Next year the team will not have any of their old players back. Here's wishing luck to the future six-man team of our good old Holbrook High.

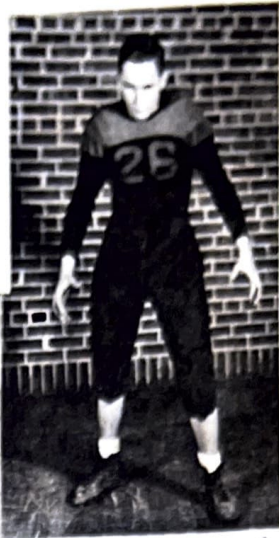
