On May 17 graduating students of 1987 walked through the gymnasium doors of AHS for the last time as a class.

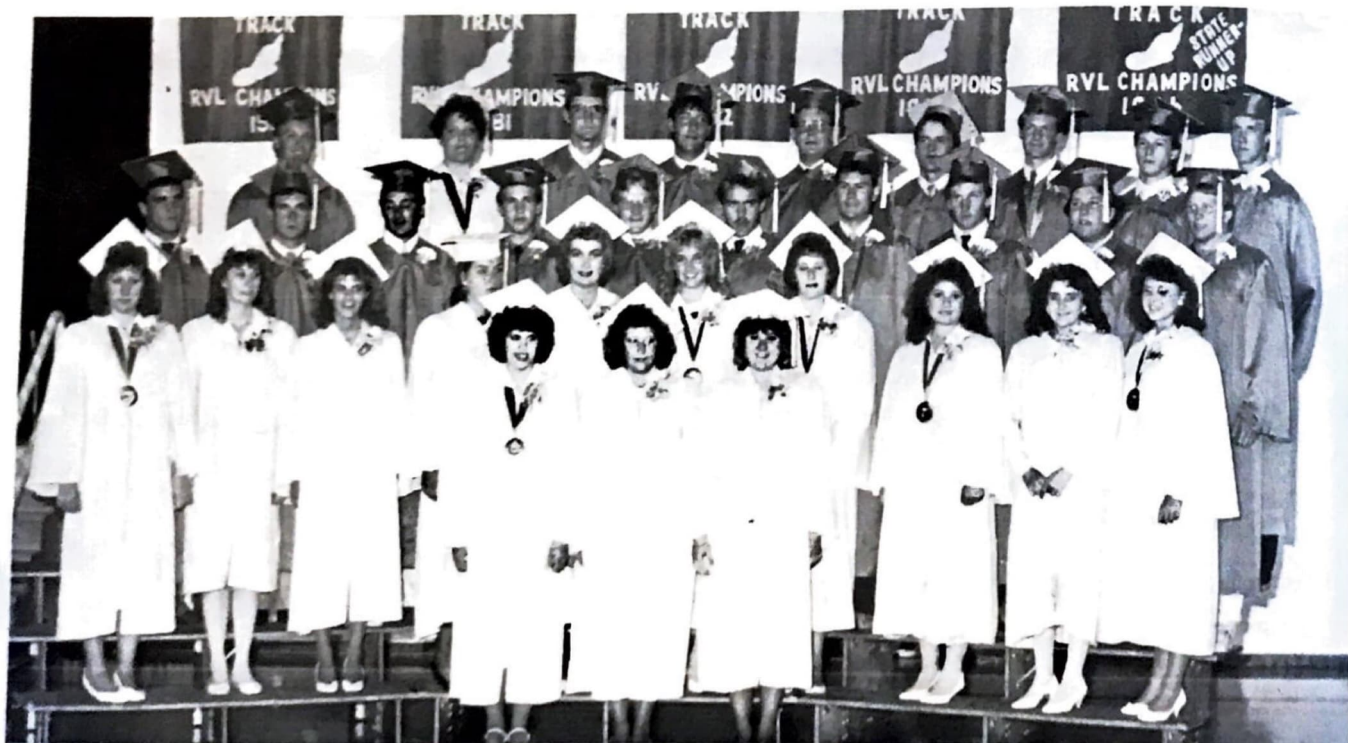

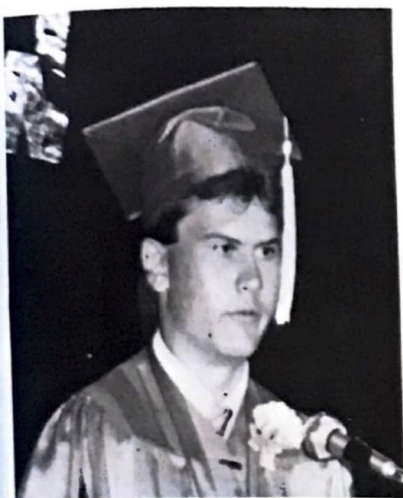

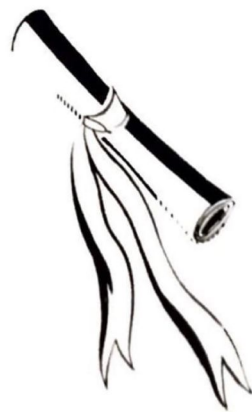

Although the junior year was a busy one, there is sure to be many lasting memories of the 1986-87 year.



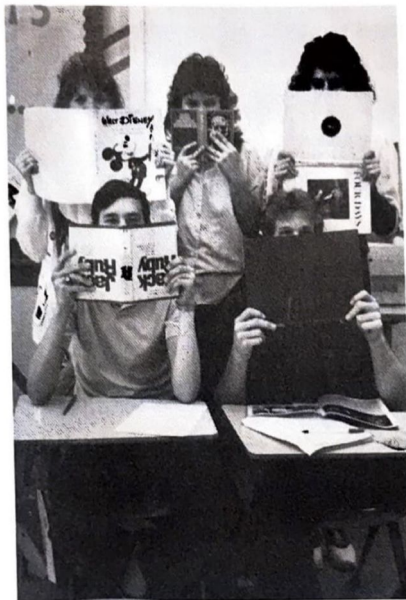

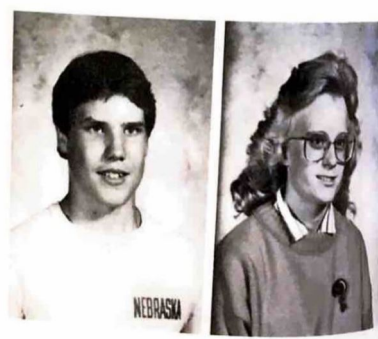

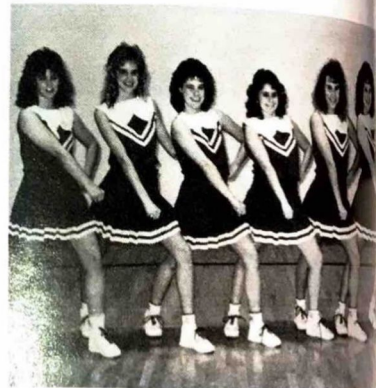

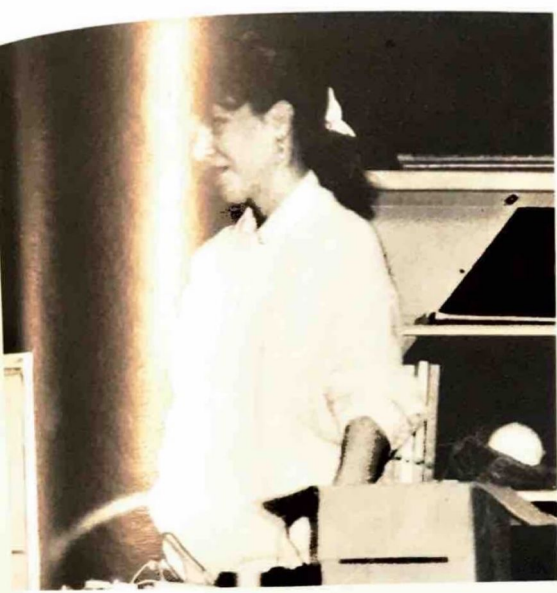

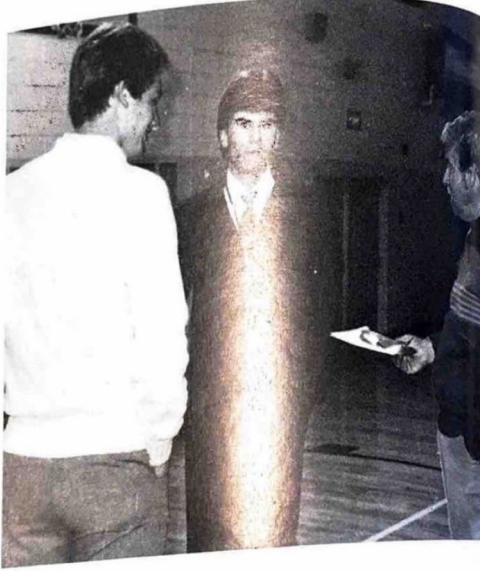

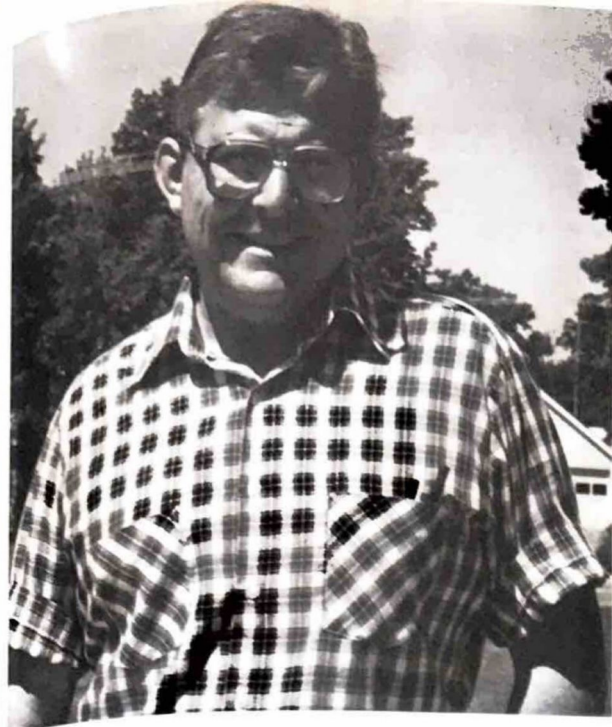

The Junior class and sponsors had a lot of work to do and started decorating Thursday night. They worked again Friday afternoon, evening and on Saturday morning to finish just in time.

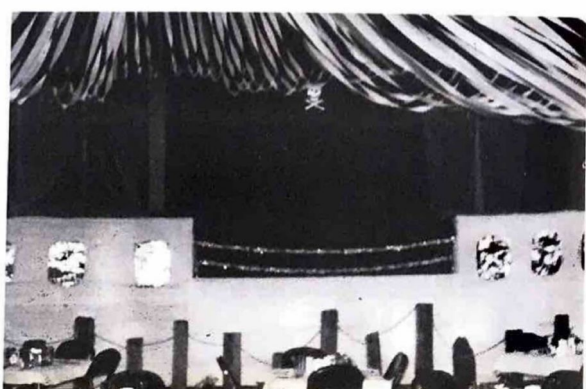

Following the meal Seniors Liz Swanson and David Watson read the wills and prophecies and Fran ten Bensel then gave the Benediction.

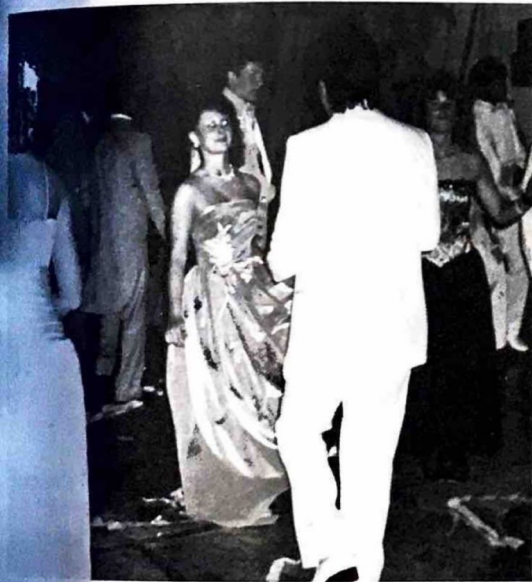

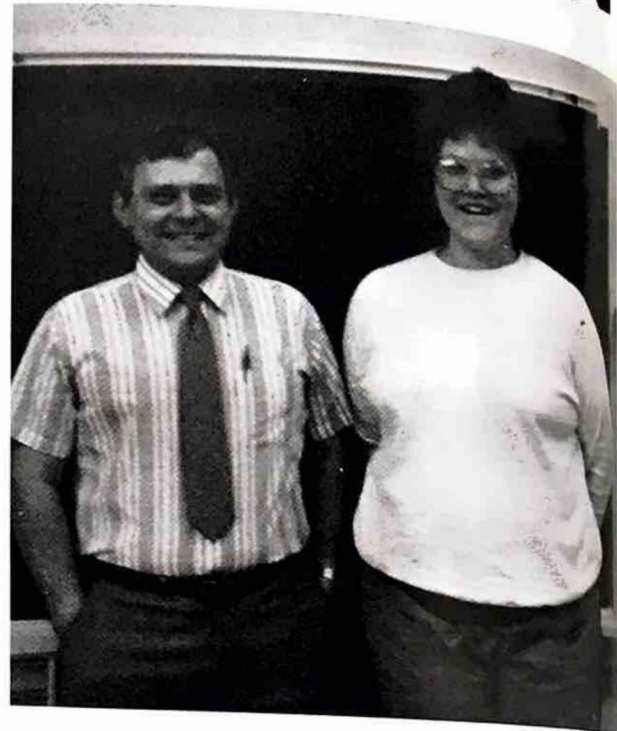

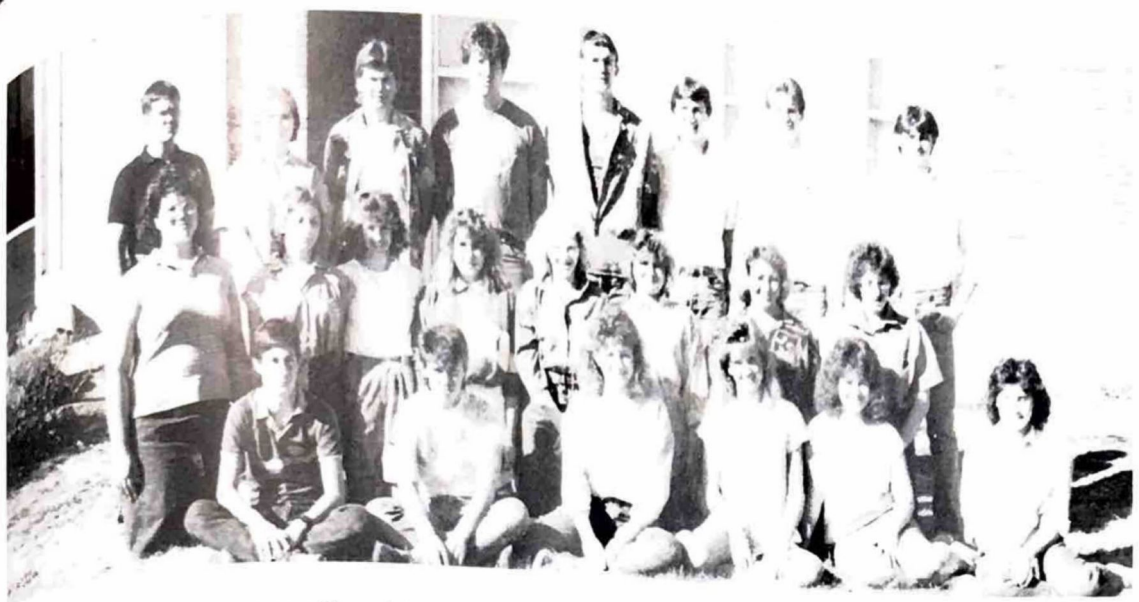
This year's problems, in which the team ranked 11th in the state, dealt with future garbage disposal, the changing family role, and the problems facing water, including shortage and pollution.

The all-freshman team worked with a lack of experience but the next three years look to four returning members.





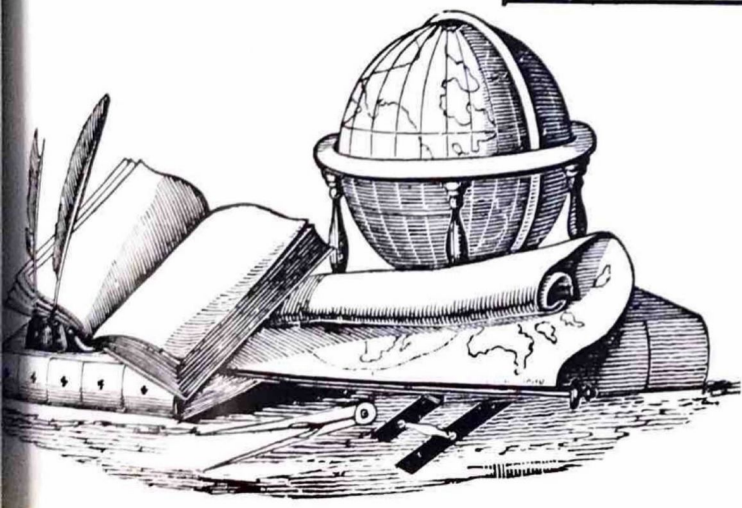

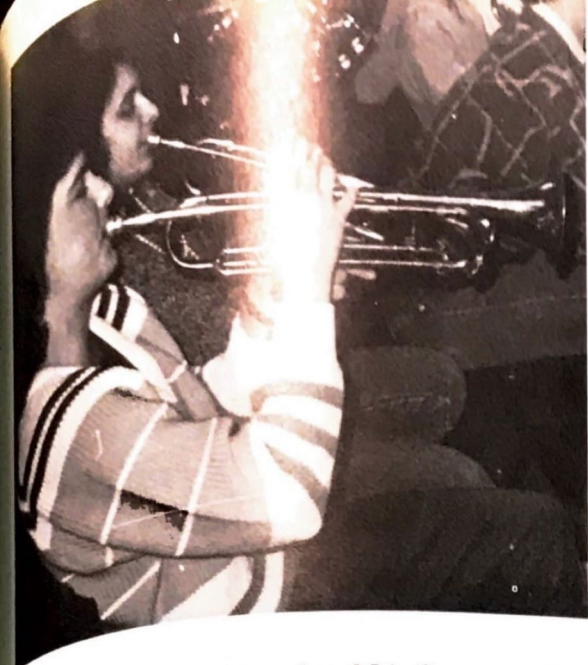

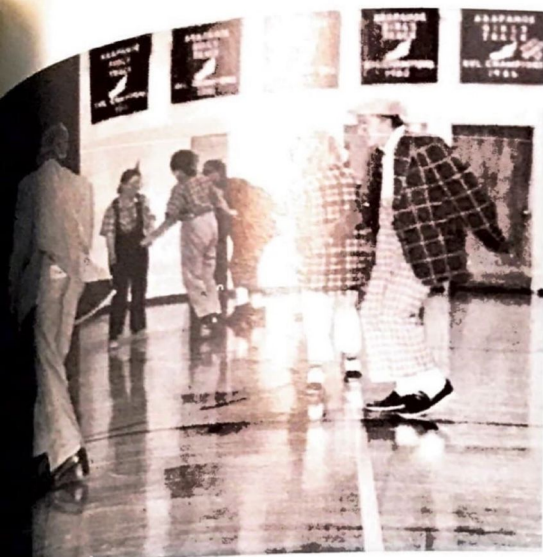

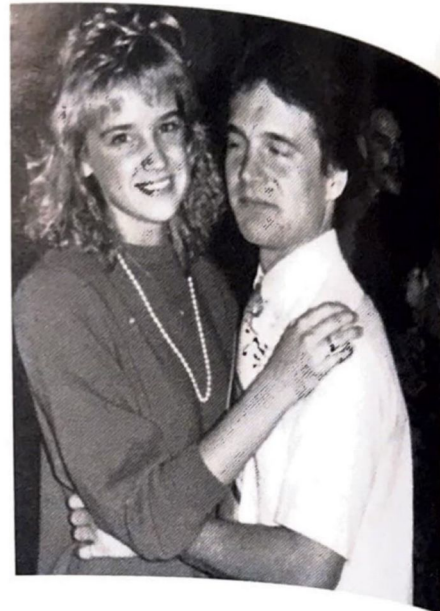

The Warrior Gridmen, led by 13 seniors, ended their season with 6-3 record.

Under the watchful eyes of Head Coach Waid Zysset and Assistant Coach Dave Owen, the Warriors proved their tough disposition by giving to what would be state-bound teams a run for their money.

The Warriors overtook their opponents in total offense 2148 yards to 1487 yards. They also outscored their competition 146 to 66.

The offense was led by seniors David Watson and Mike Miller. Watson had 114 carries for 486 yards and four TD rushes, and Miller had 96 carries for 417 yards and three TD rushes. Senior quarterback Pat Breinig completed 29 of 63 attempts in passing with his main receivers being classmates Jon Best and Rusty Schelling. Best made 11 catches for 184 yards and Schelling caught 10 catches for 174 yards. Leading the defense was Watson and Junior Steve Koller. Watson had a total of 139 tackles, 37 unassisted and 102 assisted. Koller chalked up a total of 106 tackles, 39 unassisted and 67 assisted.

The season highlight for the Warriors was the close game played with the then Class C-2 top-ranked Cambridge Trojans. The Warriors gave their best effort and clearly surprised the Trojans before just falling short of victory by five points.

The Junior Varsity ended their season ahead with a record of 3-2. The JV gridmen surpassed Alma, Republican Valley and Bertrand but fell to Cambridge and Oxford.

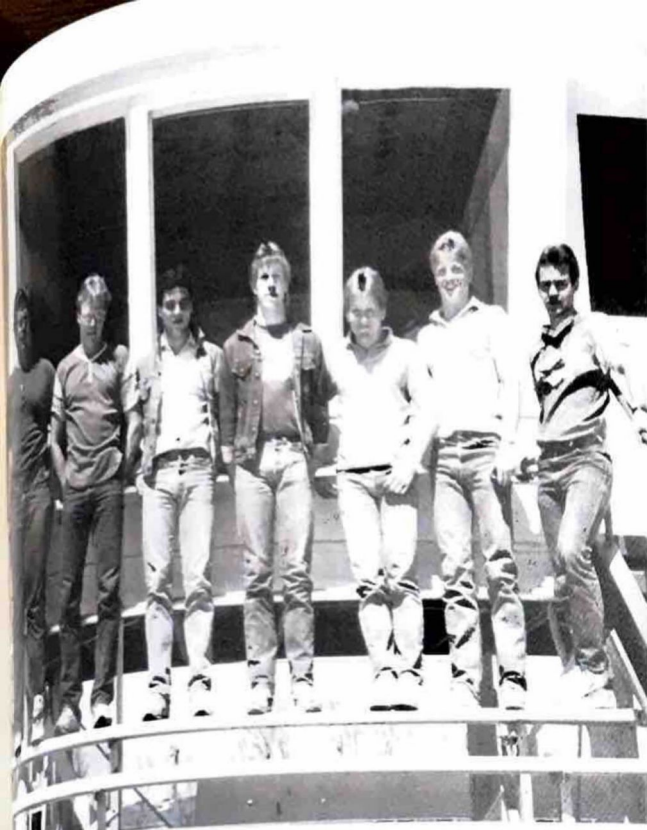

LATE VICTORIES HIGHLIGHT SEASON

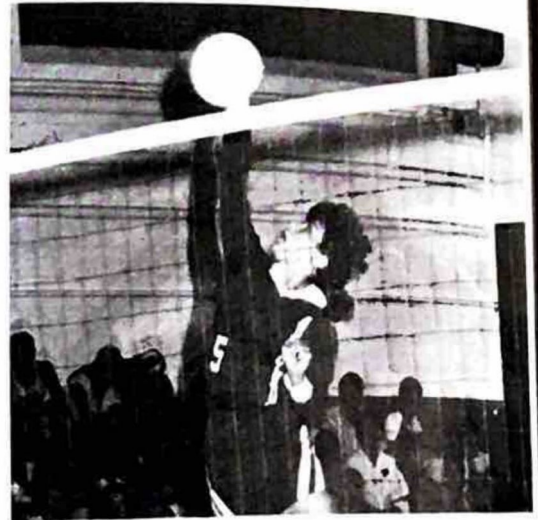

The Warriorettes held a 3-12 record for the season. Arapahoe, who had lost to the Cambridge Trojans in regular season play, fought hard at Sub-Districts and captured a win over that same Trojan team. In the second game of Sub-District action the Warriorettes contended for over an hour before losing the championship to the Alma Cardinals.

As a group the Warrior wrestlers not only placed fourth at the State Meet, they also had an undefeated dual record as well as clinching the RVL Championship and the District Championship for the first time since Barnes has been coach.

Ten grapplers qualified for the State Meet. 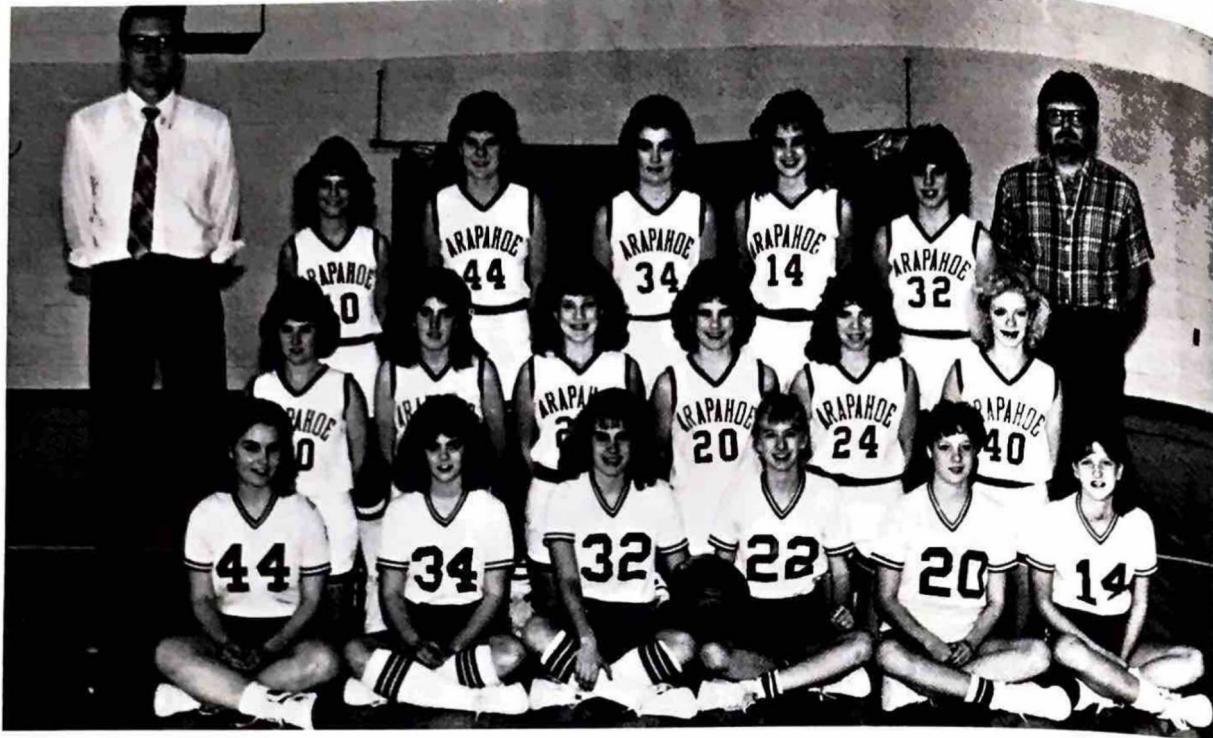

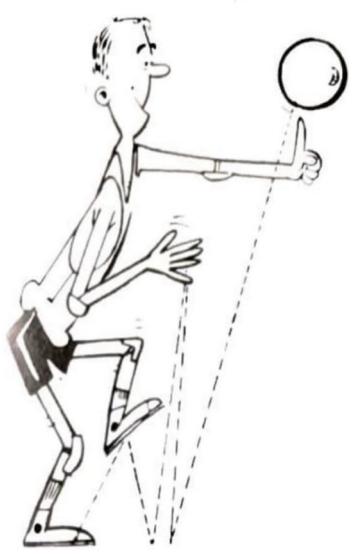

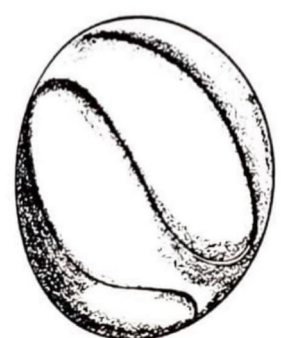

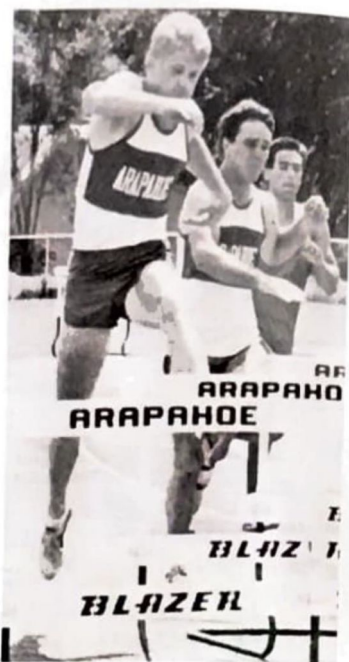
