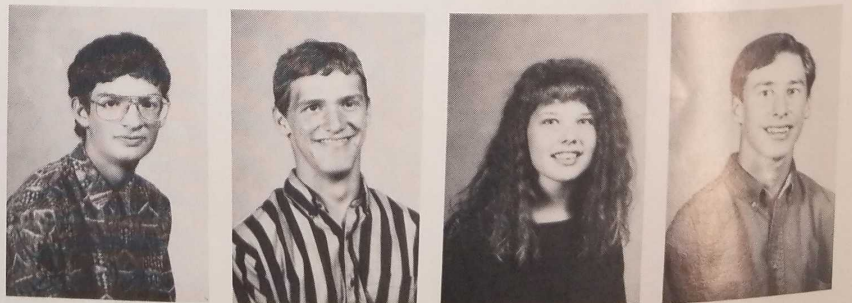
Excuses, Excuses!

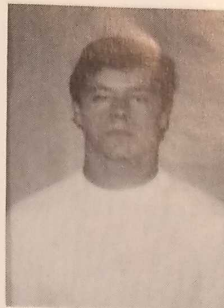

- __ "The guys made me!"

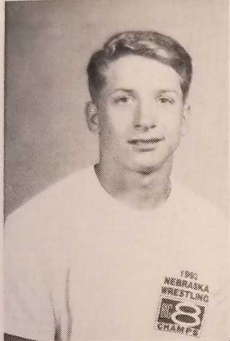
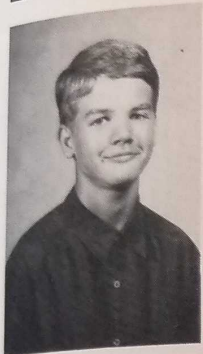

The two major subjects that they made excuses about were homework and driving illegally.

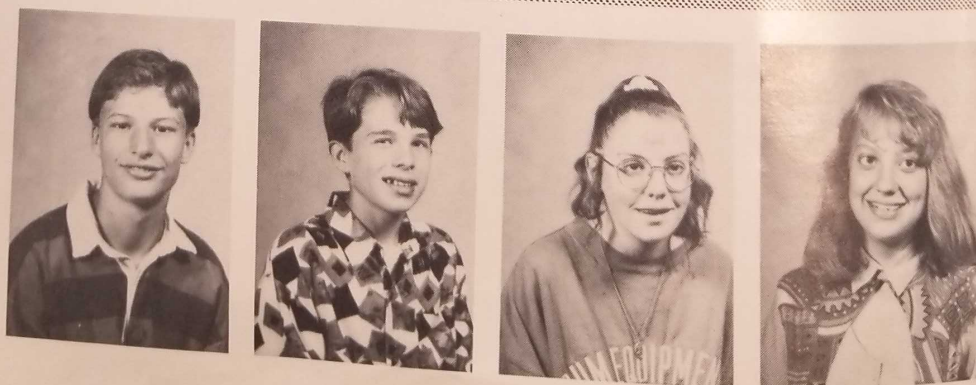
One student commented that his best excuse for not having his homework done was, "Aliens from the galaxy of Berouth took it for fuel for their spaceship."

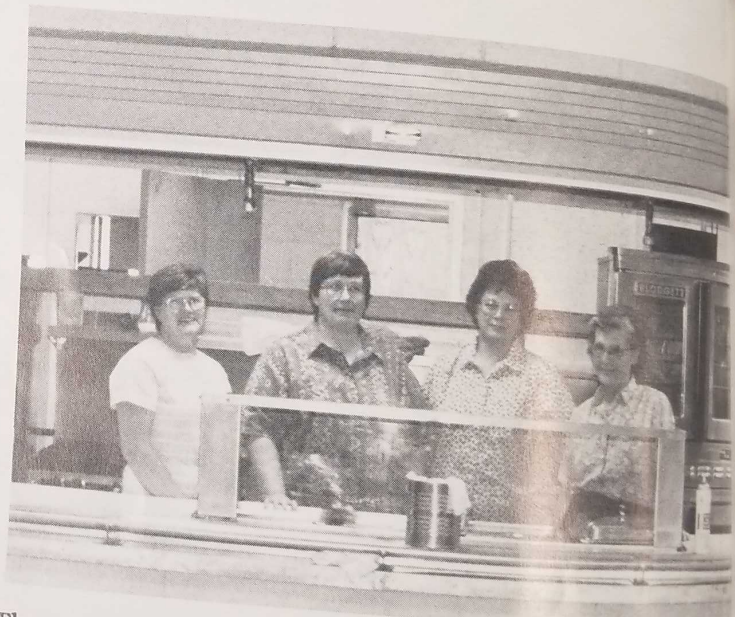


Supporting Staff: What is it?

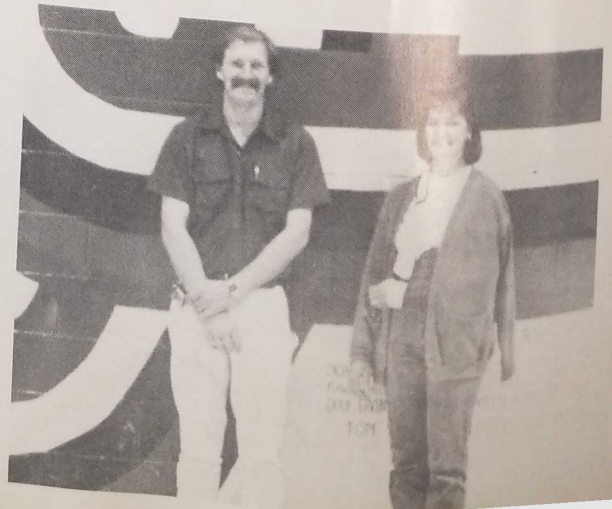

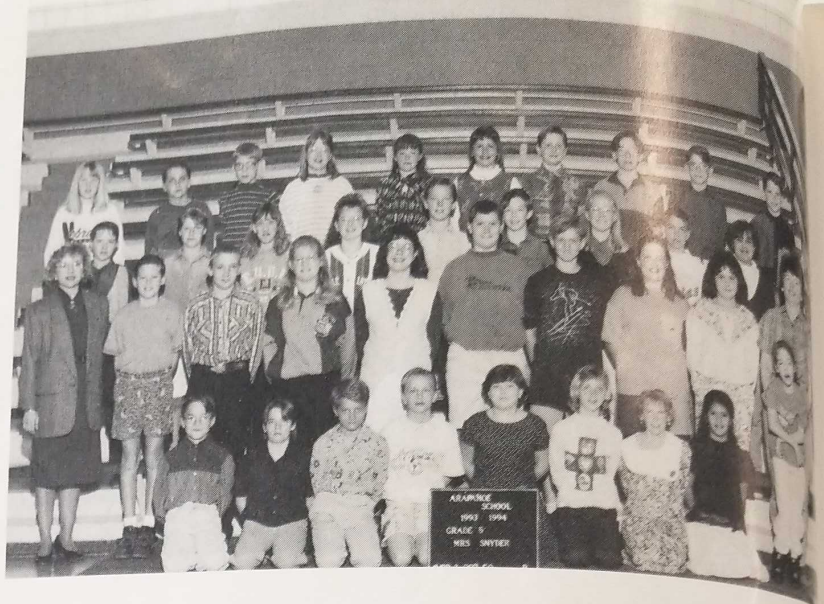

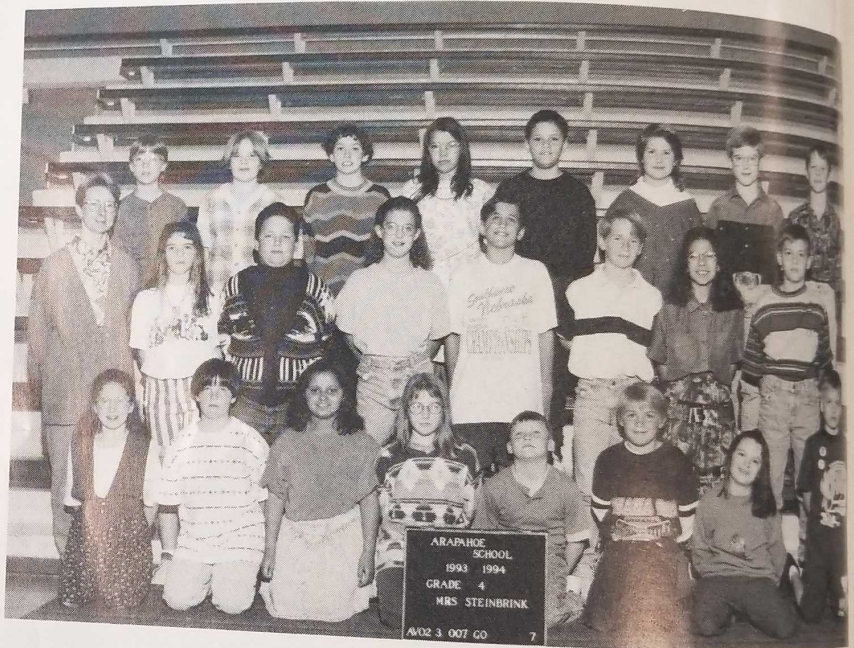

Speech Team Breaks New Territory

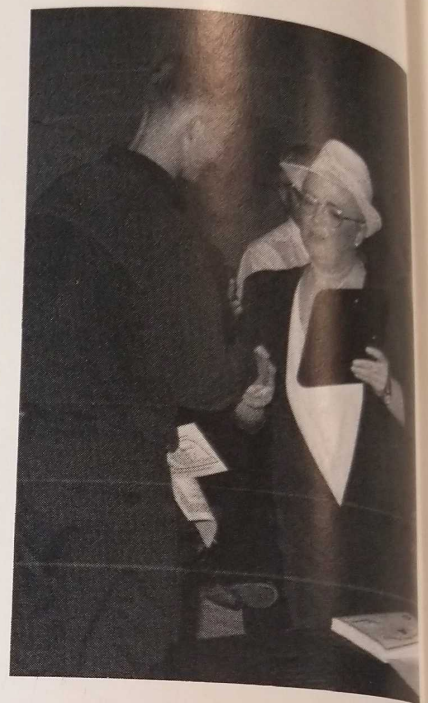
The Speech Team broke new territory with outstanding performances that enabled them to capture top places at many tournaments.

the musical and ending with a superior at District Music Contest."

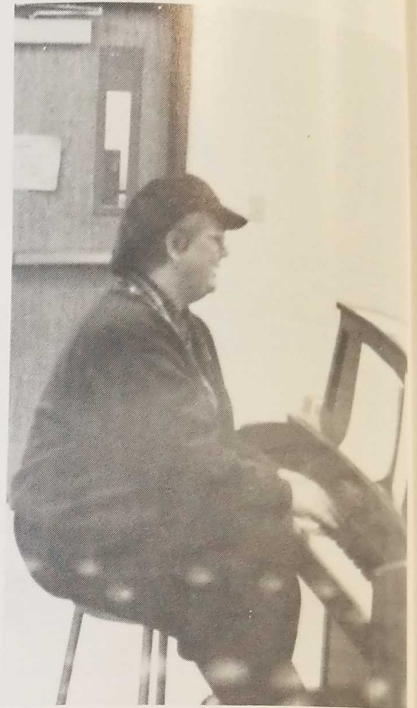

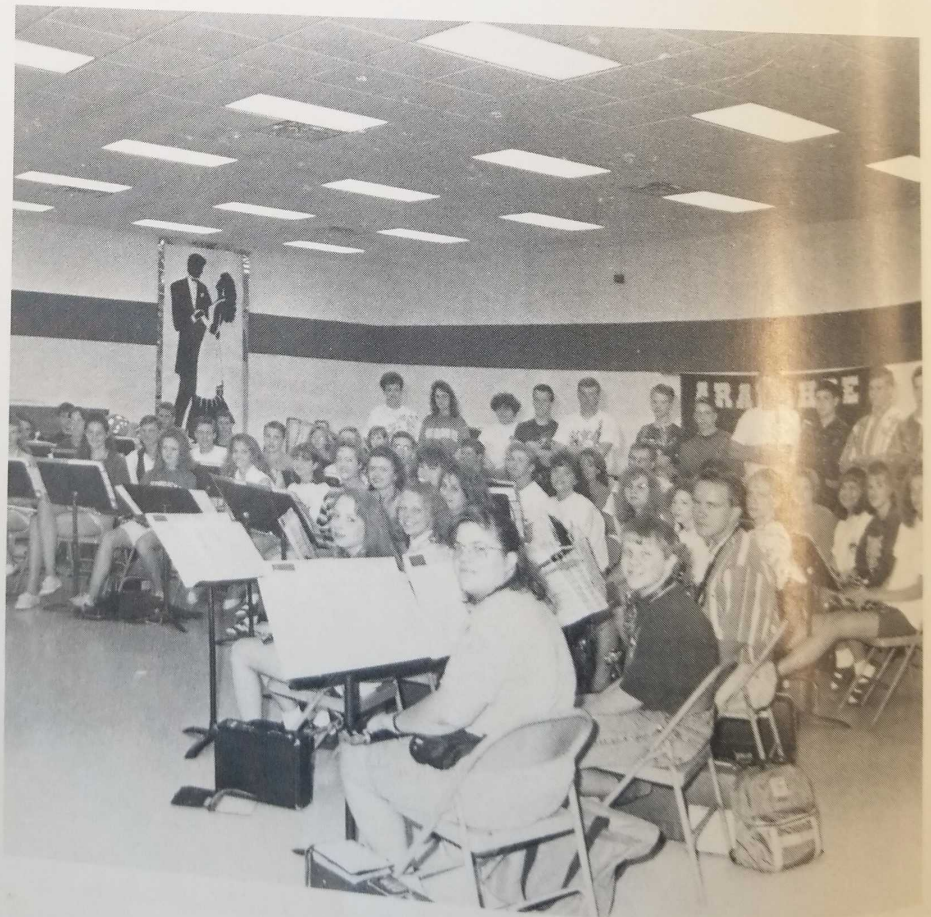
There was at least one performance per month that the band played for, sometimes more in the heart of pep band season. March was designated as "Music in our Schools Month," it was also the busiest time of the year.

French course and psychology offered at our school.

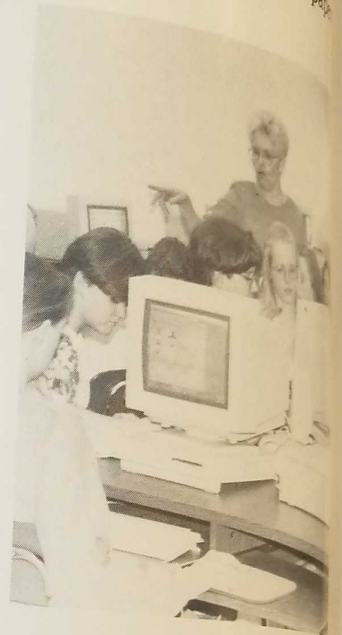
One's room was the most popular place to study. There were some more creative places mentioned though. For instance, one said that he liked to study by the dryer, and another said he

Seems that some of the students here at AHS are thinking a lot more than others, but all in all they all are at least thinking!

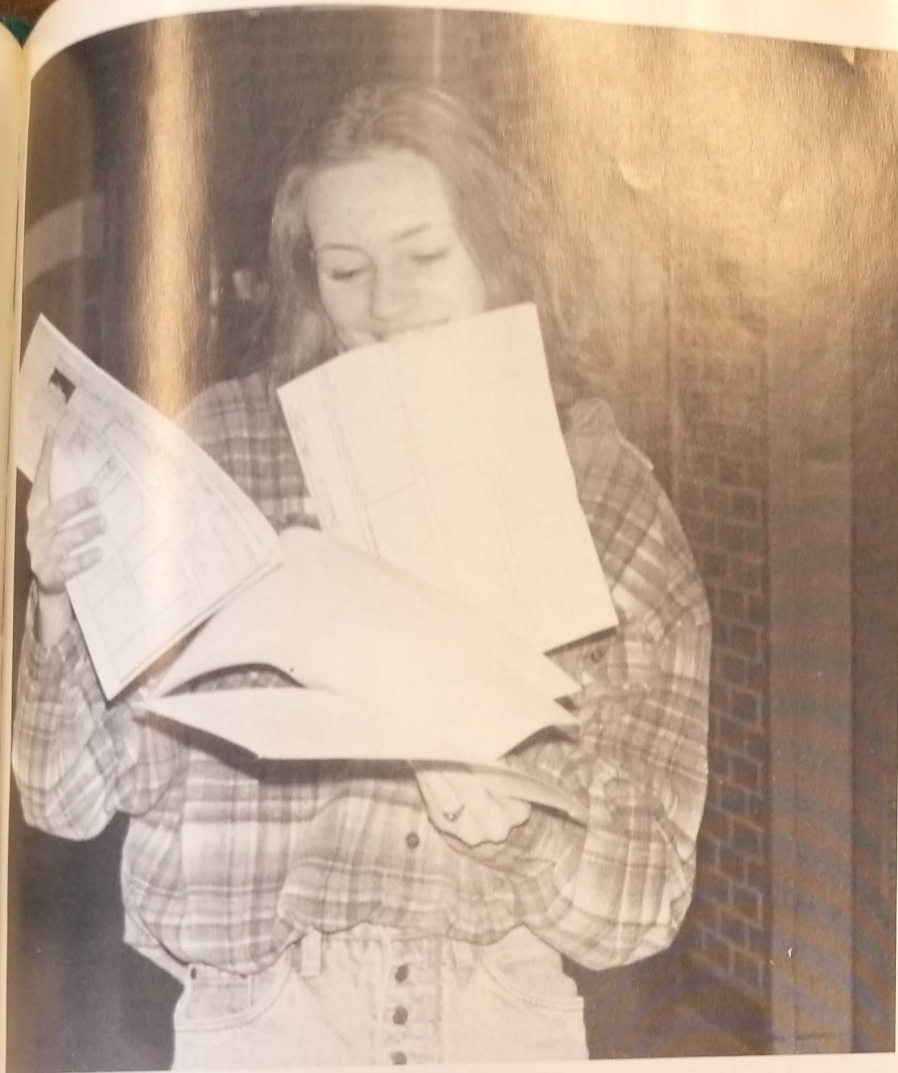
"I think students should take courses in high school that will relate to their planned major in college," said senior **Dana Fisher**.

The next deadlines they

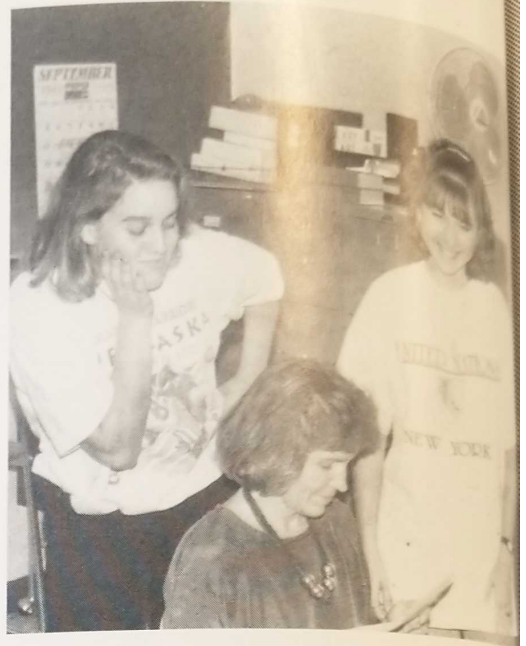
met were March 15 with 4 pages, May 3 with 36 pages, and June 21 with 24 pages.

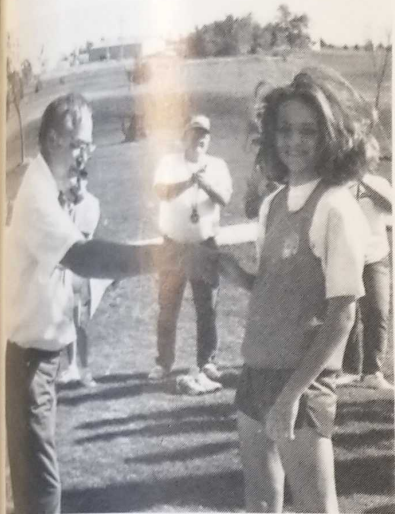

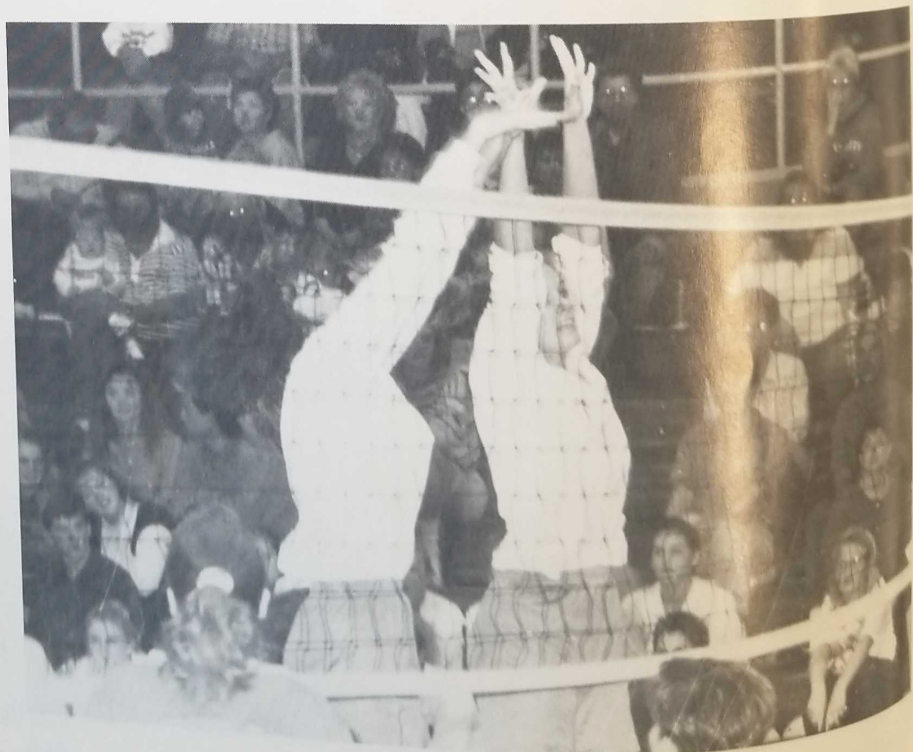

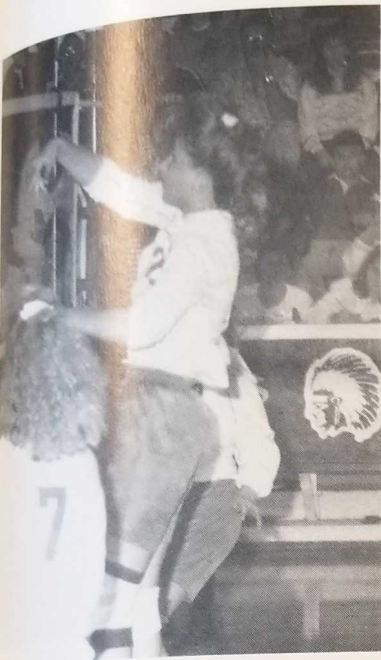

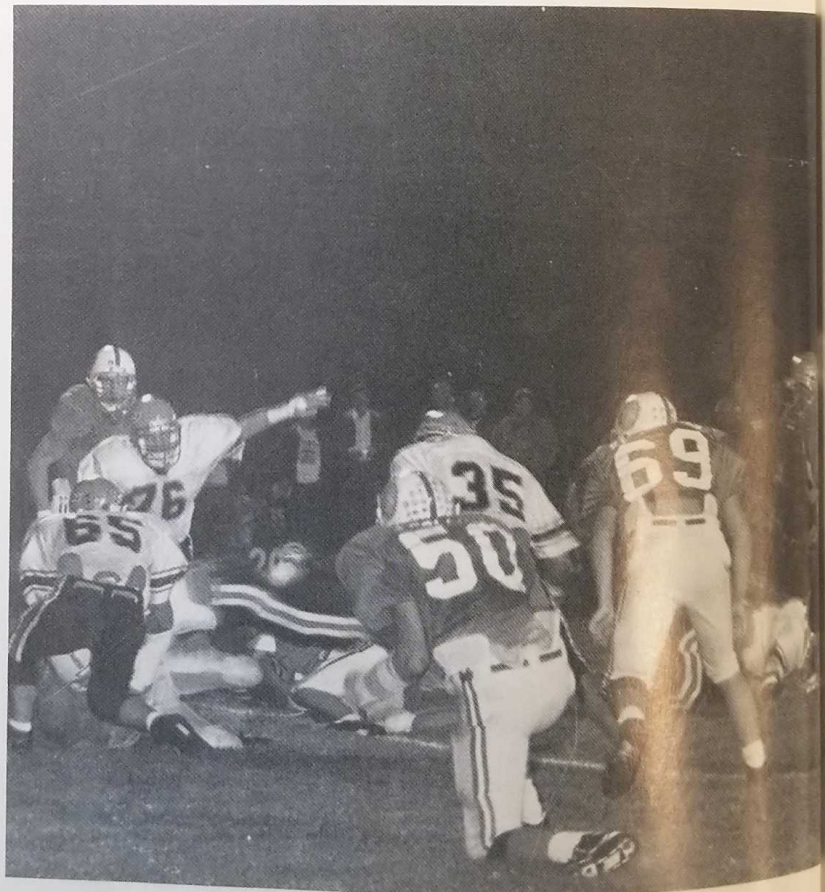

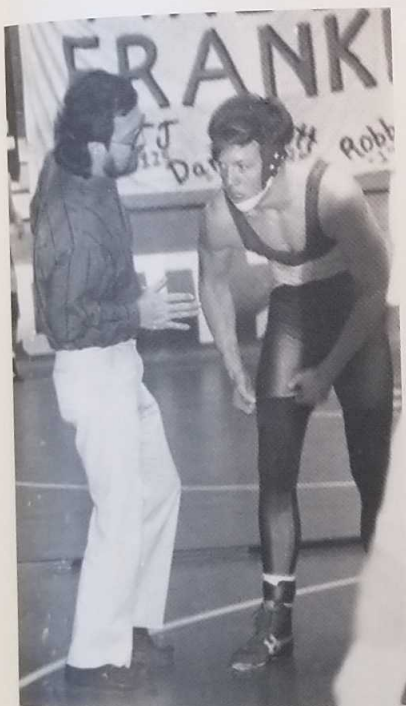

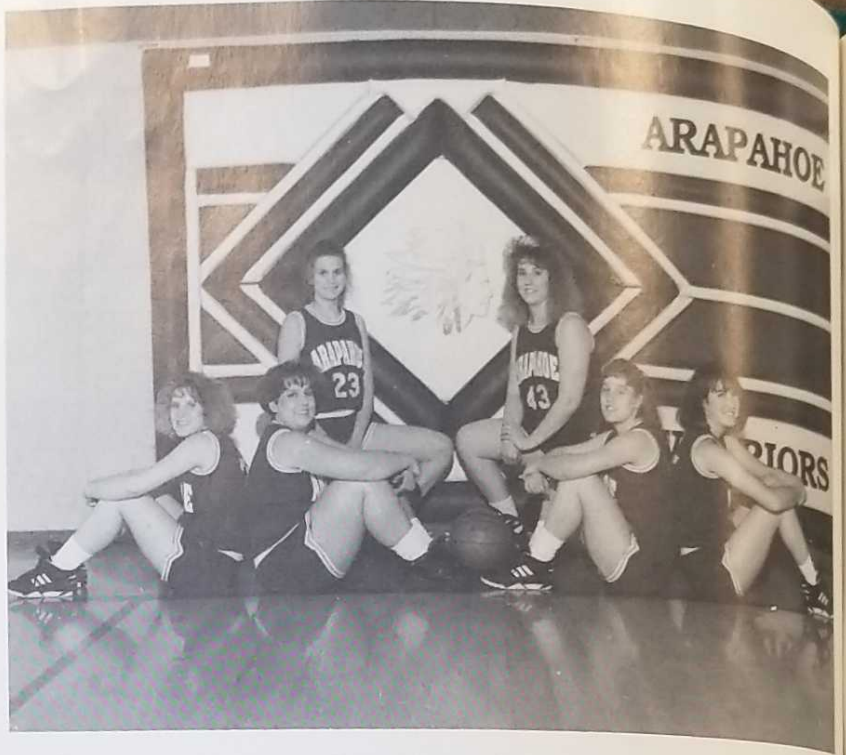

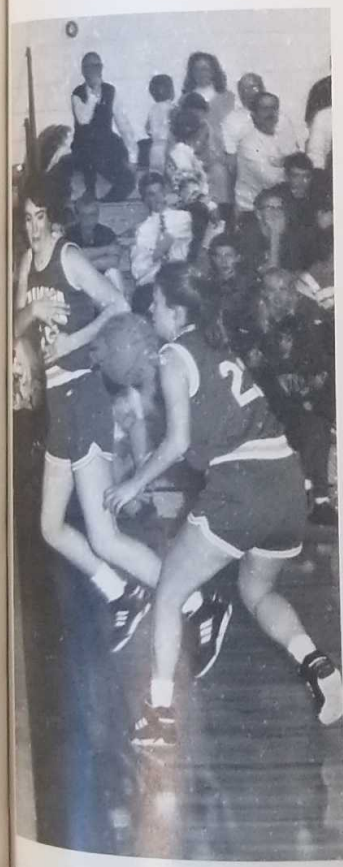
The Lady Warriors came back with nine returning letterwinners.

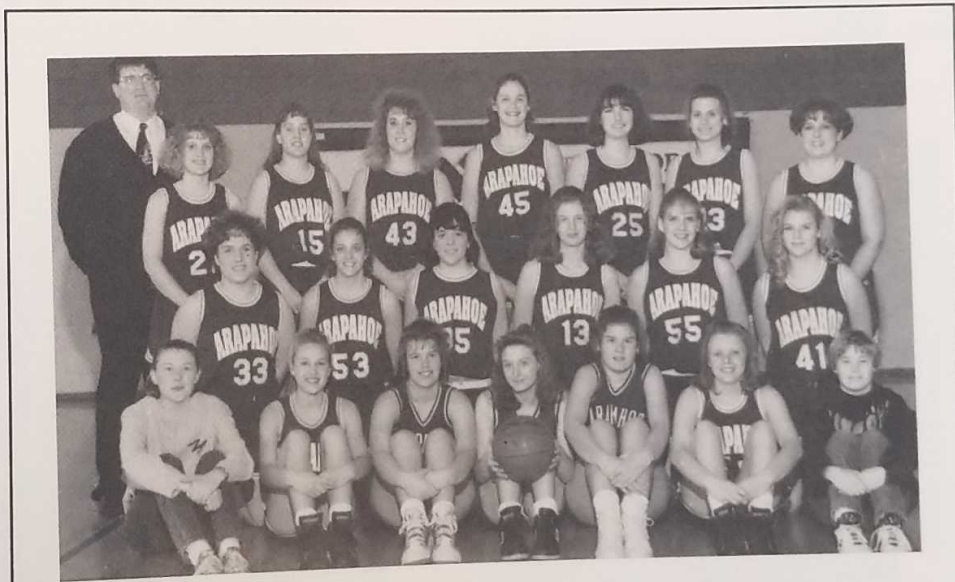

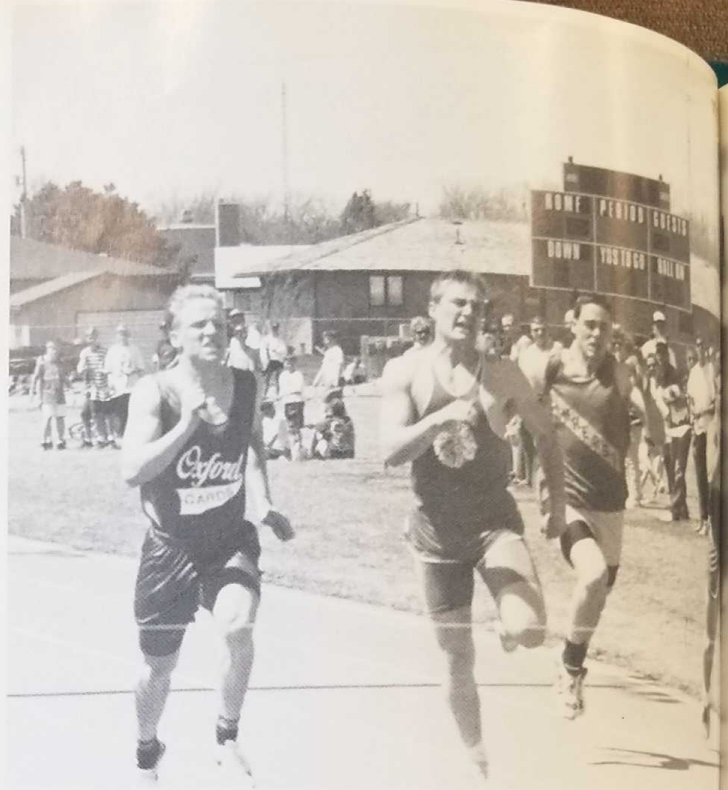

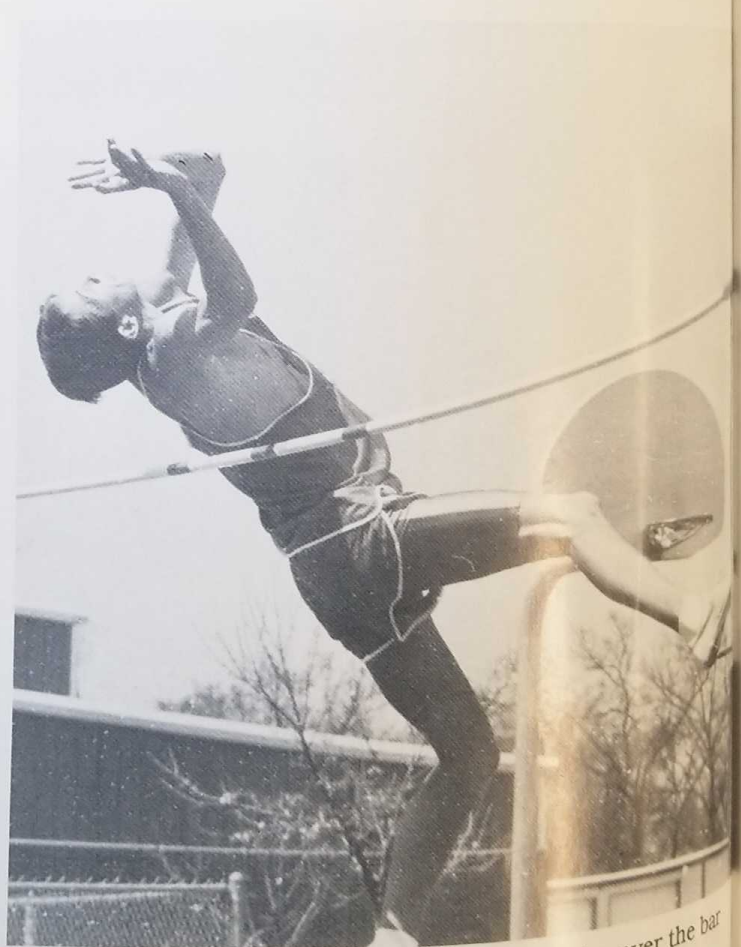


Aaron Blake sprints to the finish of the 100 meter dash. **Blake** goes on to qualify for the state meet.

Danny Warner and **Jared Breinig** also placed high in the agricultural categories at the inter-high day. **Irlee Stagemeyer** is the chapter adviser.

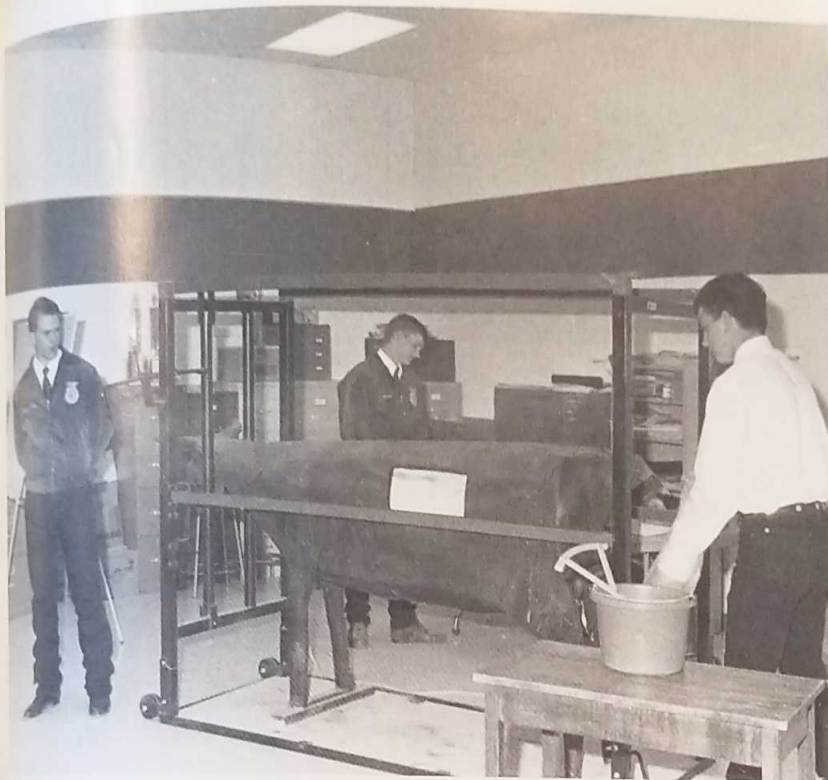

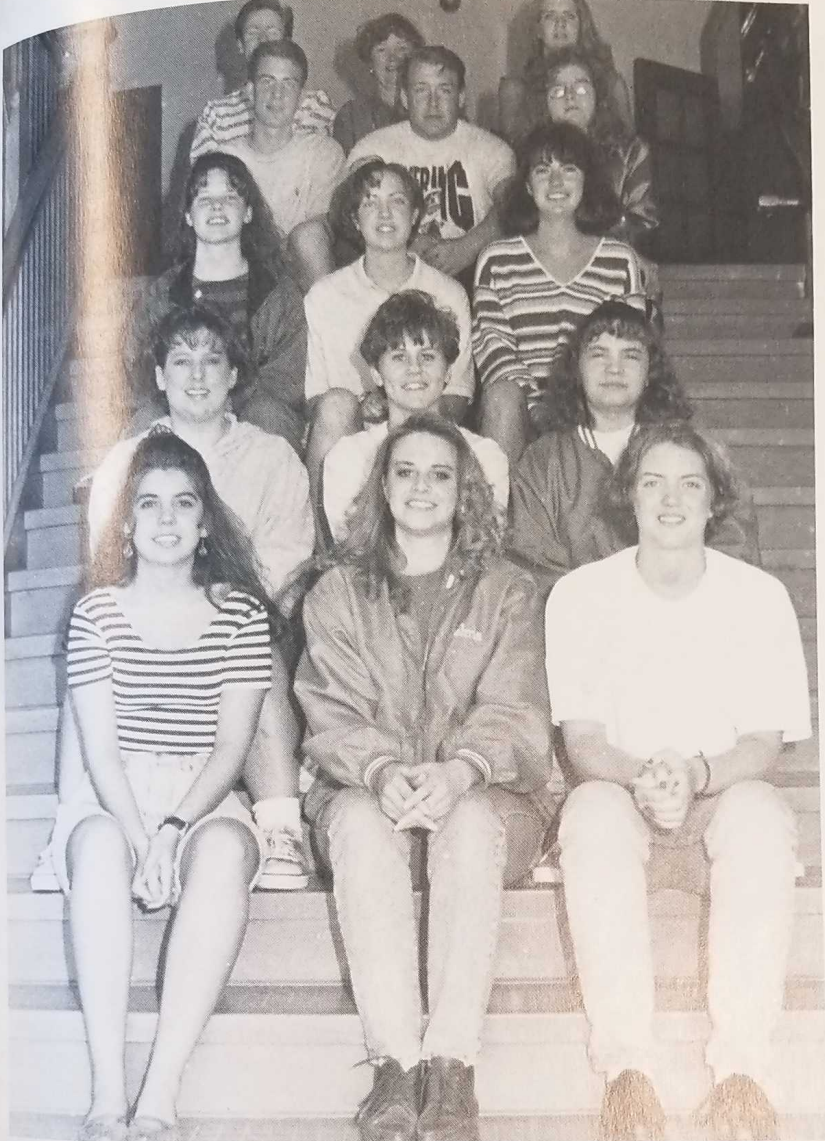

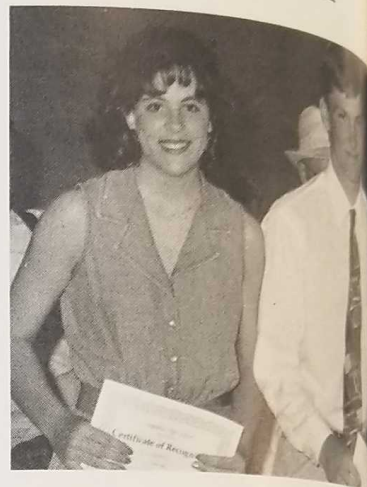
New Members Chosen to Academic Bowl Team

Academically, this year was one of new challenges for some, and new accomplishments for others.

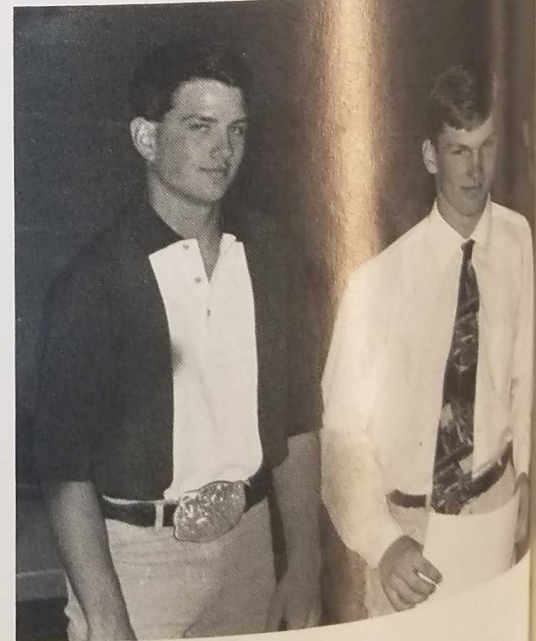

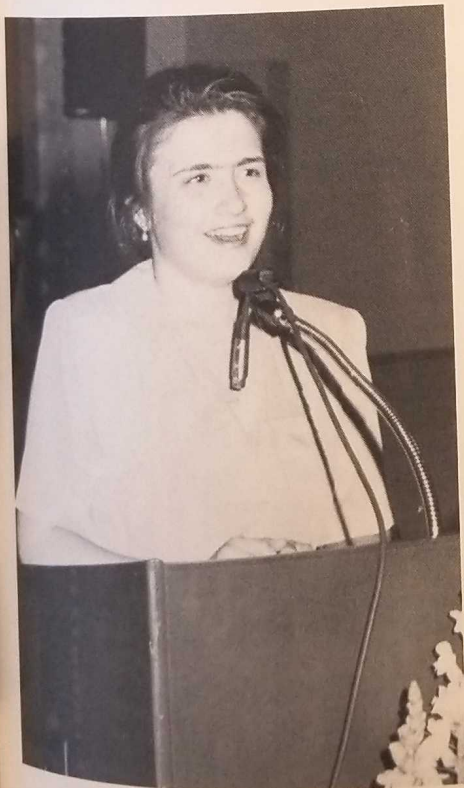
NHS Attracts High Achievers

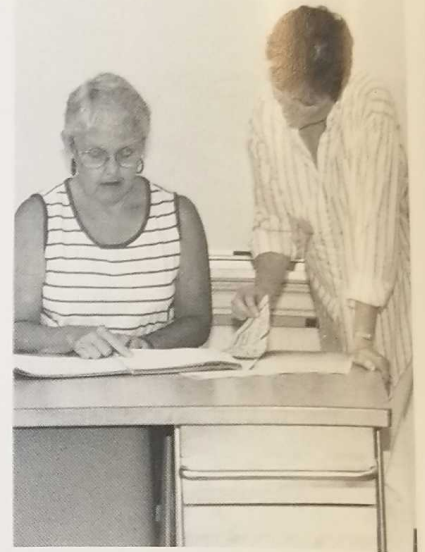
The Spring Fling was spent playing volleyball in the gym and later eating ice cream.

The Council also awarded a \$100 scholarship to be given to an outstanding senior. This year's recipient was **Nate Steinbrink**.

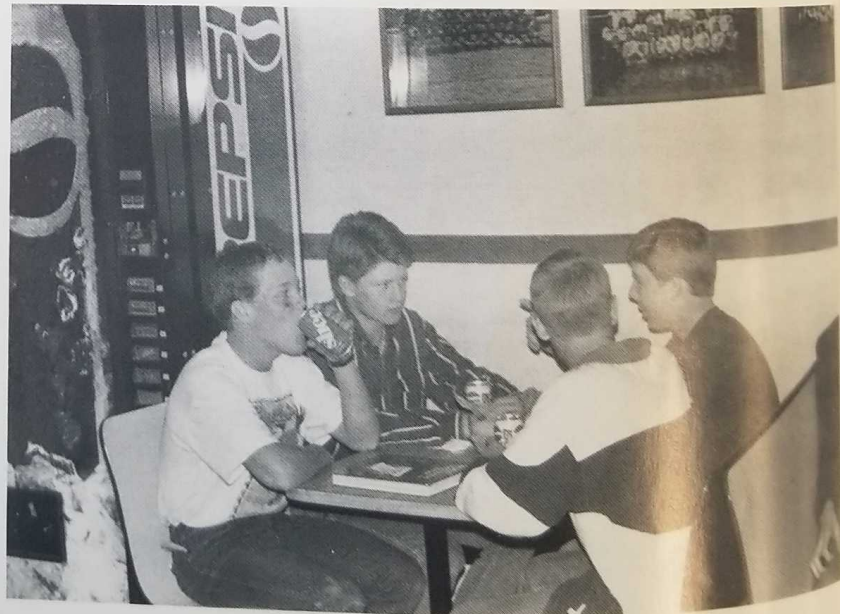

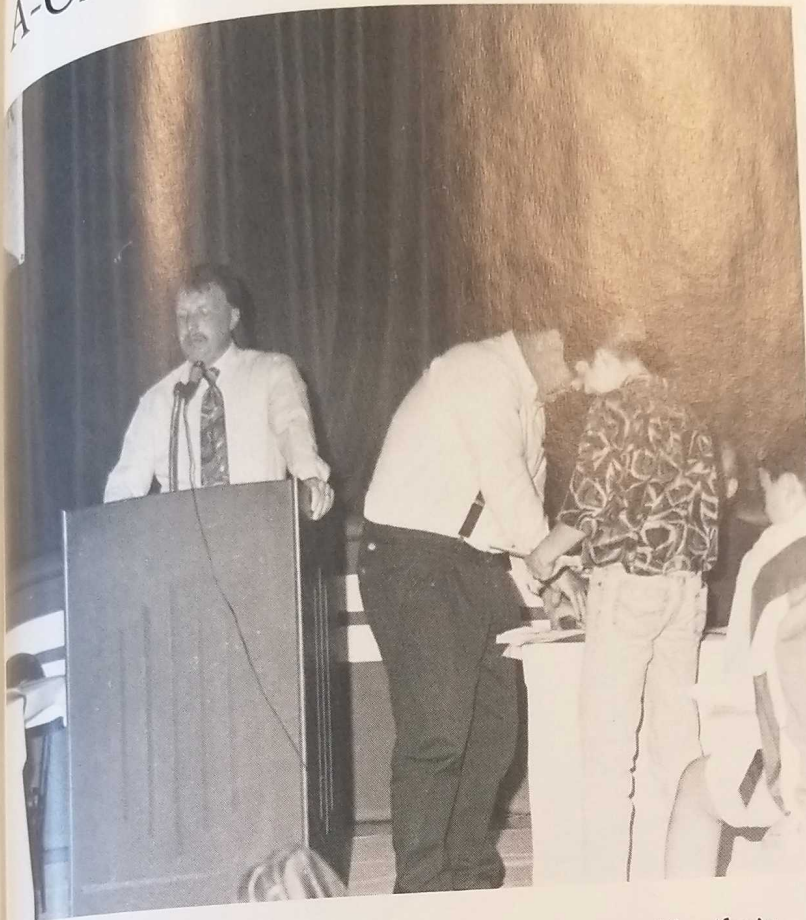

A-Club Holds Annual Activities at AHS



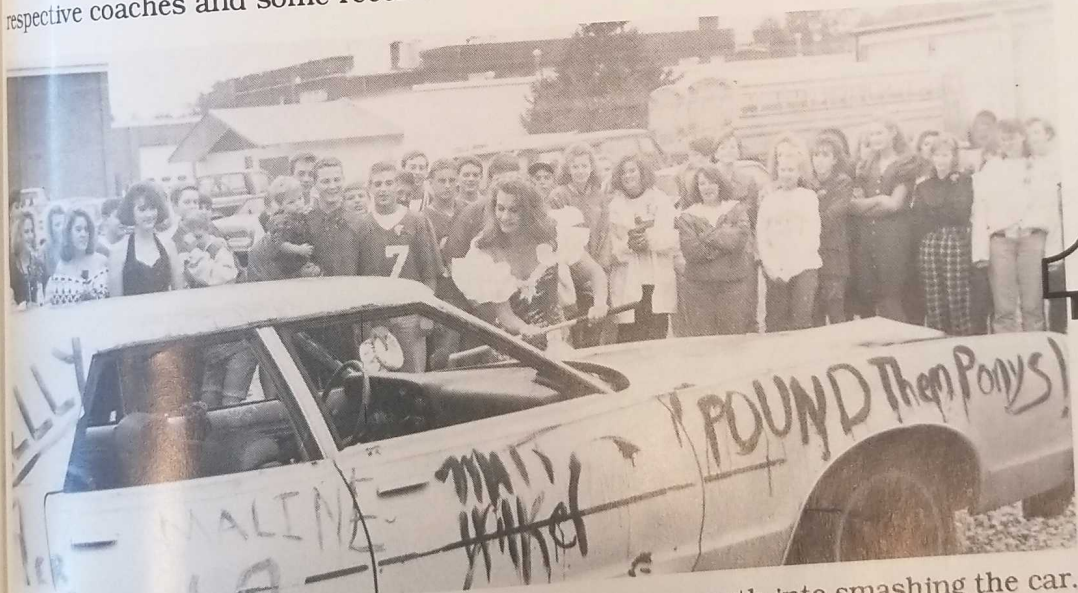
At the Athletic Banquet, many athletes were honored by their respective coaches and some received their letter 'A'.

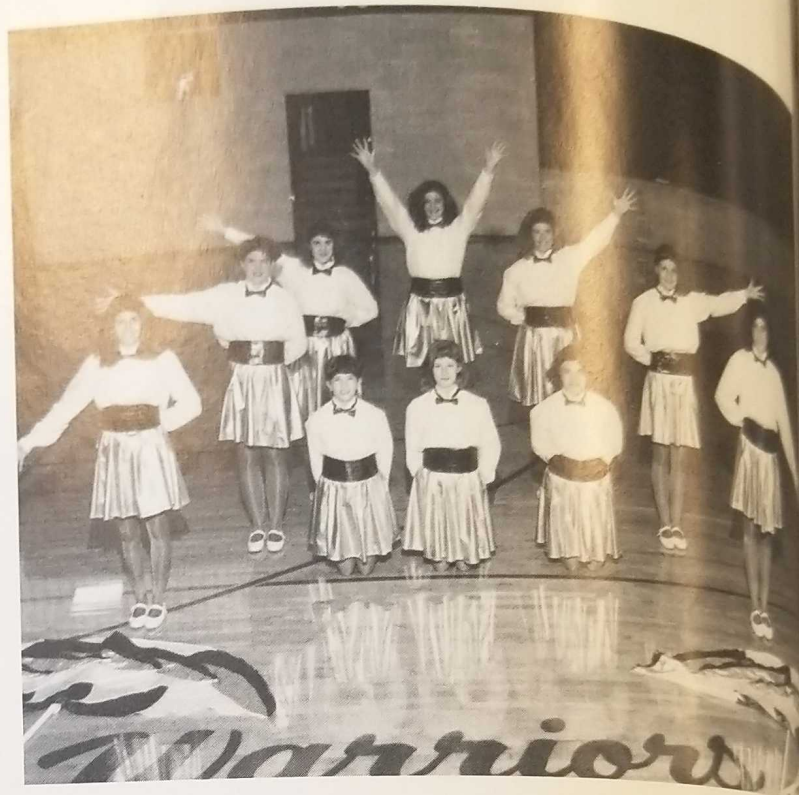
Flag Team Adds to Marching Band Season

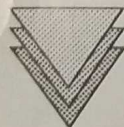
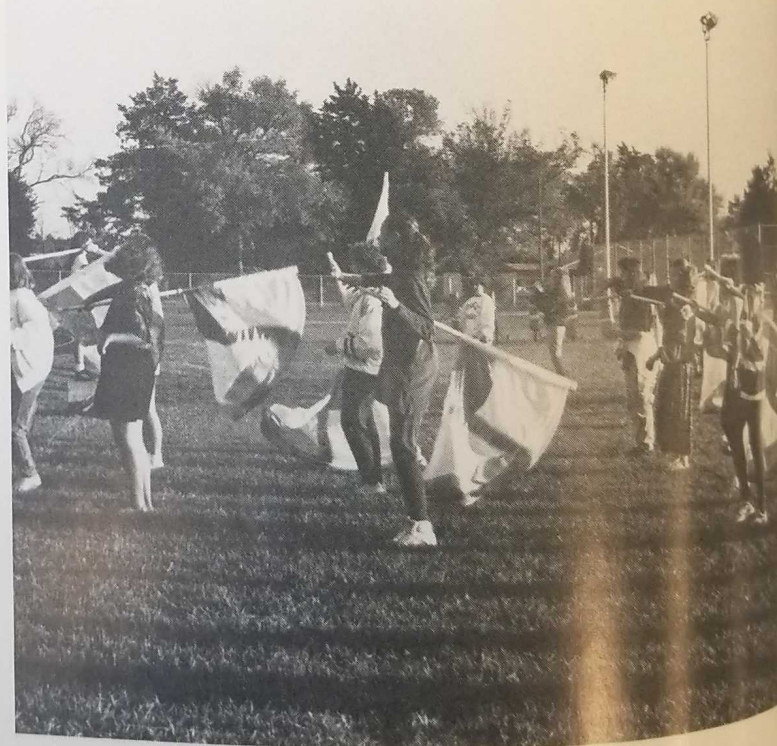
The team consisted of 10 girls, decked out in flashy attire consisting of metallic gold skirts, white tuxedo shirts and blue bowties and cummerbunds.

Ashley Mues and **Stephanie Martin** were captains of the team, leading them in competition and entertainment.

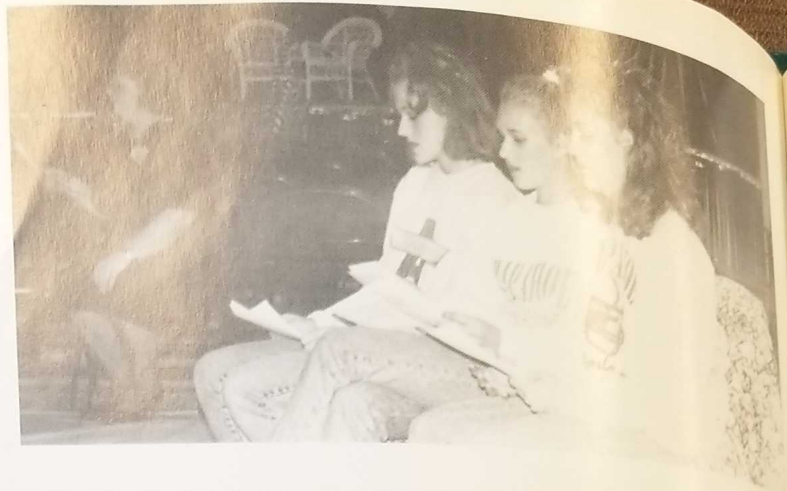

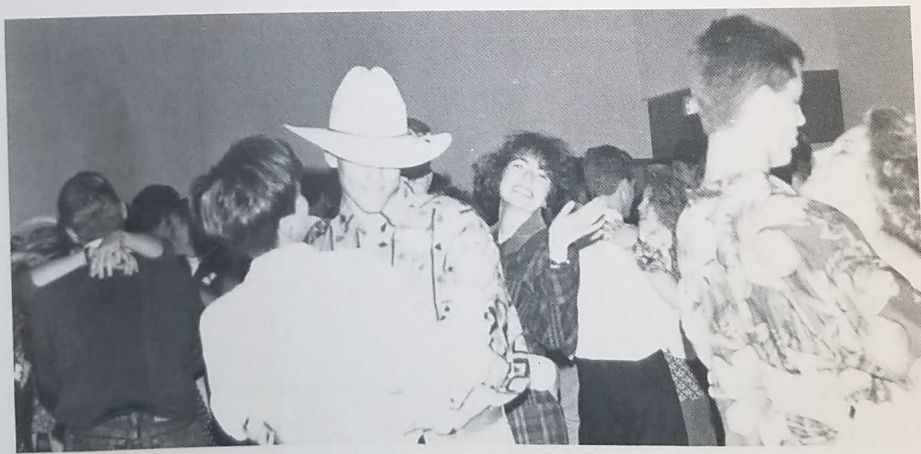

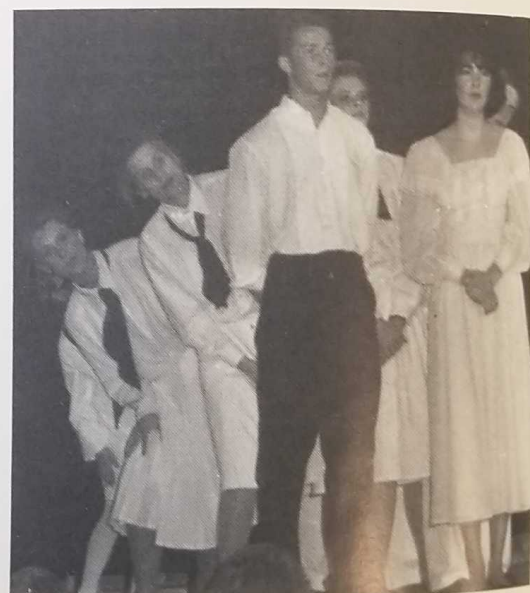

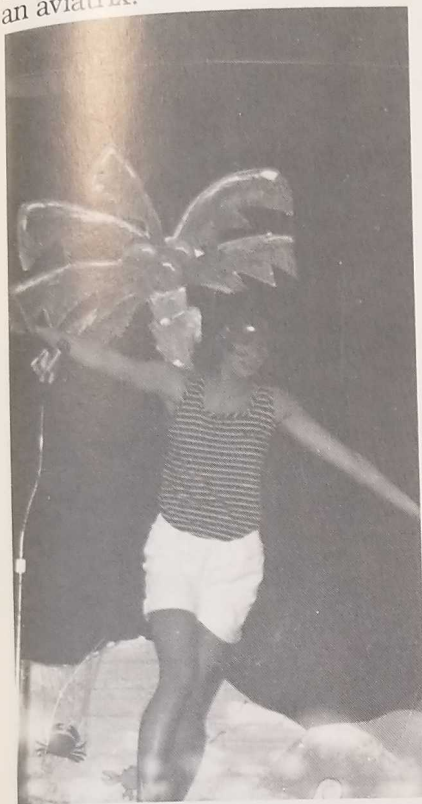

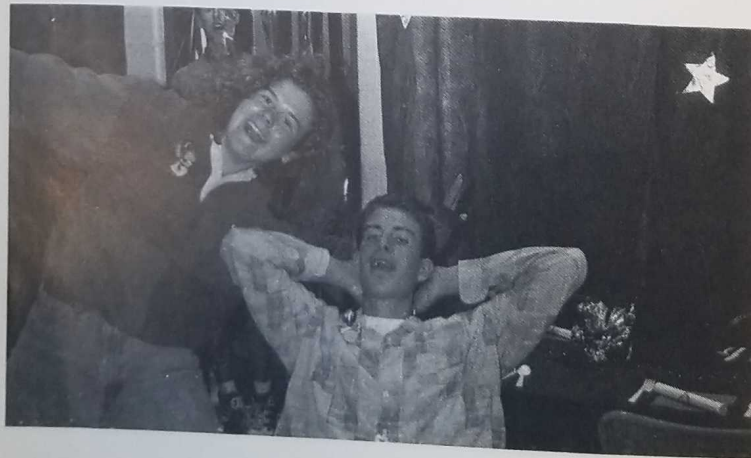
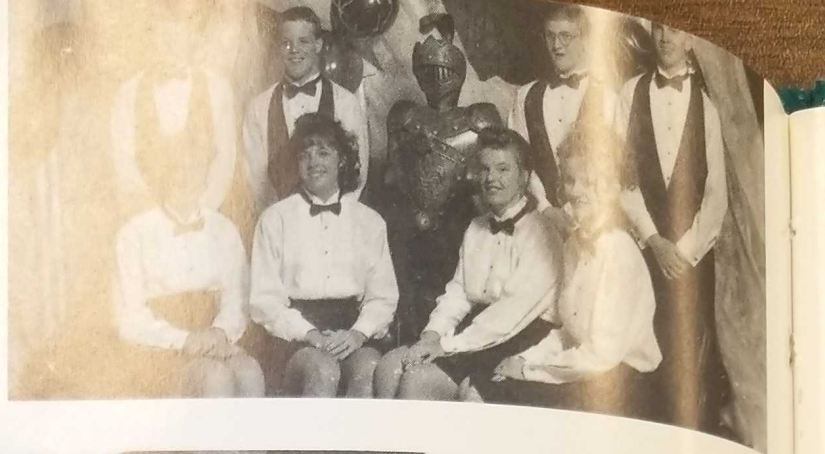

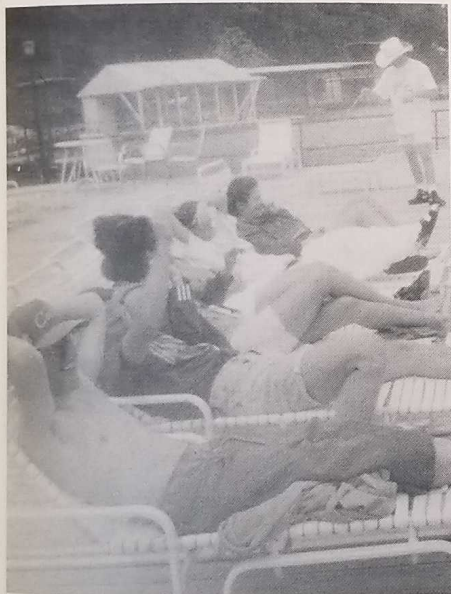
