



Seniors hope the 12:40 ritual will be continued by the underclassmen.


he class of 1995 found itself busier than ever before, leaving the seniors little time for anything more nutritious than a candy bar and pop.
















# Excellent Staff Keeps School Running


# Choir Completes Busy Year



"I'll never forget the time in biology when Lona Smith clipped the legs off a grasshopper and they landed on me!" said Casey Sander as she recalled a biology experience.









## Journalism Staff Masters Art of Publication

Japanese, taught by an exchange teacher Fumie Kachi, was an eightweek course in the fall semester.






## Matmen Capture Success

"All the kids kept improving during the season and by the end we had a solid team. It was another good season for the wrestling athletes of AHS," commented **Coach Barnes.** 




**ABOVE: Ronny Miller**, a senior and consistent placer for the Warrior squad, concentrates on initiating his next move.






**ABOVE:** Junior, **Cody Hill**, works to step away from his opponent and regain control on the mat.








