In the middle of the school year, the juniors got their first chance of becoming a star, in the Junior Class play, "Desperate Ambrose".

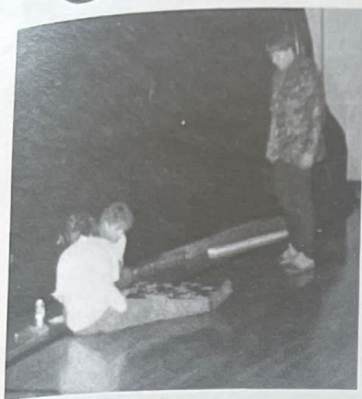
The juniors also got the responsibilities of being in charge of Prom, Prom candidates, Prom servers, and the band for Prom.

To end the year out, during graduation six juniors got elected to be ushers and processional leaders for the Senior Class.

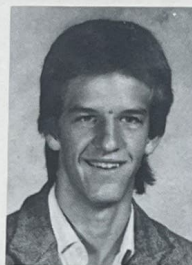

As a sophomore they begin to feel they can take on the responsibilities of a job. They have more freedom when they have their own spending money.

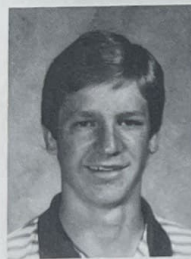

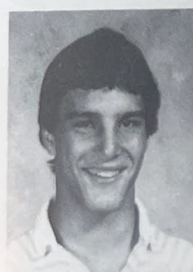

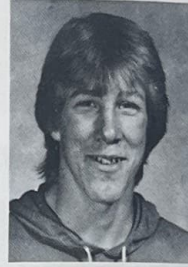
This year's freshmen had the honor of seeing or possibly playing on the football team during state play-off action, and this year also found two of the freshmen going to the state wrestling tournament.

Most students eventually found that the change from junior high to senior high was not as hard as they had anticipated, and that the seniors were not so hard to live with, once you learned that you listen to them or else!

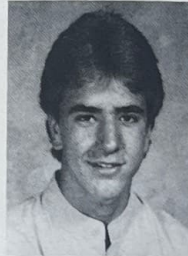
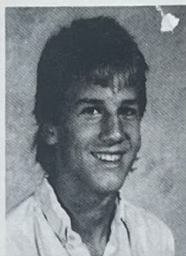

MATH

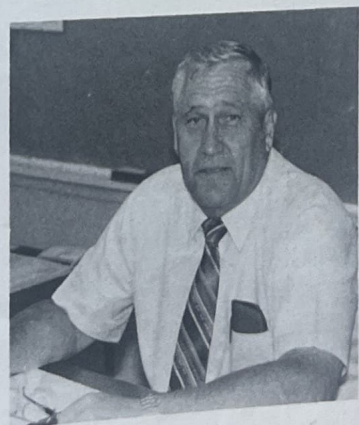

A raffle was held for a Cabbage Patch Kid, and was drawn at the end of the carnival.

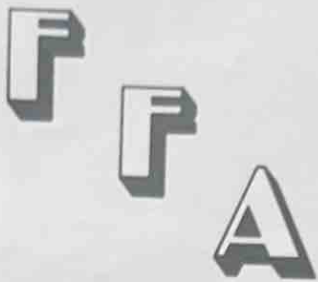
Much excitement and entertainment was given off throughout the carnival, and with the results of the enjoyment, a percent of the profits were sent to the March of Dimes.

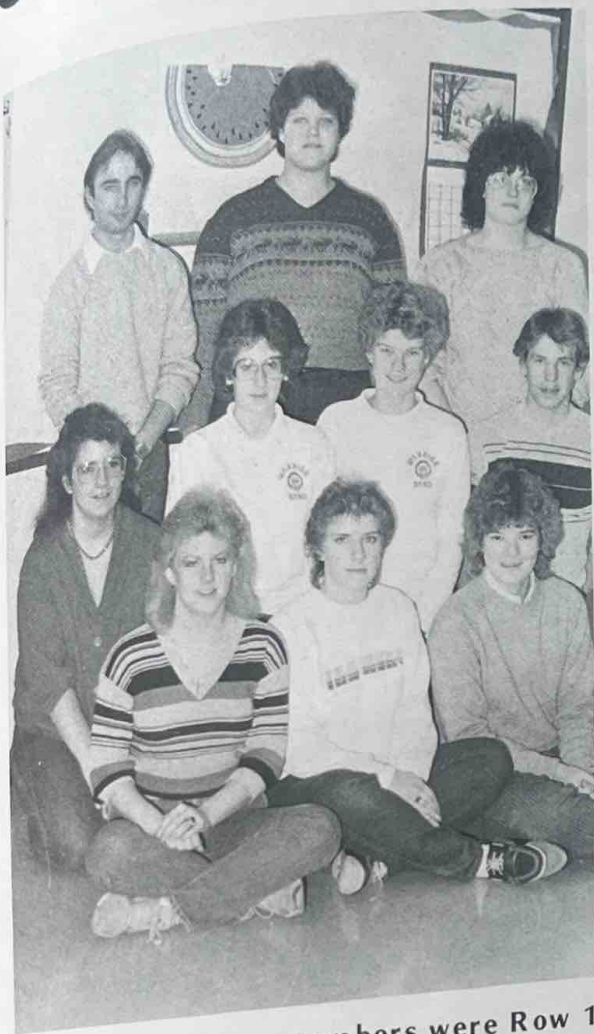

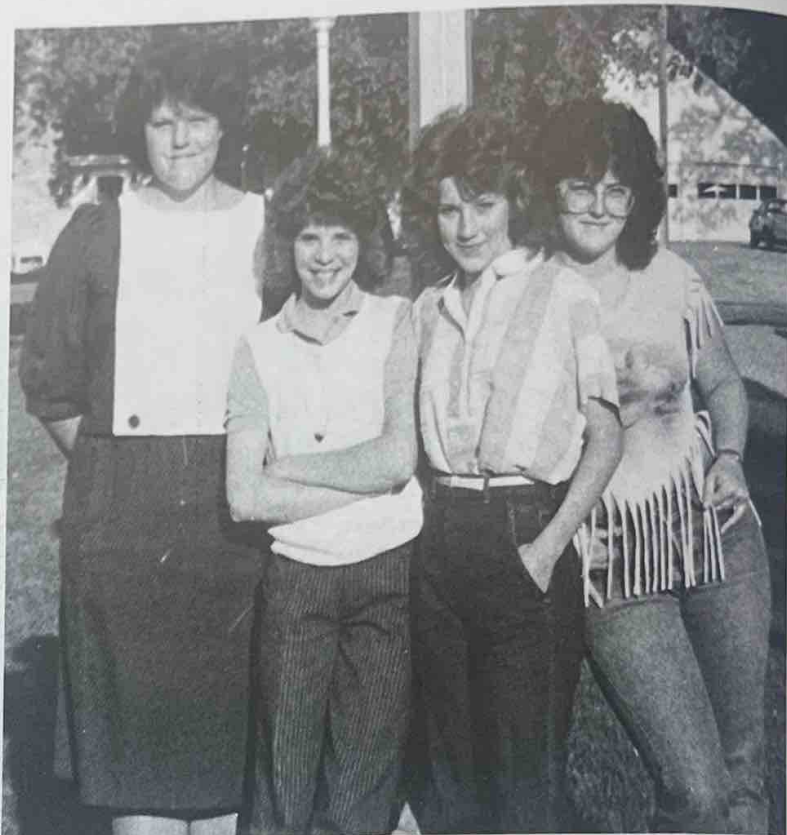
The Student Council finished their year by helping with the election of new members.

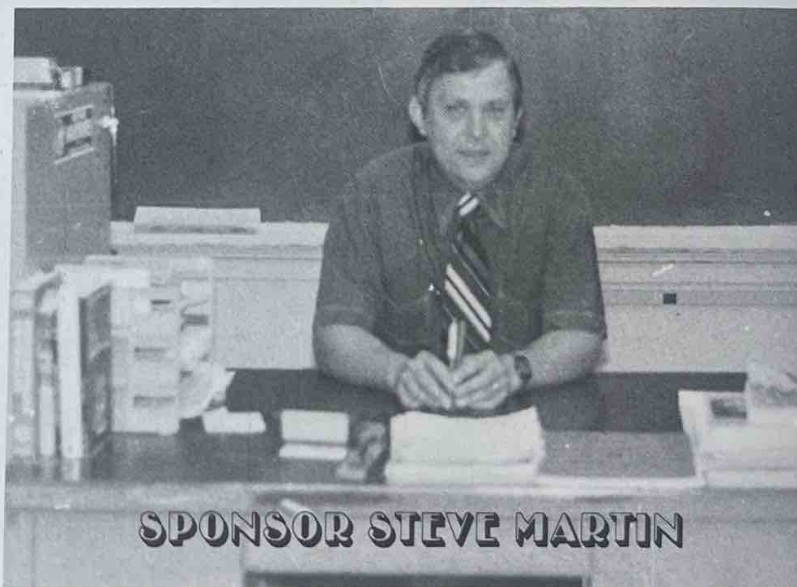
Although we did not qualify for State we gained a significant number of points to gain honorable mention.

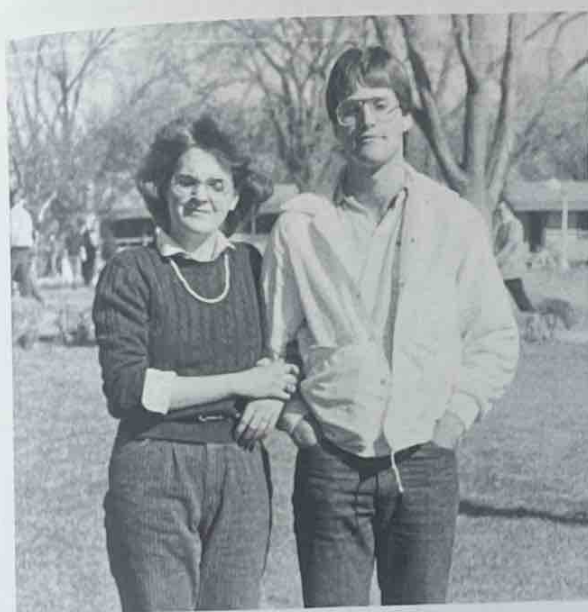

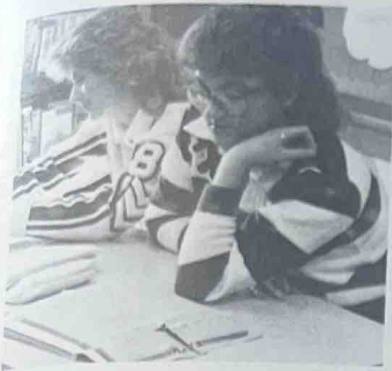

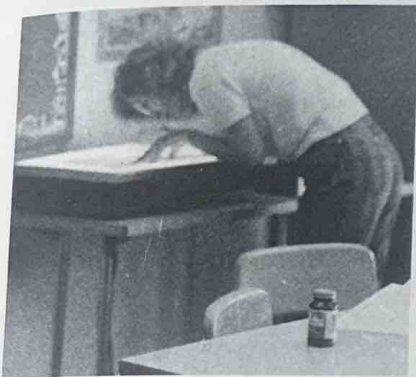
AND NOW A WORD FROM OUR SPONSOR

Although this may not be a perfect yearbook, it does serve as a means of reliving the memories of the 1984-85 school year. Enjoy!

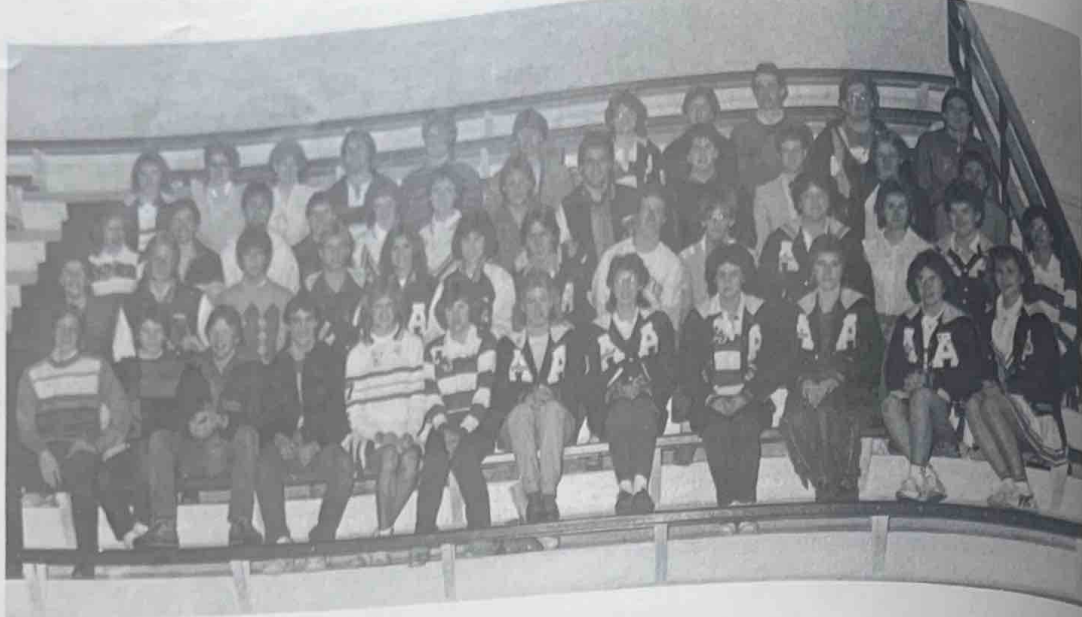

TEAMWORK PROVES TO BE

The Warrior football team had a very successful season with a 11-1 record and third place rating in the state. Under the direction of Coach Waid Zysset and assistant coach Dave Owen, the Warriors finished the regular season undefeated and garnered an undisputed RVL Championship. The Warriors won two playoff games before bowing to O'Neill Saint Mary in the semi-finals.

The Warrior defense, which shined all season, posted a six game shut-out string. The defense was led by Matt Bellamy with 148 tackles followed closely by Scott Weber with 137, Tye Doll with 134, Mick Stagemeyer

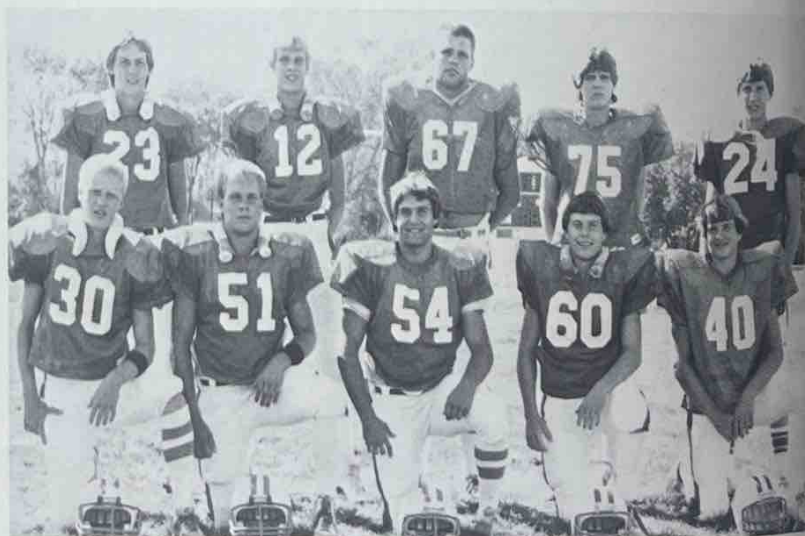
with 131 and Troy ten Bensel rounding out the top five with 83 stops. The Warrior's explosive offense, which out scored their opponents 328-81, was led by quarterback Todd Schutz. Schutz completed 27 passes for 430 yards and four touchdown passes. In the rushing department Weber led the team with 1,419 yards, 17 touchdowns and averaged 118.3 yards per game and 7.2 yard average per carry during the season. Shane Morse carried the ball 748 yards averaging 5.7 yards per carry followed by Terry Polston with 685 yards averaging 5.1 yards per carry. In total offense, the Warriors ousted their opponents 3,578 yards to 1,762 yards in total offense.



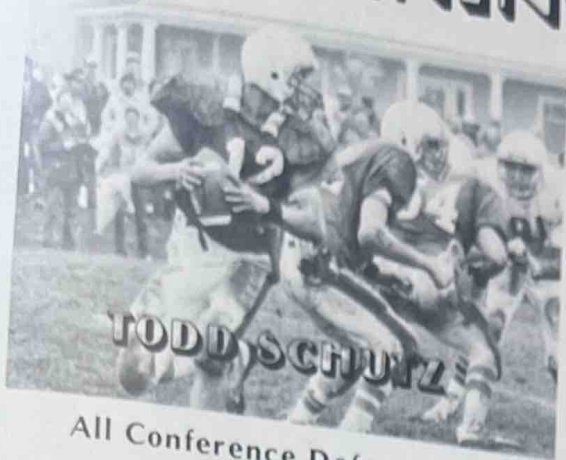

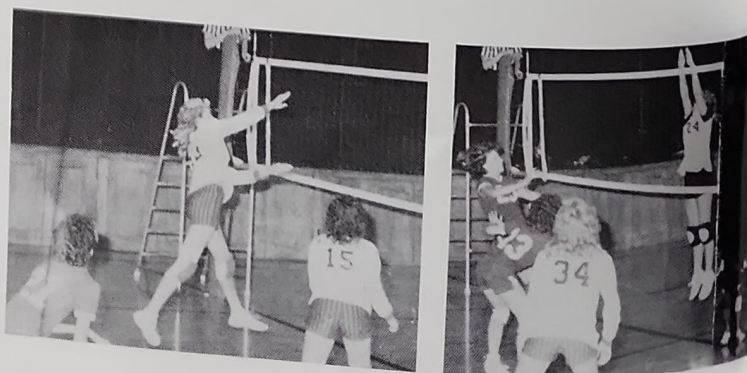

The 1984-85 Warrior basketball team ended their year with a 13-3 record. Their only losses came from the Republican Valley Mustangs and the Kearney Catholic Stars.

The Warriors, lead by Coaches Waid Zysset and Ken Houghtelling, opened the season with a 59-44 win over the Wauneta Broncos. The Warriors continued their winning streak as they headed to the RVL Tournament in Cambridge. The Warriors went into the tournament with a 8-1 record with their only loss coming from Republican Valley. In first round action the Warriors again met the Mustangs and were stopped short of the championship game with a score of 56-50.

The Warriors got back on the right track and ended their regular season against the Alma Cardinals by defeating them 60-52. They ended regular season with a record of 12-2.

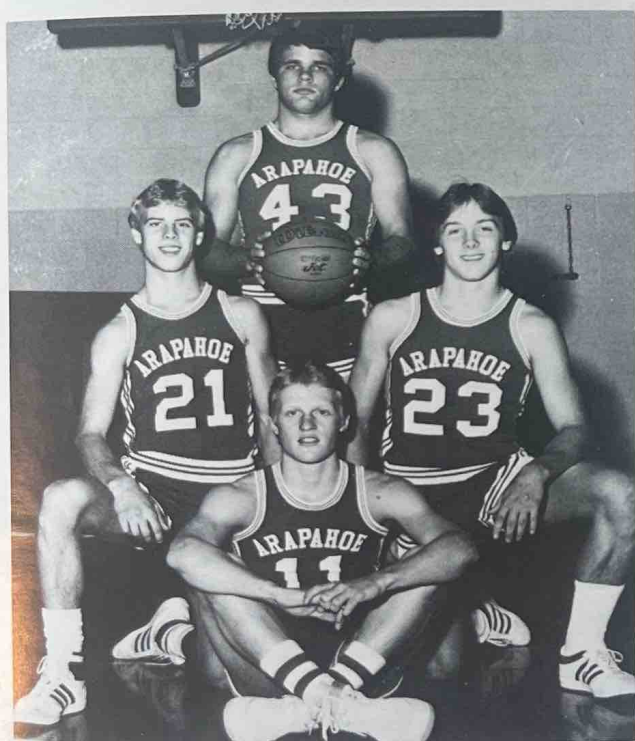

The Junior Varsity also ended their season in a winning way, with an 8-3 record.

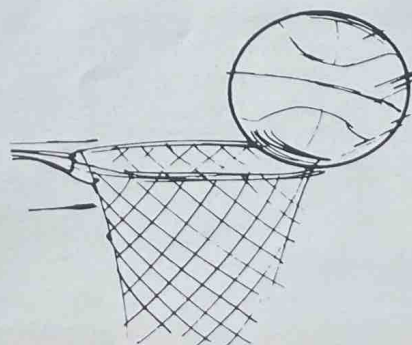

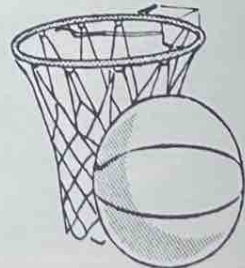
The Warriorette Basketball team under the coaching of Dave Owen and his assistant Chris Thomas finished this year with a disappointing 3-10 mark on the varsity level.

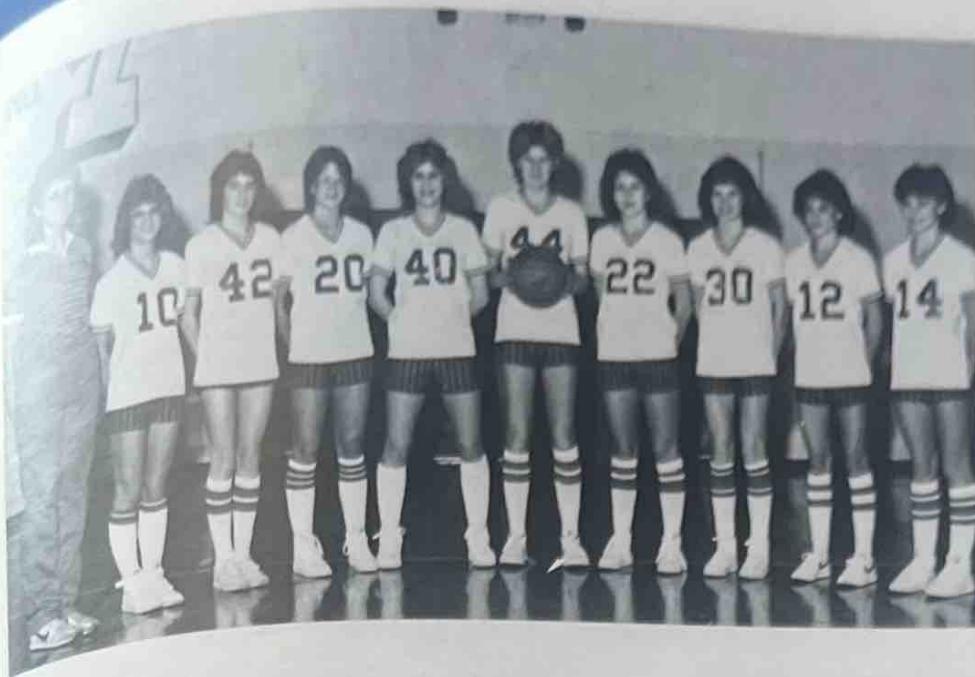
Ten girls were named as letterwinners and Gina Wolzen was awarded a second team All Conference merit.

THREE TIME COMBINATION WINNERS

The A.H.S. track teams again took priority over the other teams at the meets throughout most of the season.

The year began with the Cambridge Relays, where the boys placed second and the girls received the first place trophy. As the season continued up to the Class C-10 Districts, held at Arapahoe, the Warriors and Warriorettes placed first or second continuously with only nine seniors leading the pack. The boys and girls also received three combination trophies.

Many school records were broken this season. Numerous personal bests also resulted at the meets. The Warrior track team broke five of the school records. Tye Doll broke the discus record with a 166'3" throw, the shot put record with a 52'8" put. David Hunter broke the record in the 3200 meter run, running a 10:26. 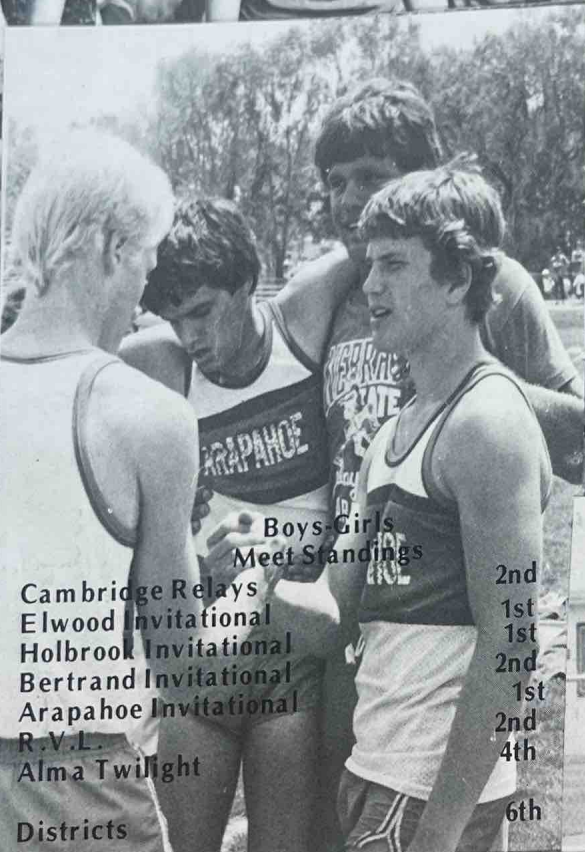

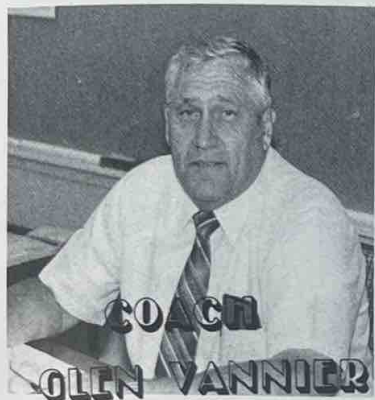

Then on April 16, the boys traveled to Alma to take part in the Alma Invitation-

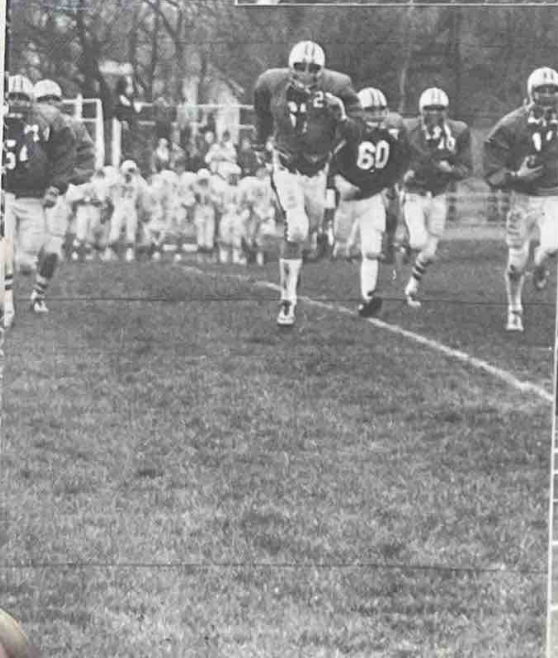
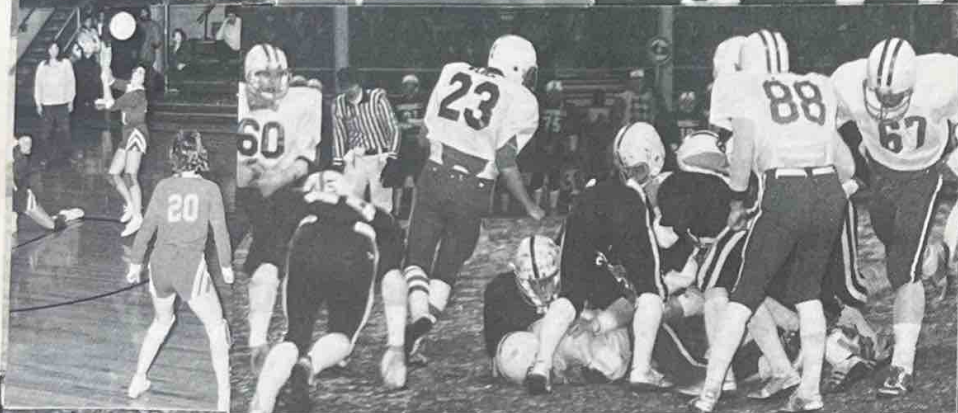
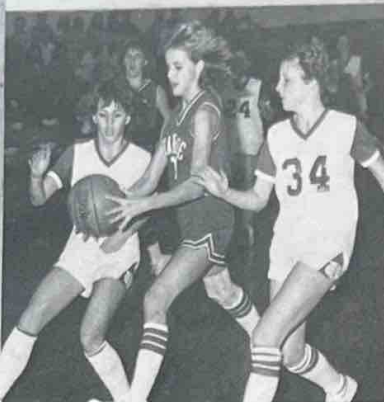
al. Overall Arapahoe placed sixth with a score of 387.

Monday morning the seniors loaded the bus for the long journey home. They arrived back at Arapahoe at 9 p.m., after spending one of their best and final weekends together.

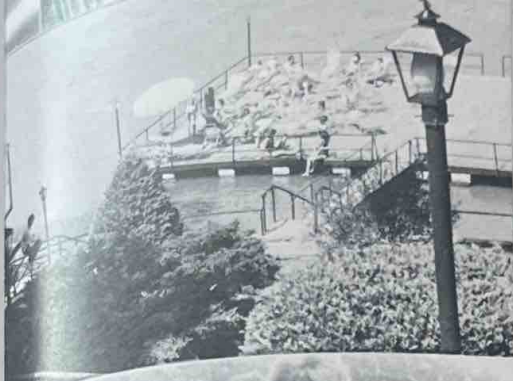
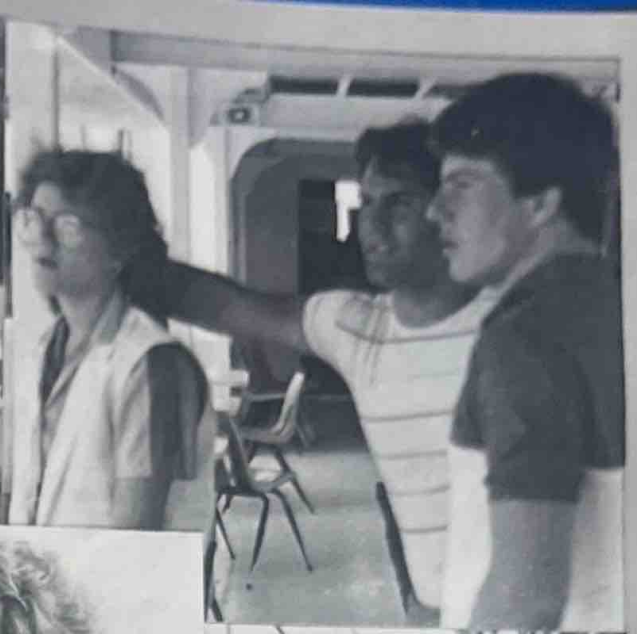
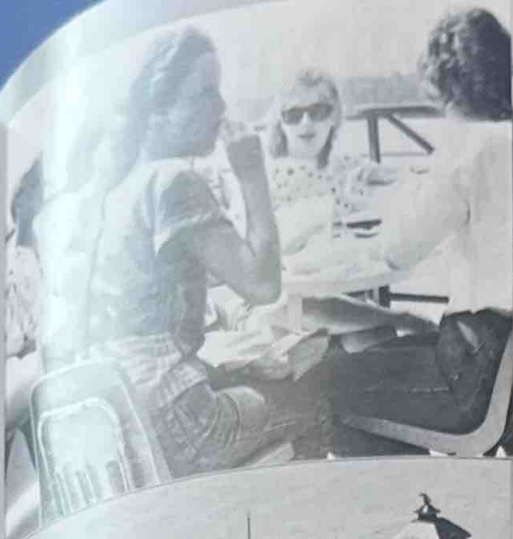
