






















Warriors Earn State Berth for First Time Since 2001

After securing five tournament champion honors, the Arapahoe Warrior Basketball Team qualified for the 2009 Nebraska State High School Basketball Tournament in Lincoln.

The Warriors, under the coaching of Bob Braithwait, secured an opening season win and never looked back. They earned championship honors in the Cattle Trail Cartel, Pleasanton Holiday Tourney and the Arapahoe Holiday Tournament. In RPAC play, Arapahoe claimed a 56-50 win over the Cambridge Trojans after a first round bye. In the semi-final game, they knocked off the Medicine Valley Raiders, 46-42. Finally, the Warriors again met the Hayes Center Cardinals and gained a victory, 52-46, to claim top honors. The Warriors suffered one loss late in their regular season to the Cambridge Trojans, but in post-season play, claimed wins over Bertrand, Eustis-Farnam, and Wauneta-Palisade to earn a ticket to the state tournament.

Following a community/school pep rally and send-off, the Warriors headed to Lincoln for first-round basketball action. The 1st-ranked AHS club was set to take on Mead High School, ranked 8th in the tourney, in a night game. Both teams came out strong, and the scoring lead literally bounced back and forth from team to team. In the end, Arapahoe came out on the short end, 50-48, and their season was put to rest while Mead went on to win the state title. The Warriors finished with a 25 win-2 loss record.

Seniors Dillon Breinig, Ivan Simic, and Dalton Hyke were selected for All-RPAC Honors; Dillon and Ivan were named to the 1st Team while Dalton was added to the 2nd Team.





Approximately 300 people attended the Saturday event. Music Booster parents prepared the dinner, and the cast, in costume, served the crowd.







Speech Team . . . Never at a Loss for Words


Battling the schedule with other winter activities, speech team members found the time to cast their efforts into their individual and group speech events.







Juniors Present Prom 2009 to the Seniors


