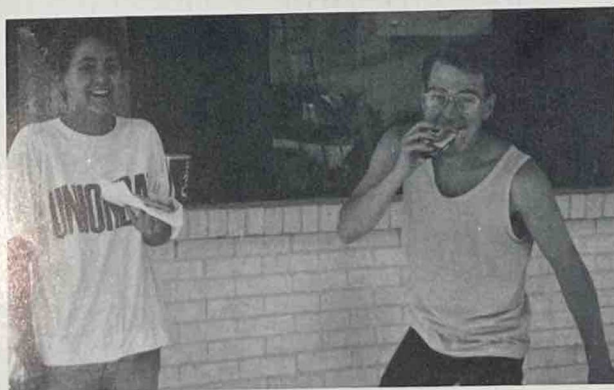

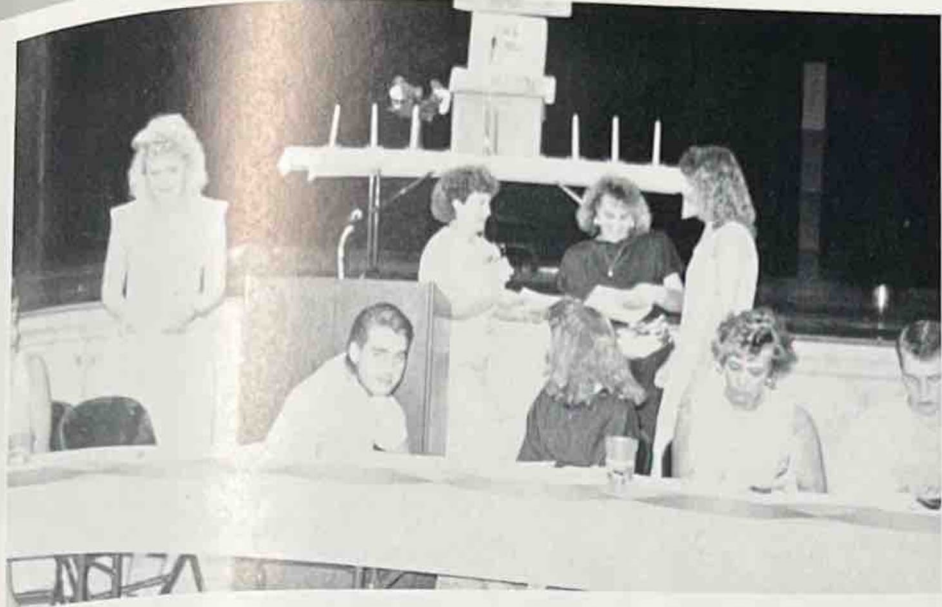
Students know that to be successful in an activity, one must spend much time and effort to prepare for that success.

Teachers found it difficult for awhile to find students who were willing to dedicate lots of time to

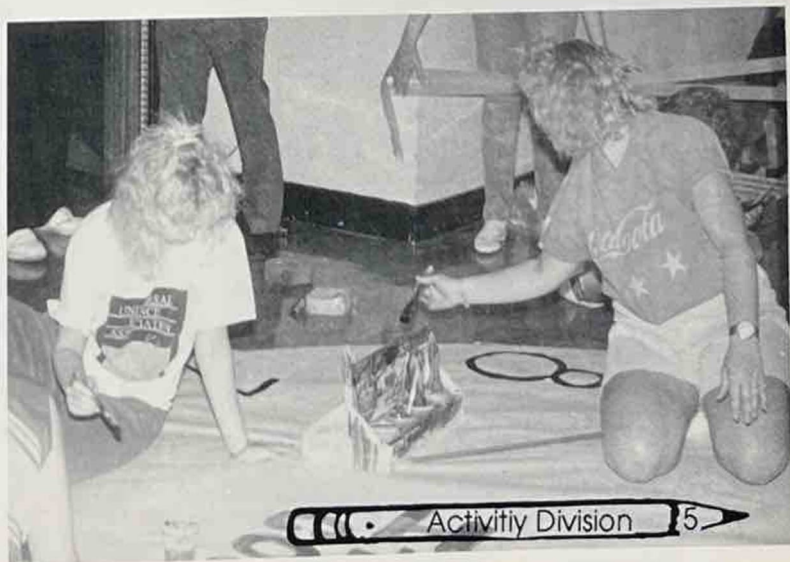
an activity in which that teacher saw a lot of talent. Now, teachers know that they can count on students to put forth the time and effort it takes to be successful.

The dance followed in the gym to the sound of Complete Music. The thought of "Turn Back Time" will always remind the seniors of Homecoming 89.

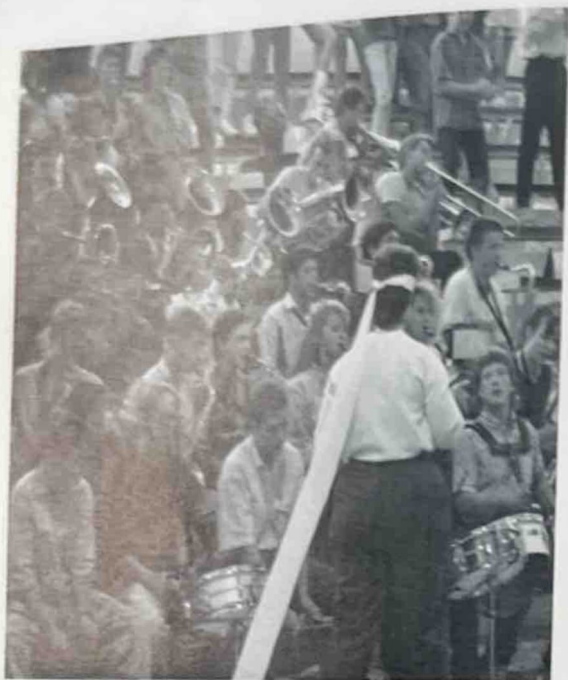

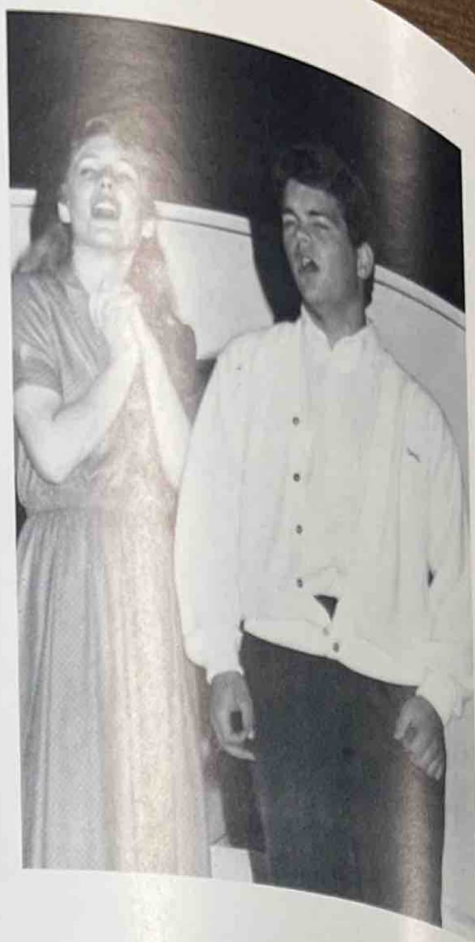

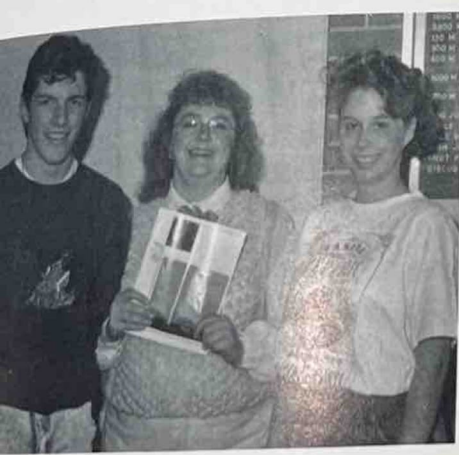

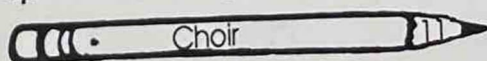

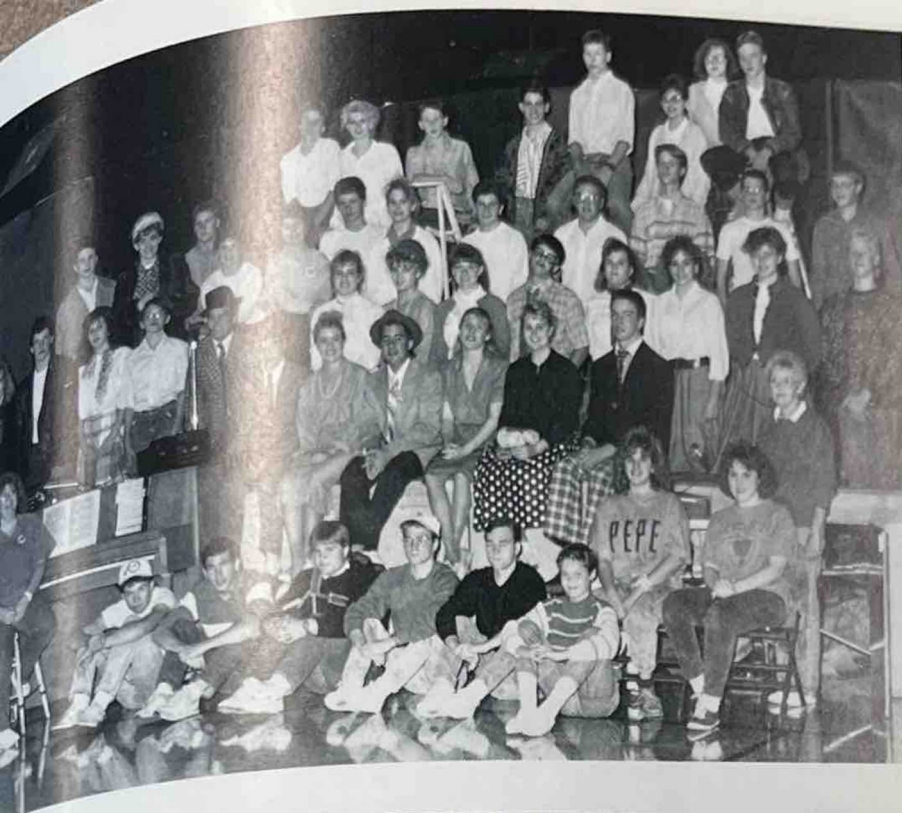

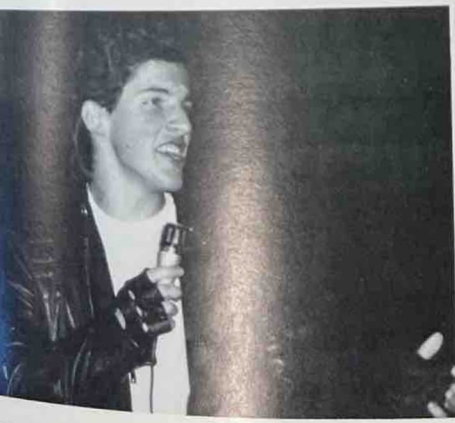

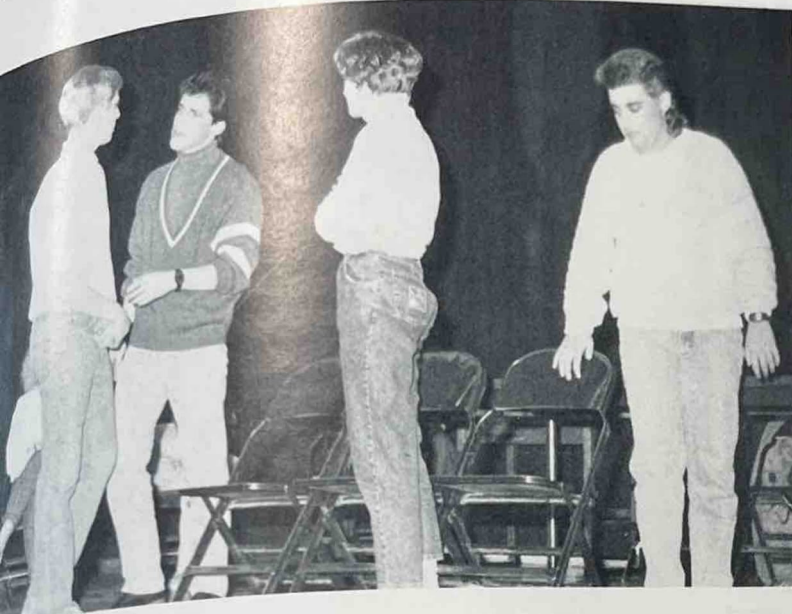
the other eleven of this.

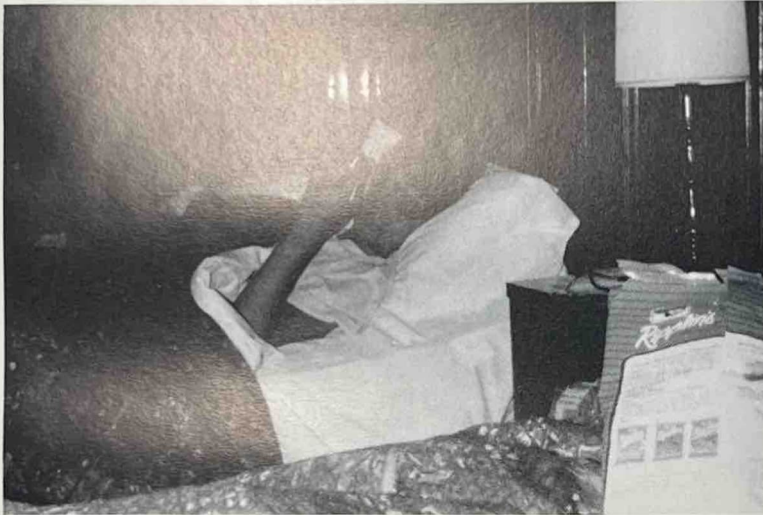

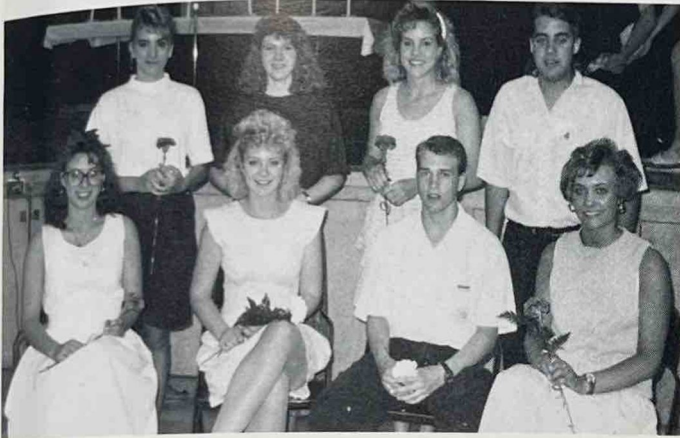

Lynda Blake also assisted the FHA Chapter in their endeavors.

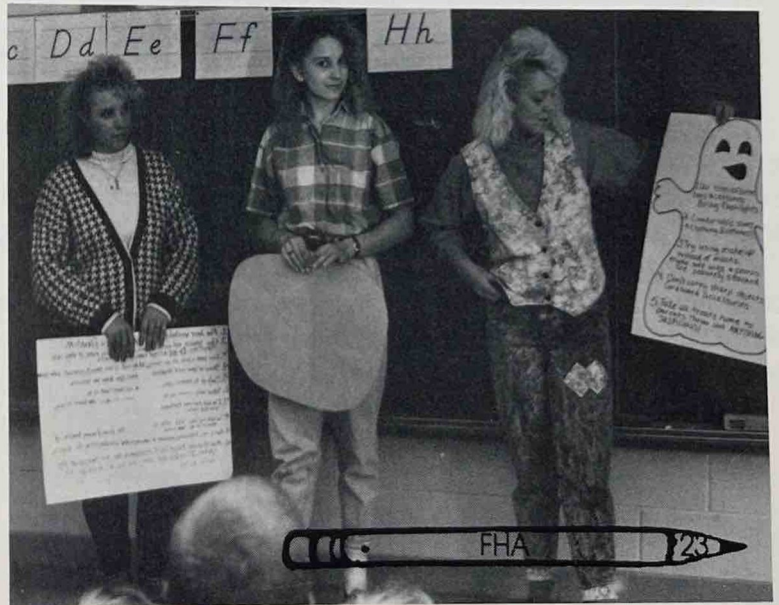

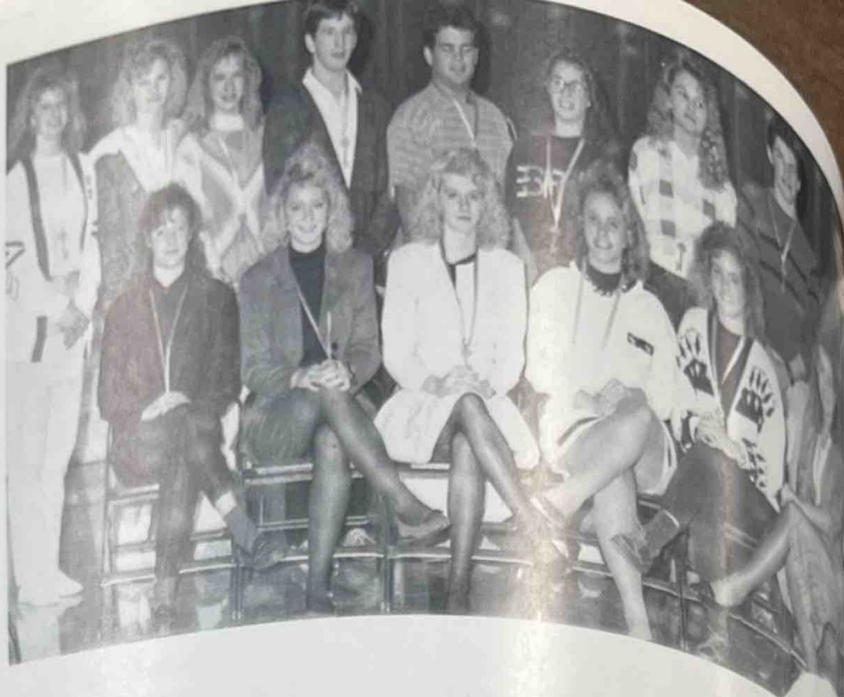

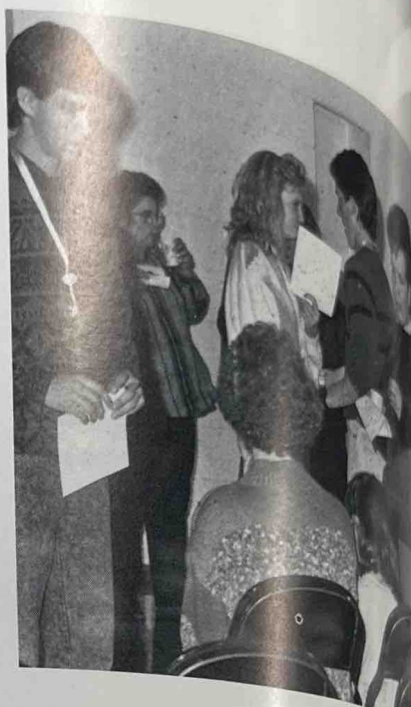

Six Speakers Compete with the Elite

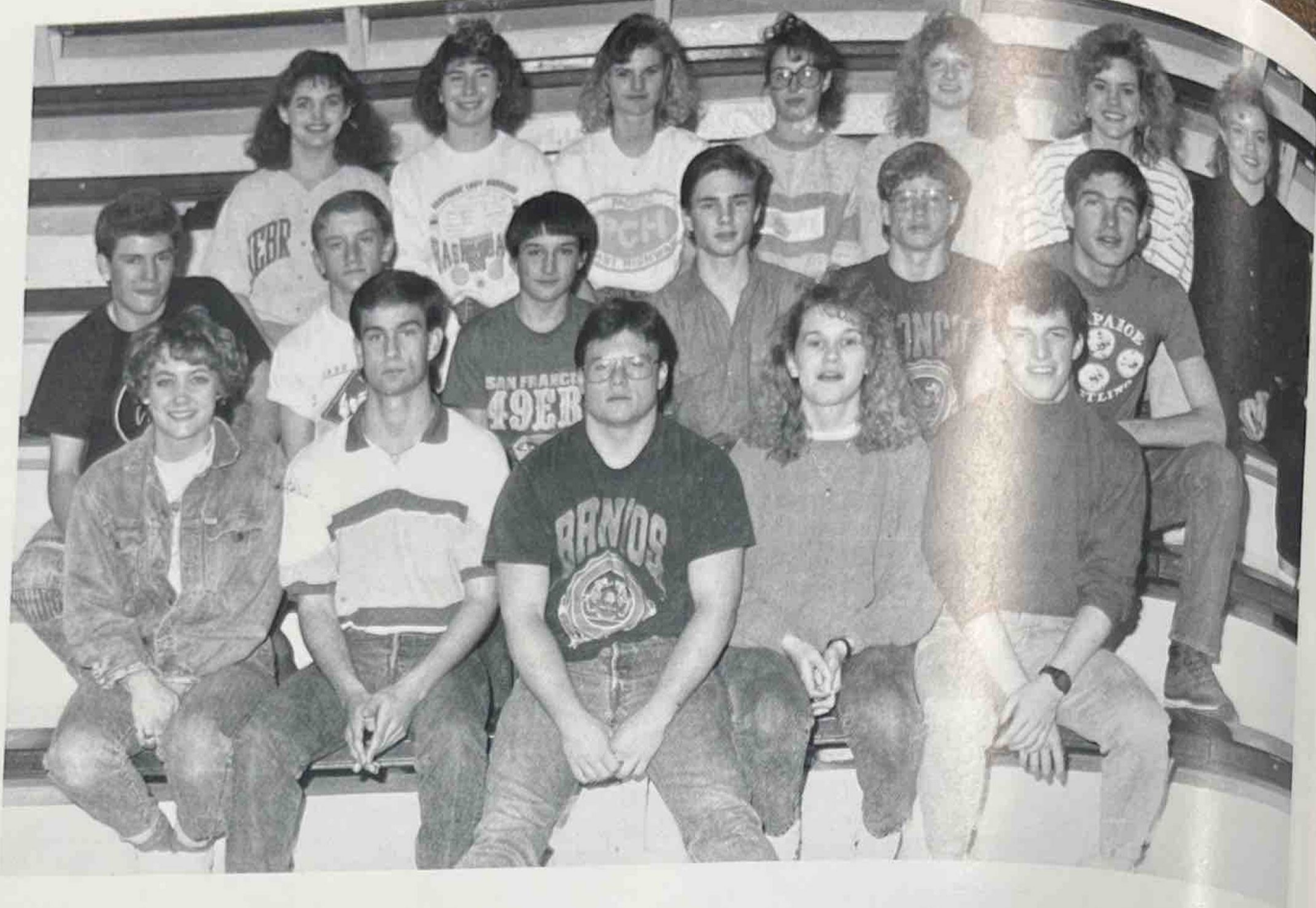
The 1989-90 Arapahoe High School speech team increased their membership by two and their state qualifying events by two.

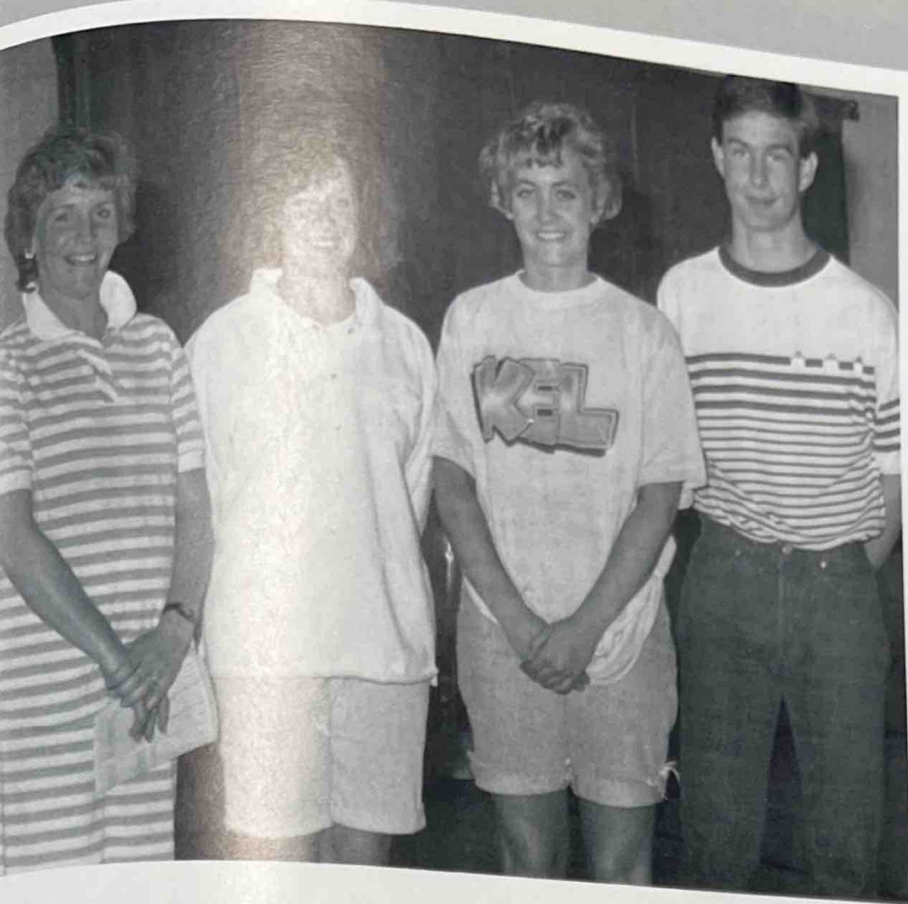
The Inter-High Day Challenge

The competition between area schools is not only fierce in the sports arena but extremely competitive in the scholastic arena as well.

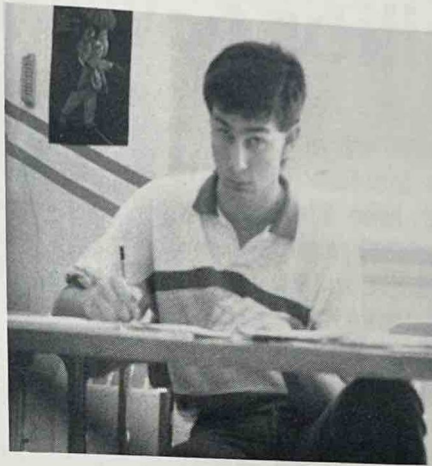

Arapahoe Gym Gets a Facelift

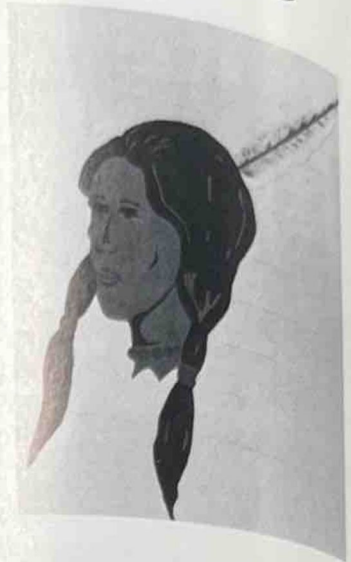
Unless you are blind, you probably noticed a few major changes in the home of Arapahoe sports--the gym.

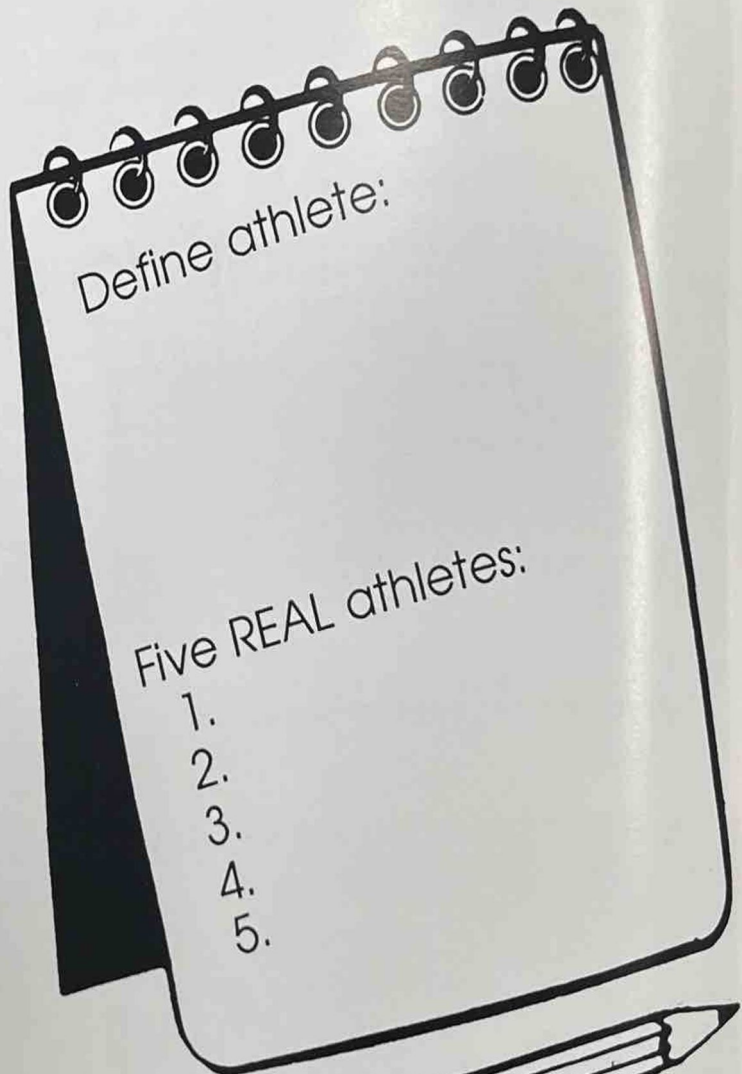

These changes made the gym a classier, more respectable home for the Arapahoe athletes.

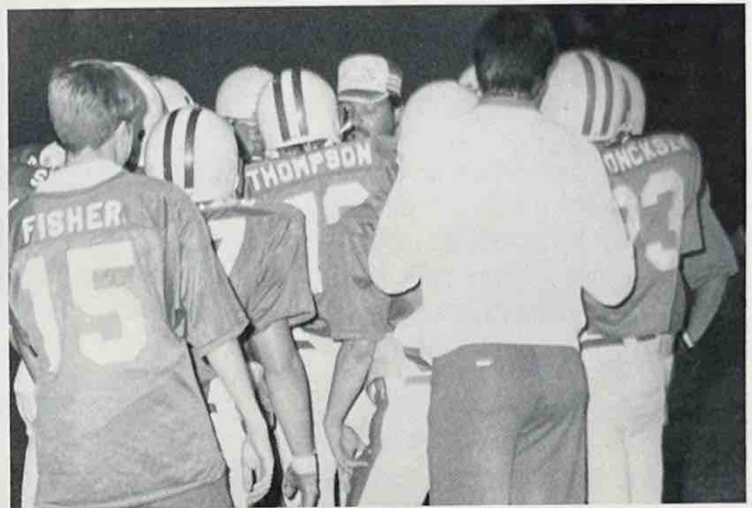


The Warrior mascots adorn the north wall of the Arapahoe gymnasium.

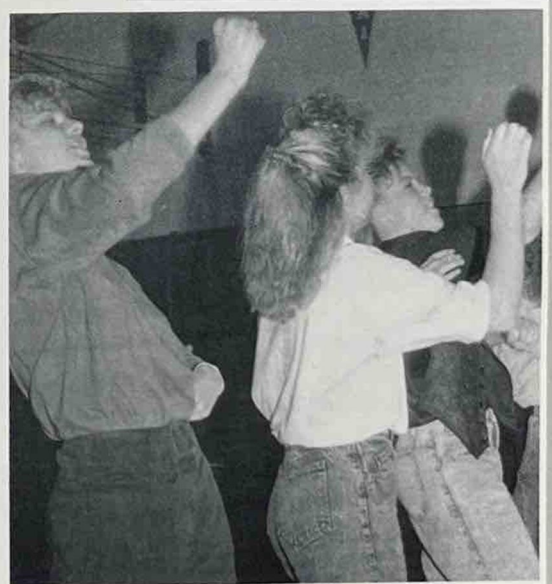

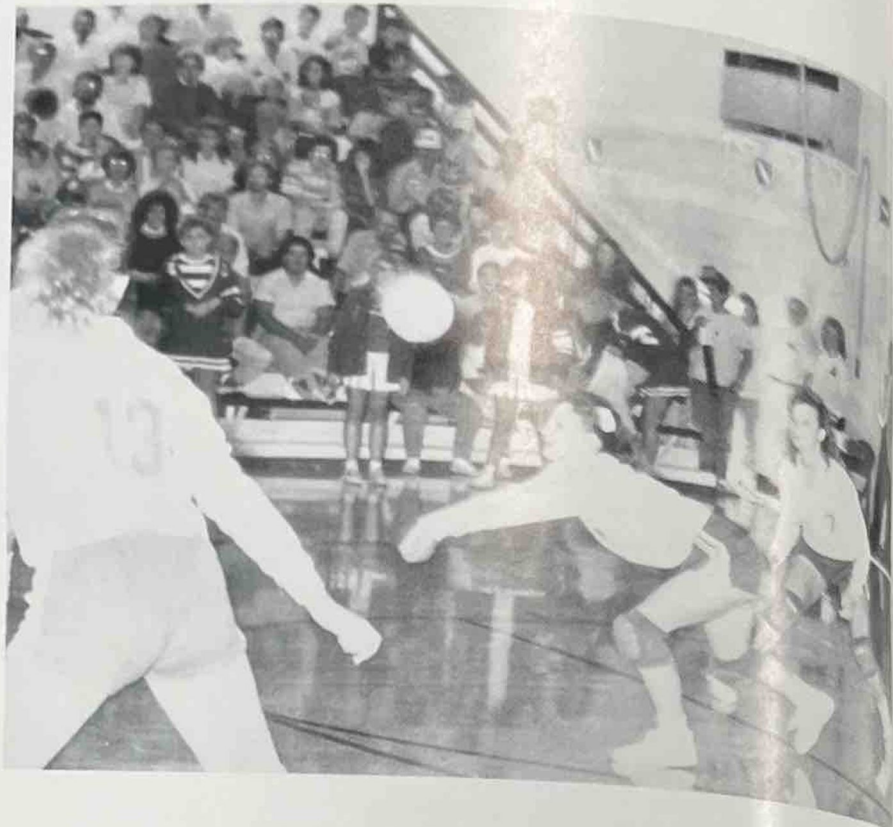
Impressive Stats Compiled in '89

Despite the 4-10 record, the AHS Lady Warriors compiled impressive stats on the volleyball court.

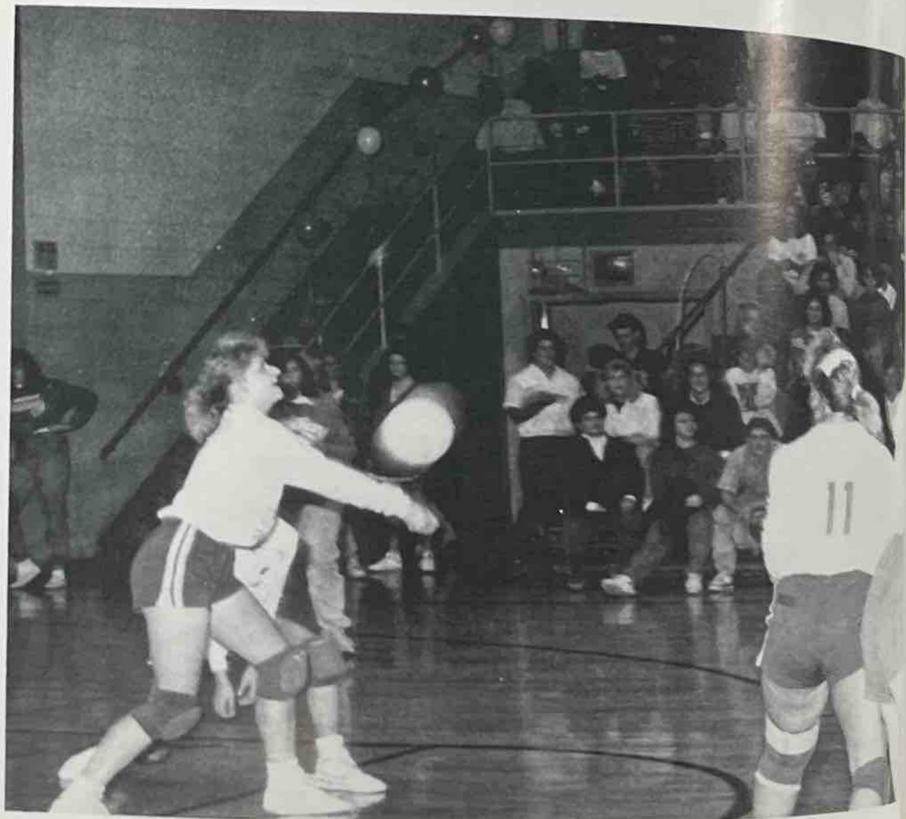

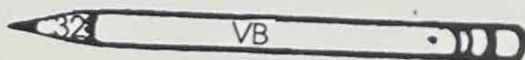

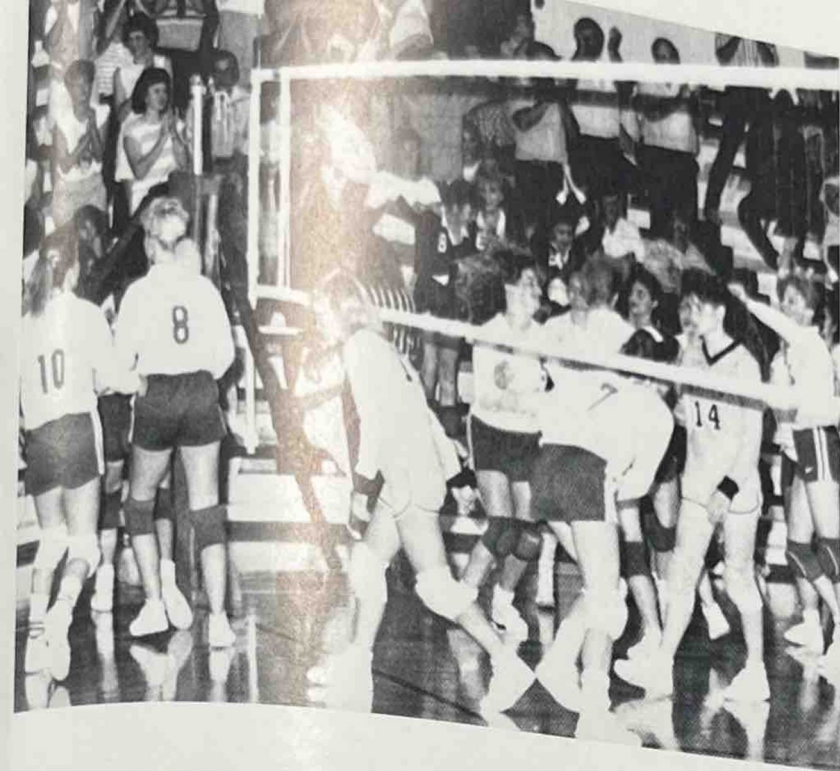


Sophomore Shayna DeVries sets up the attack.



Tara Best receives the pass as Dixie Hilker looks on.

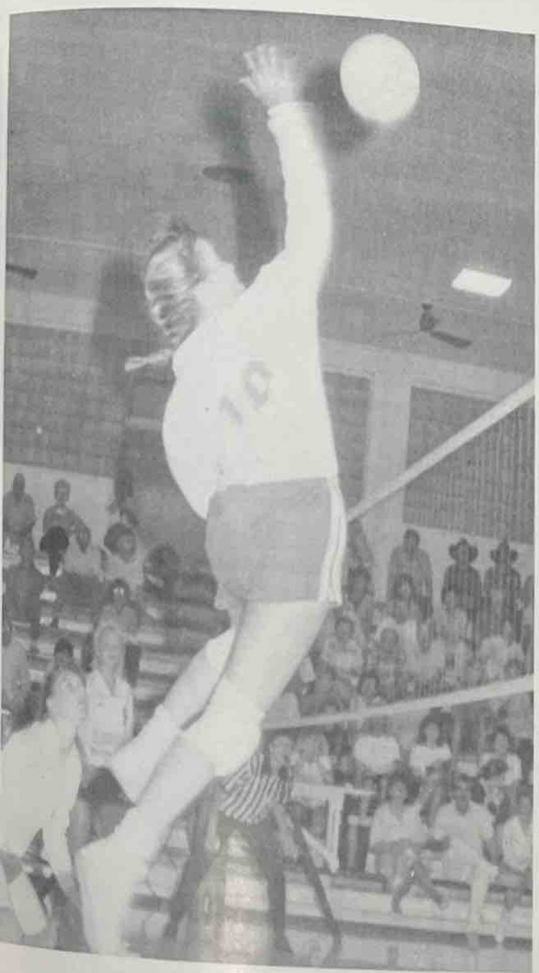

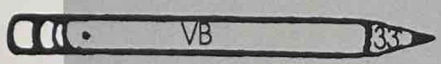

Darin Soncksen led the Warriors in passing with 490 yards, hooking up with Brandon Mues for 262 of them.

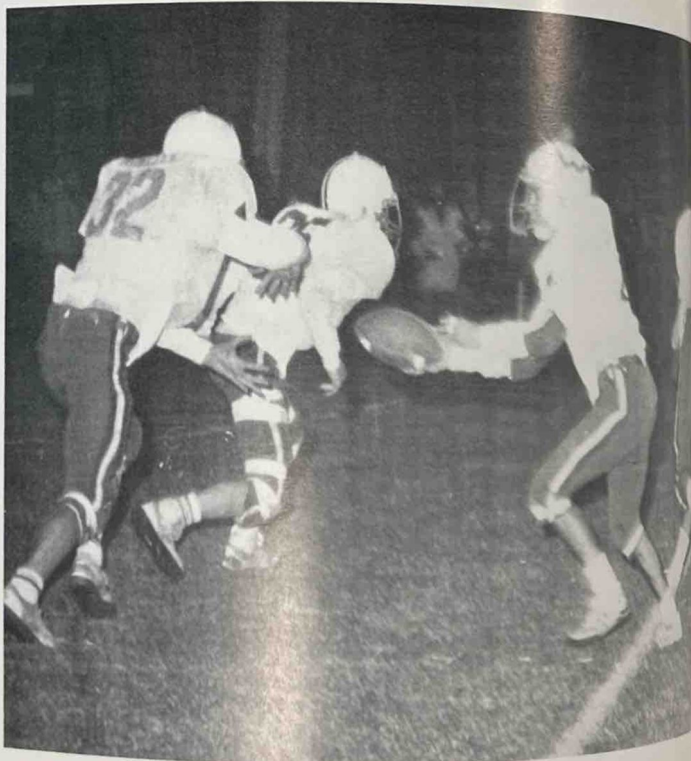
Defensively, Metzger led the team with 89 tackles followed close behind by Downey with 85 and Josh Hill with 82.

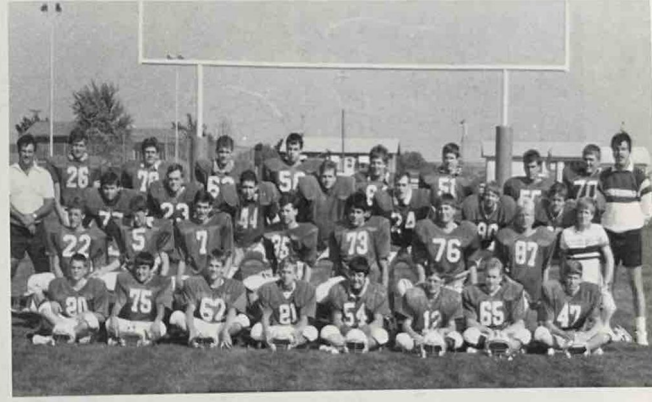

The 1989-90 AHS grapplers once again showed fans of all kinds that On the Mat is Where it's at.

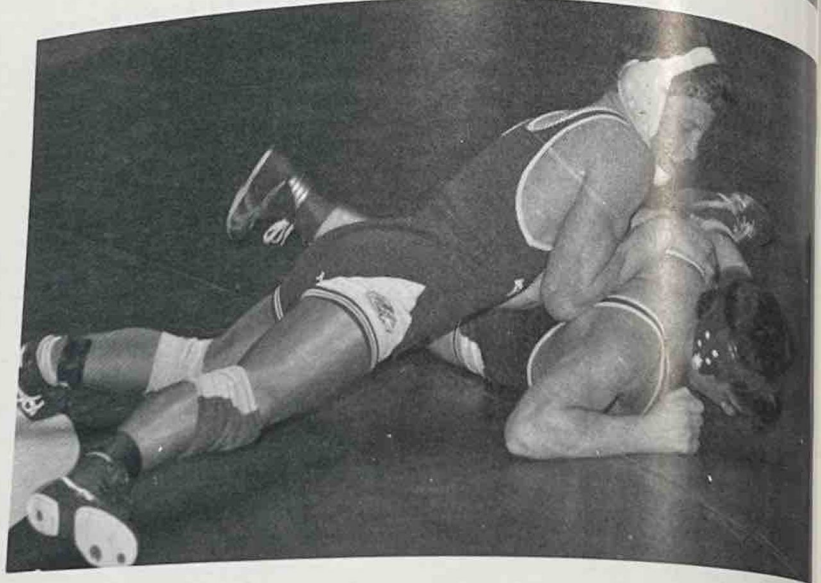
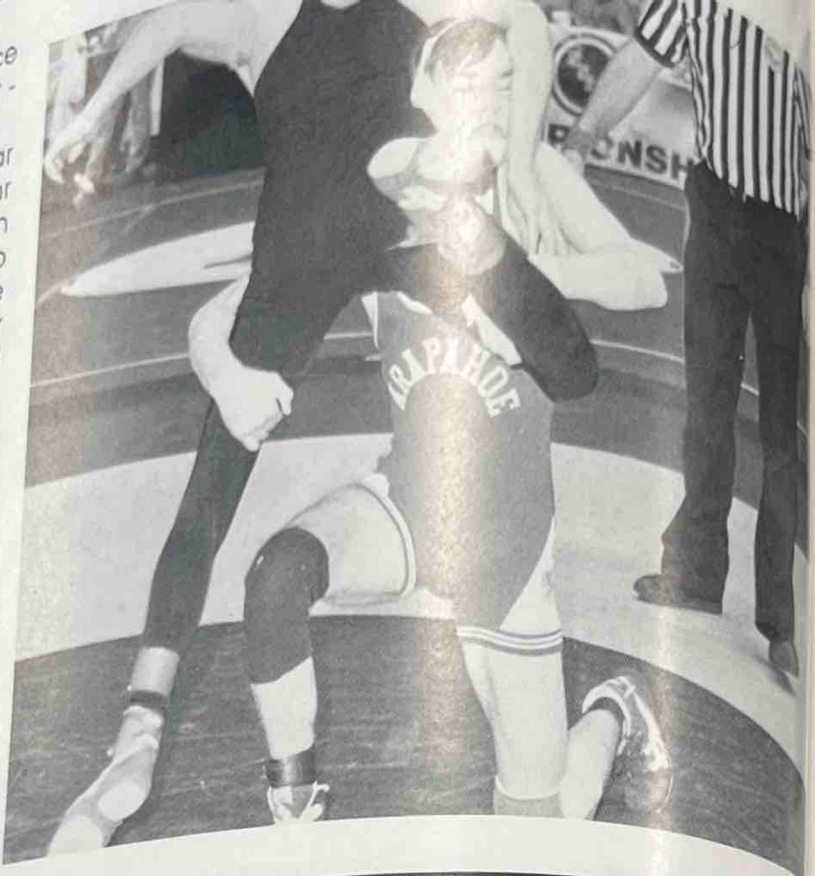

Mark Miller, Josh Hill and Kory Kennicutt were the other members who qualified for the state tournament. Hill won the third places medal at 130 pounds weight class.

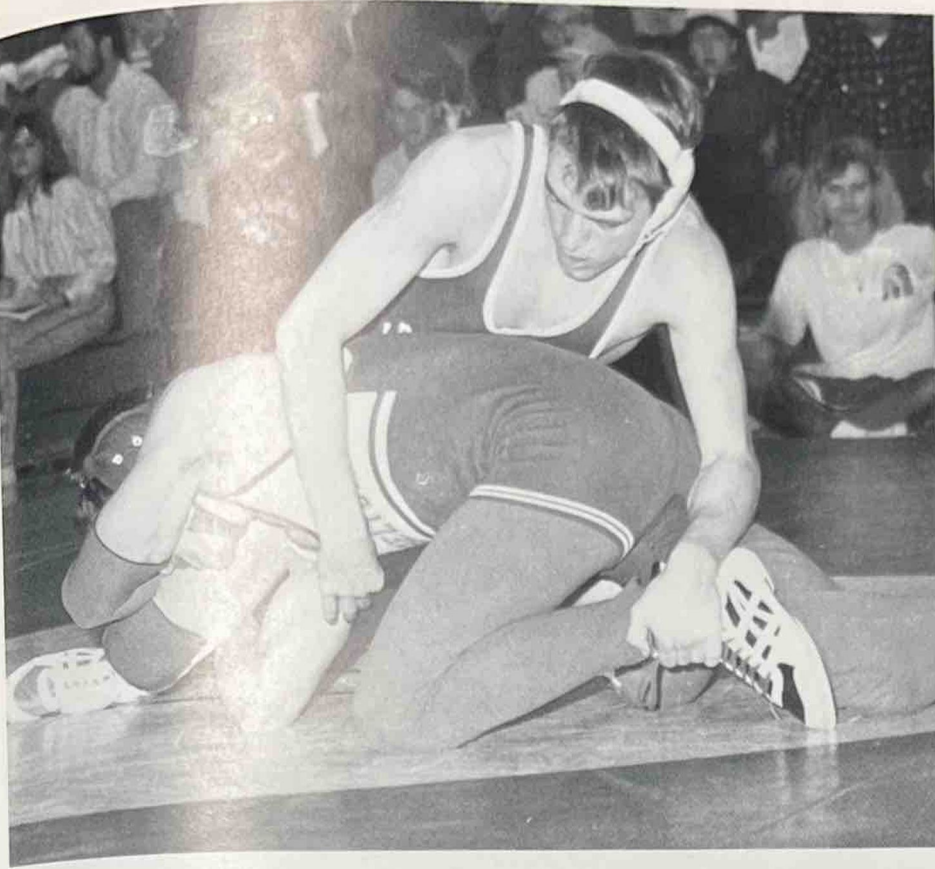

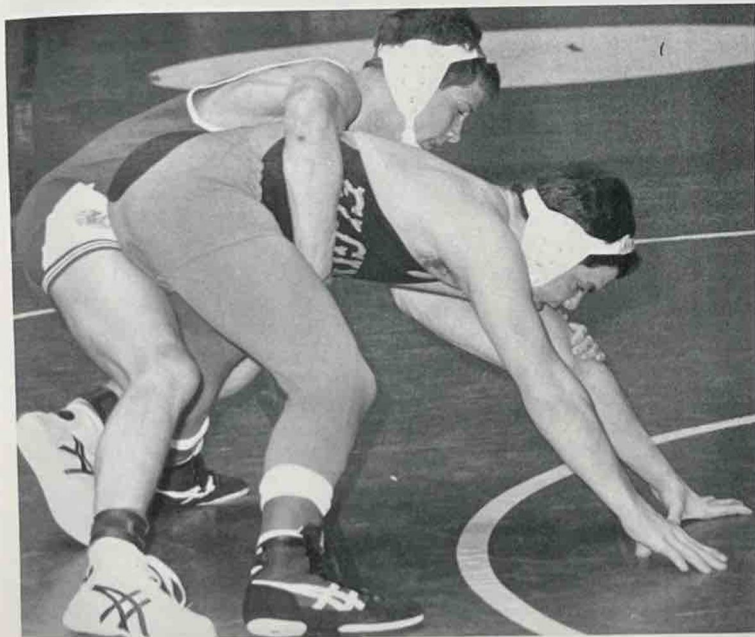

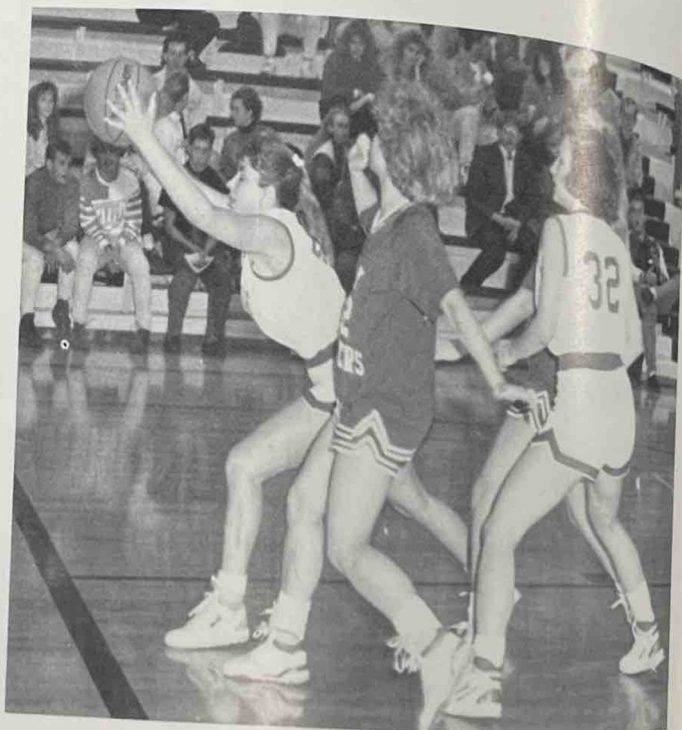
Junior Tara Best was hot on the court this year with three point shots. She claimed the first place spot with 13.

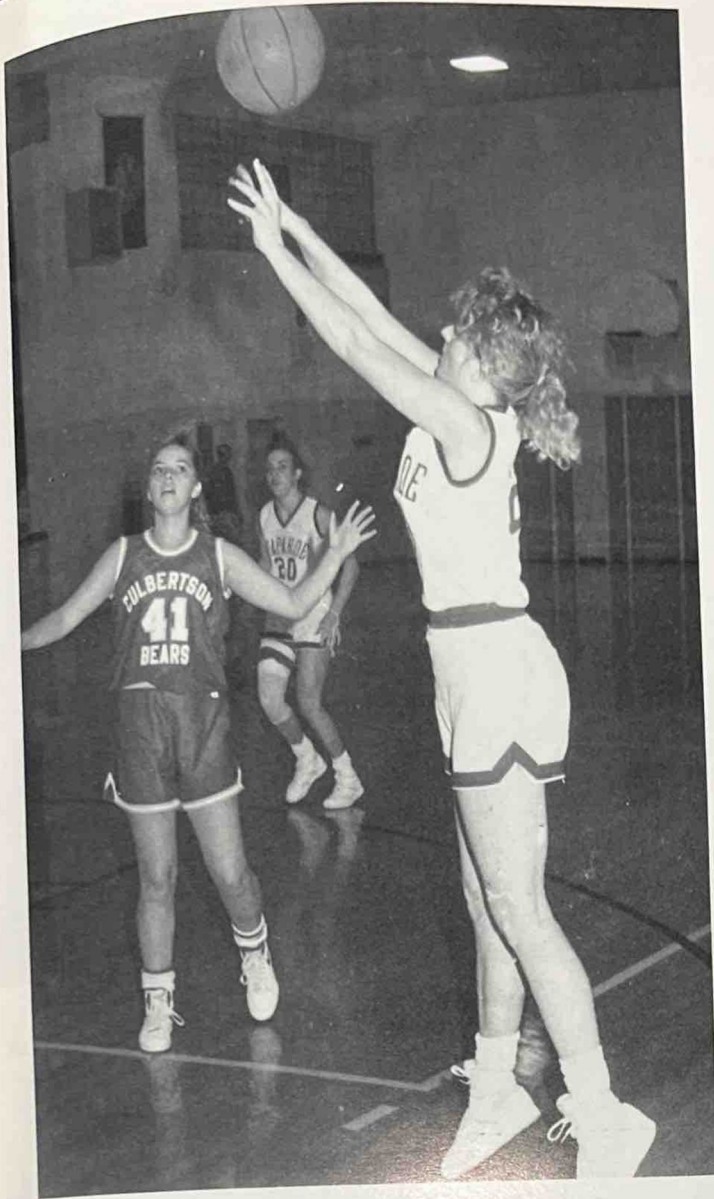

Sophomore Robin Huxoll also put her name on the records. She owns the ninth place position in rebounds with 183.

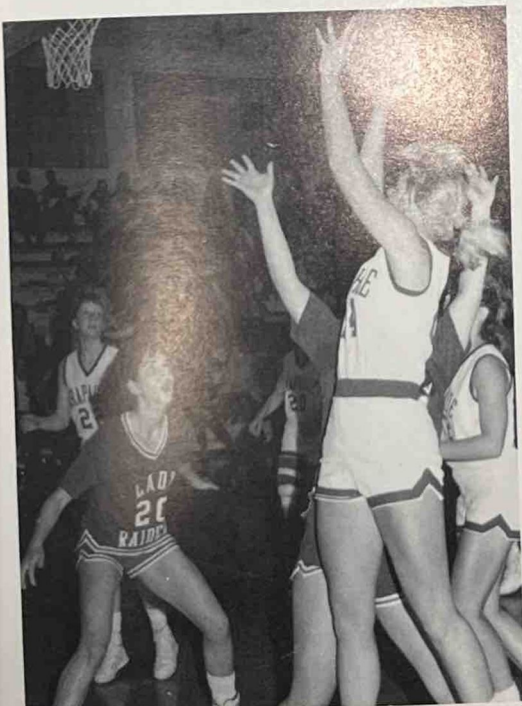

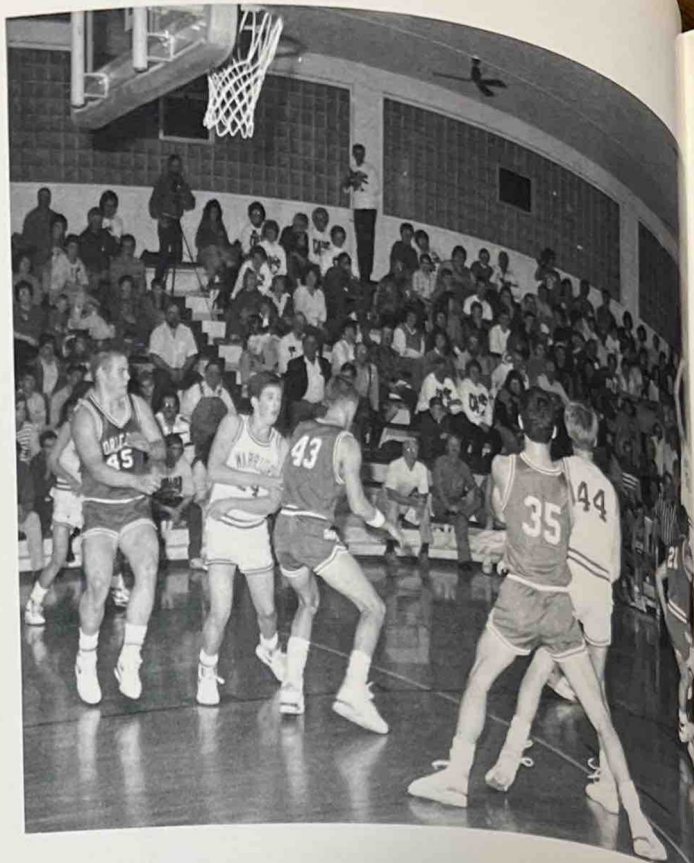

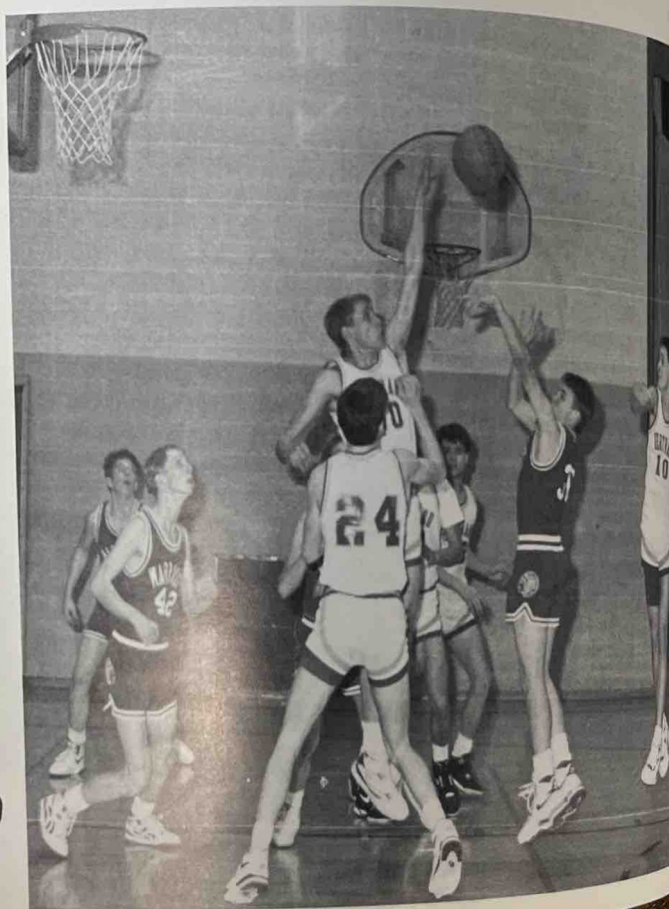
Haussler was third in scoring with a 7.0 average, second in steals with 15 and first in free-throw percentage at 67 percent.

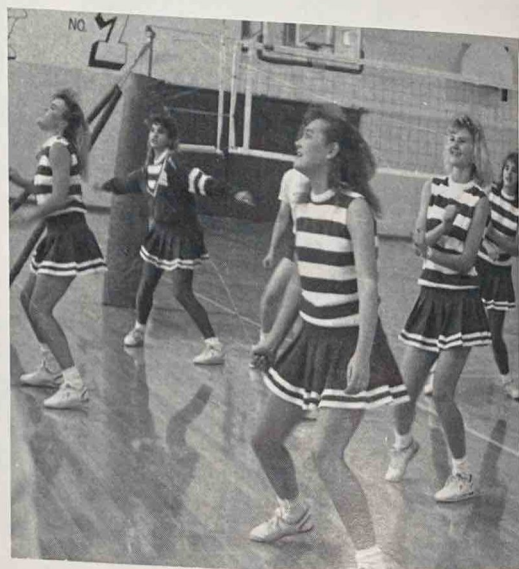


A-Club Honors Coach Vannier

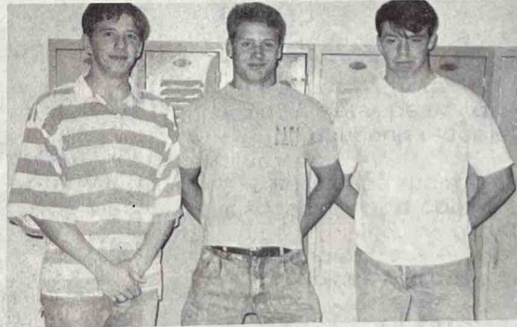
The popular colors for clothing in 1989-90 were green, navy, red, black, white and fuchsia. Neon colors were also seen somewhat.

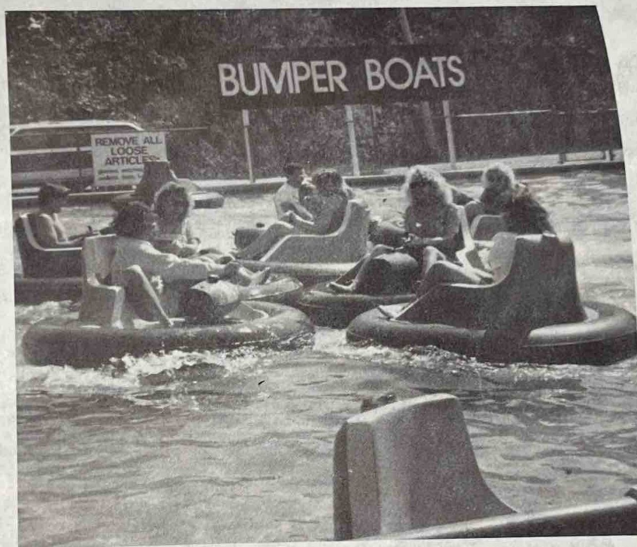
What Is a Friend?

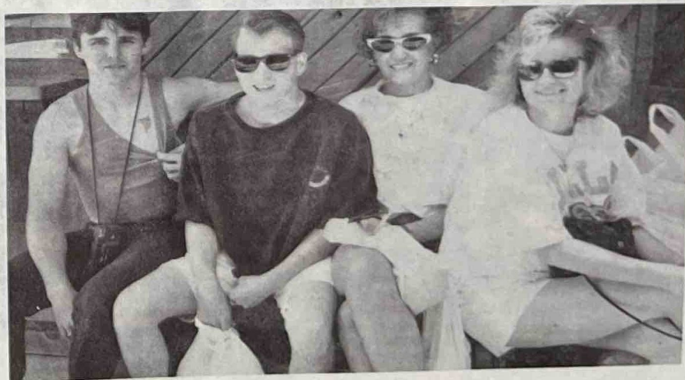
A friend is someone you can talk with, laugh with and even cry with. They are there to share the good and the bad times.

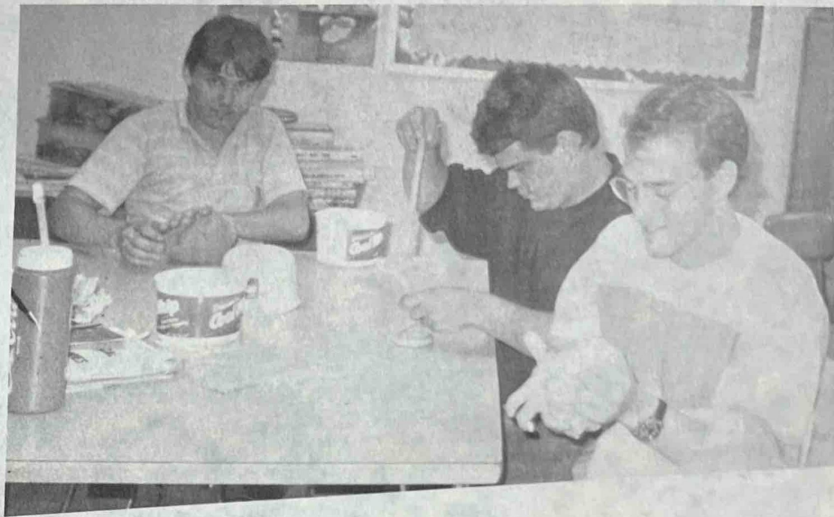

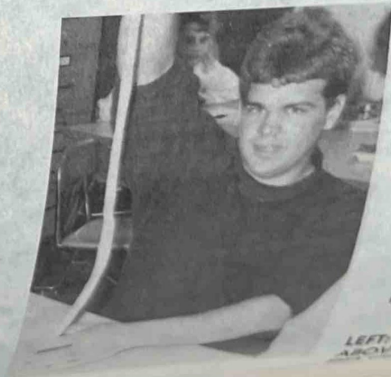
Killing Time...

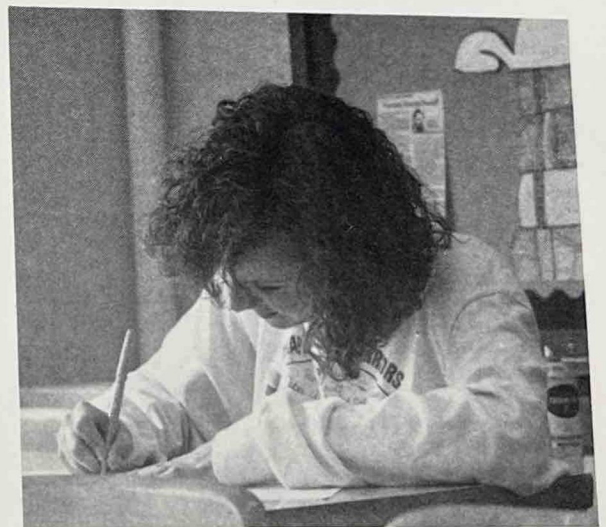

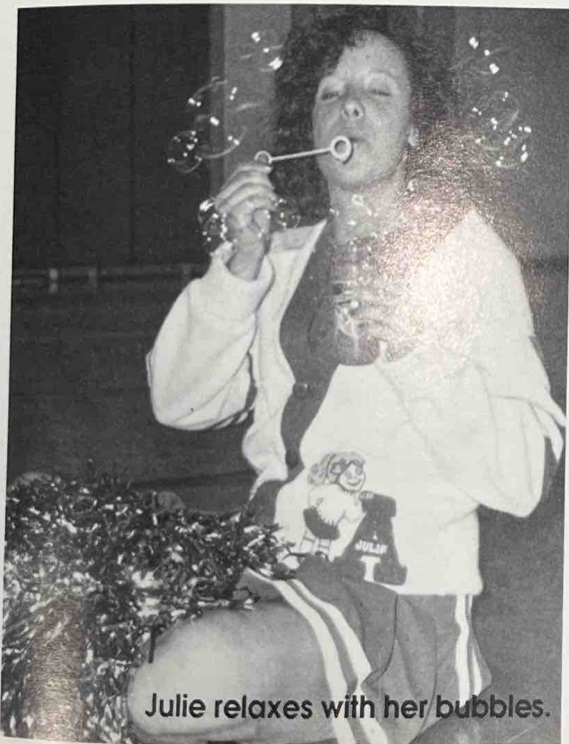

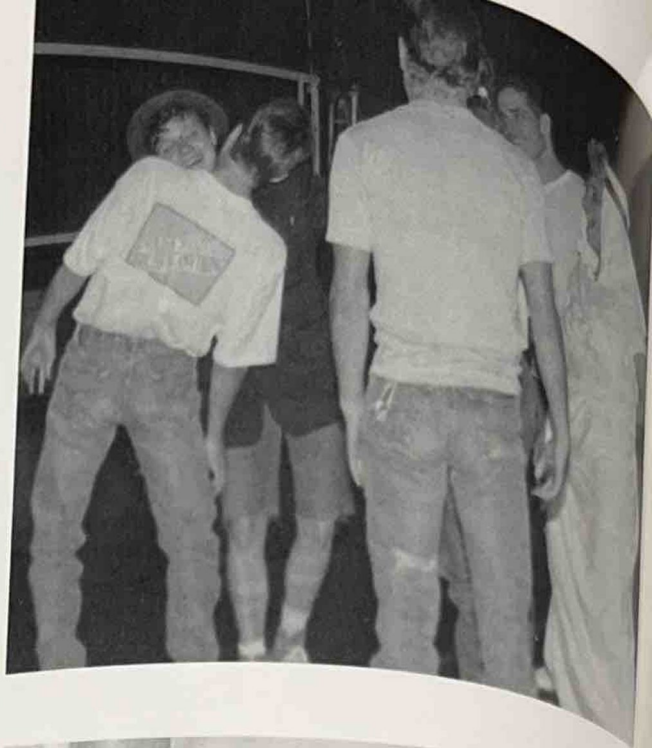


Buddy, Can You Spare a Dime?

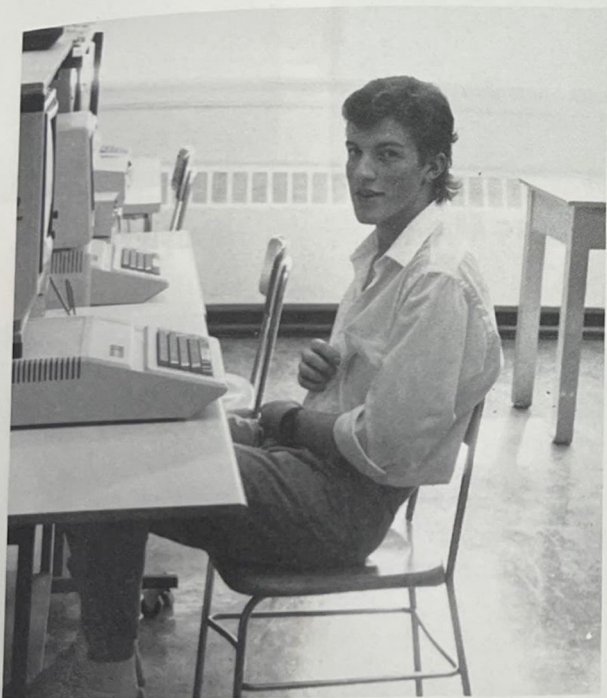

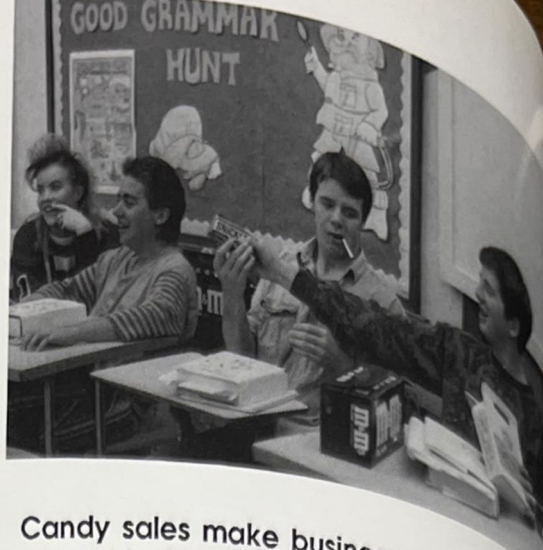
Juniors Enjoy Greenbacks

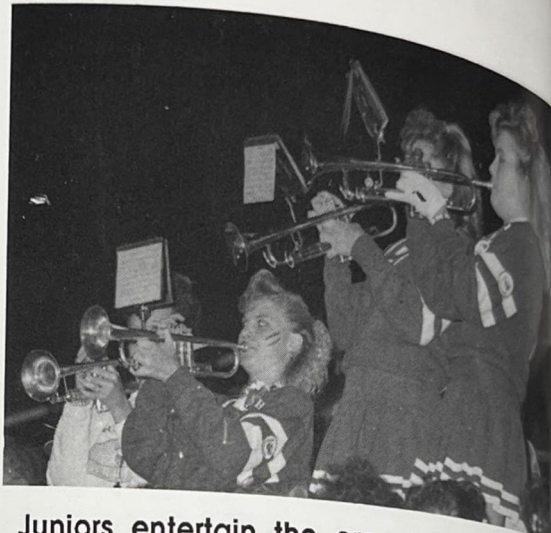

For those juniors, who don't have the work instinct, parents become a source of income. Either through an allowance or by some begging, they get a sufficient amount of money.

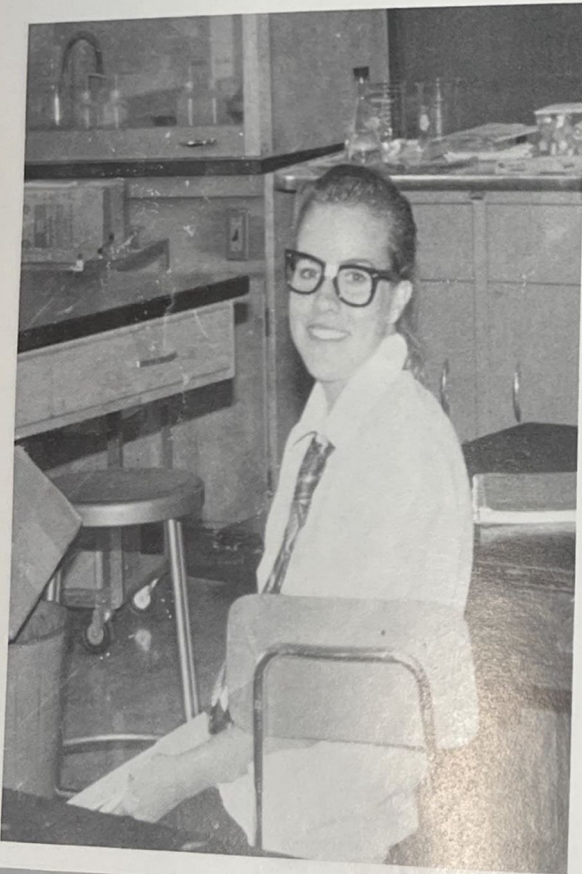

Many of the sophomores have obtained their license. One could find them cruising up and down main at any hour of the day with friends and classmates.

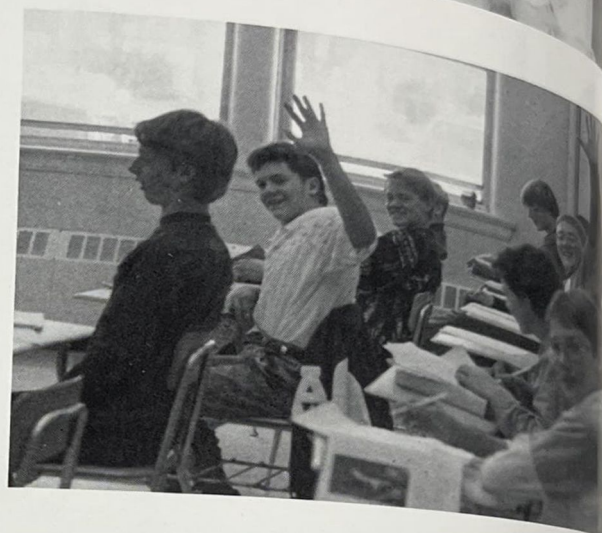
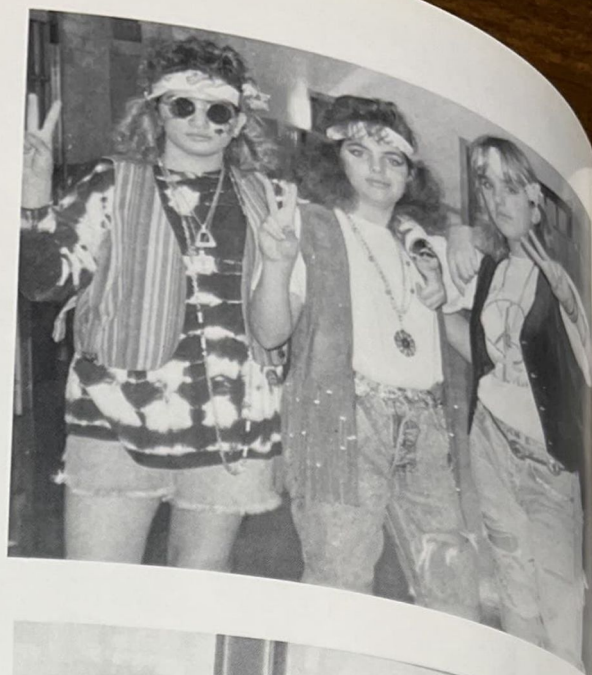

"I have no thoughts whatsoever about pursuing a career as a dancer. I just do it for fun and exercise," responded Amy.

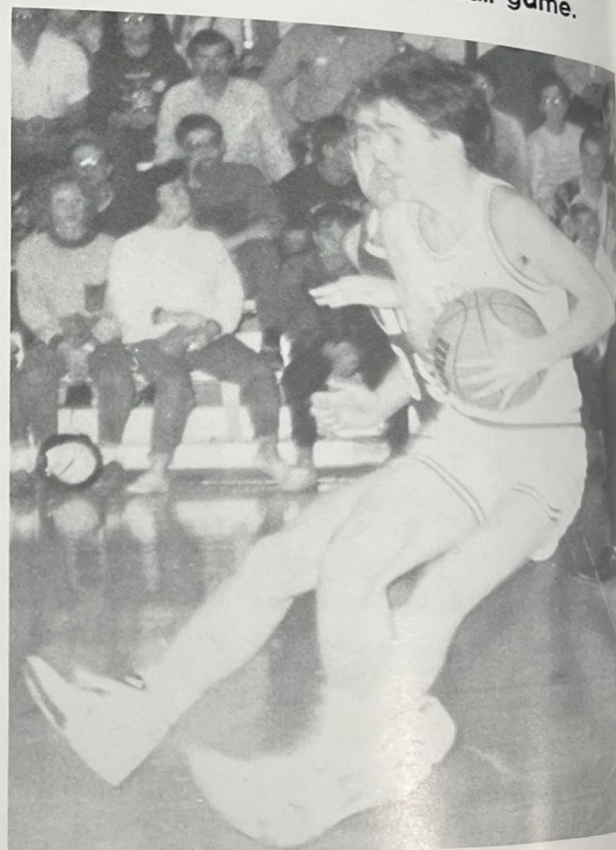

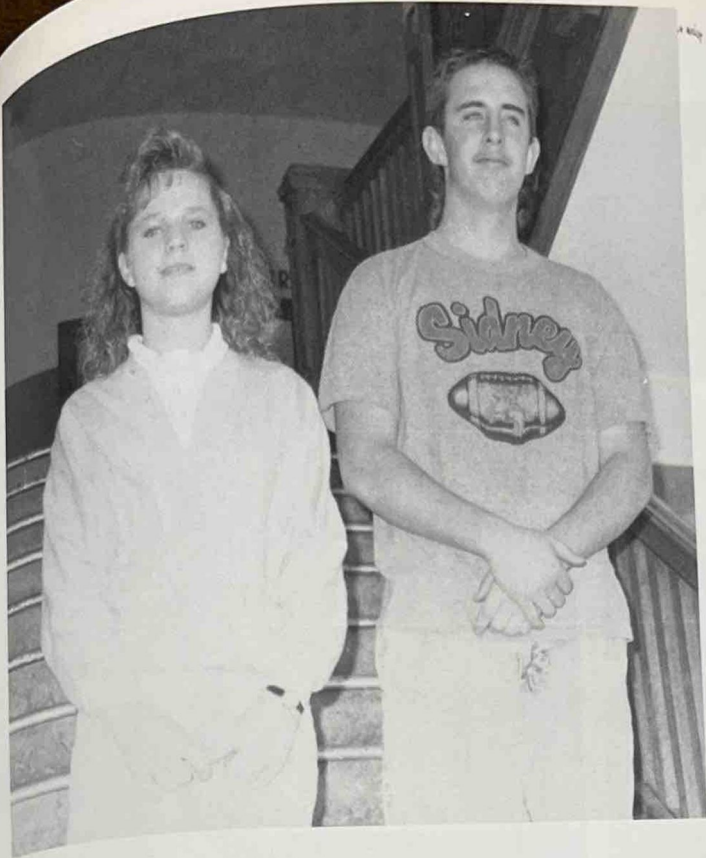

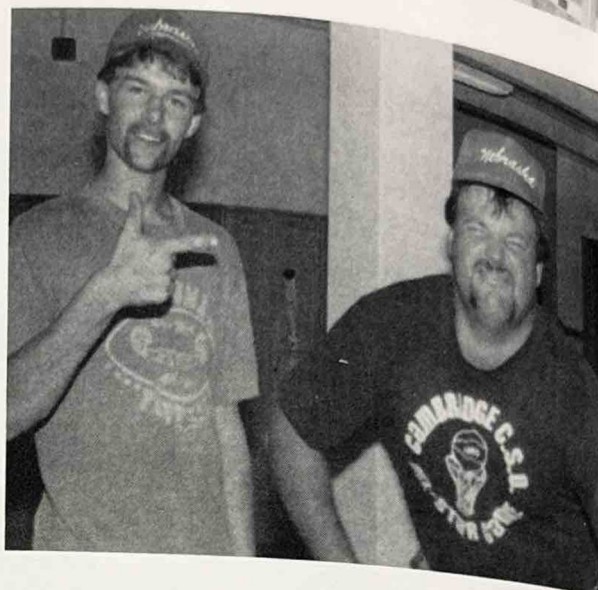
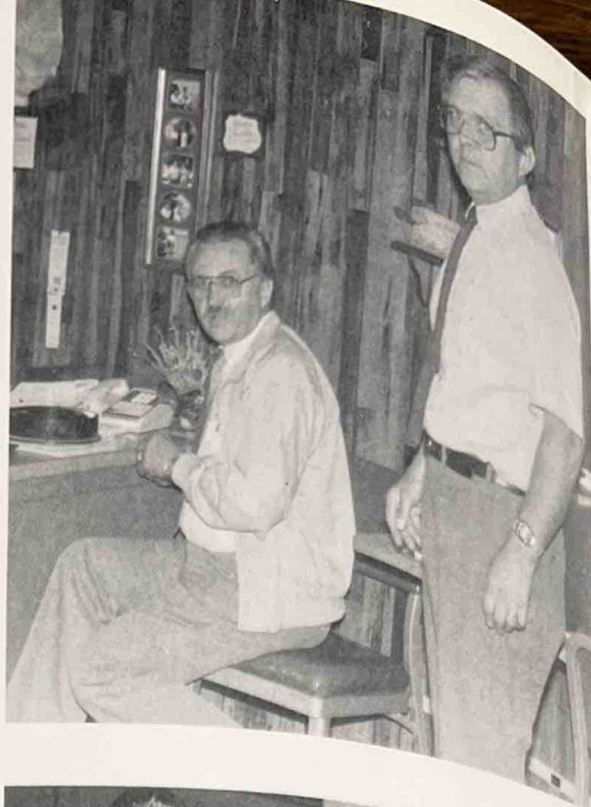
Four Decades of Commitment

When the Class of 1990 graduates in May, four decades of teaching and administrative commitment will come to close for Glen Vannier.

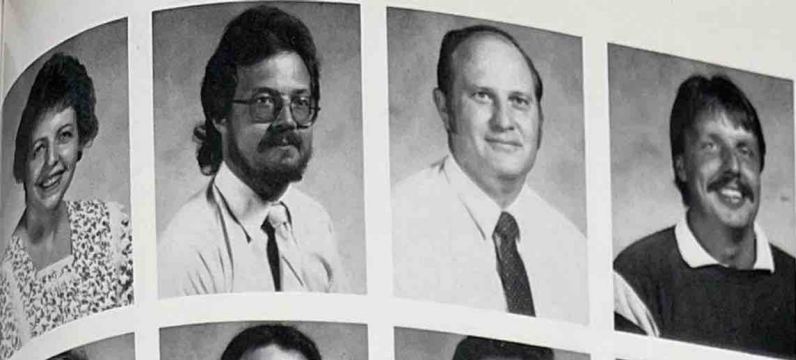

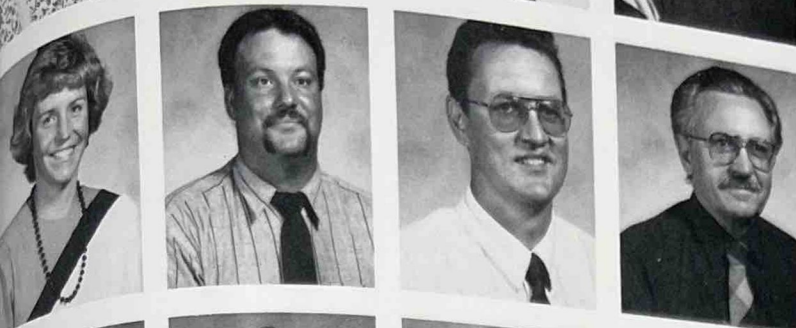

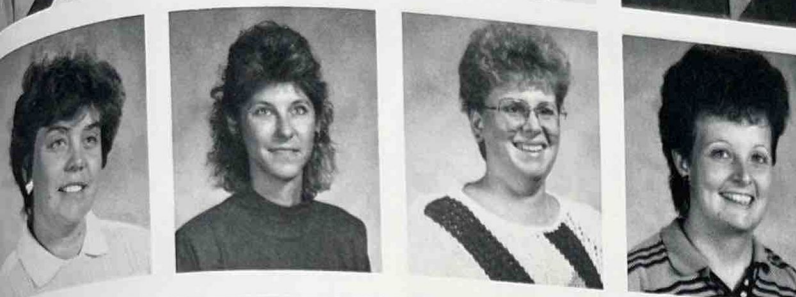

Miss Kanost believes that kids have become more knowledgeable than they used to be. She thinks some of that knowledge may be good, but other may be bad.

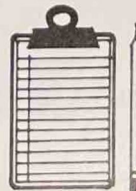
